Action of the case for the Natives by several semi-political propagandist bodies - such as the Peoples Club, Crucitor Circly communist Party and others, some of whom enlisted Mr. Ballinger's services.

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Wage Board Draft Determination.

The Wage Board issued its findings at the beginning of this year in the form of a "Draft Determination". So far as the Native workers are concerned the findings, for the first time in South Africa, approximate near to what is considered to be the bare minimum for existence - namely a minimum wage of £6.10. 0. per month for the average family of five persons, man, woman and three children. The "Draft Determination" is a minimum £6.10. 0. per month for Cape Town and Port Elizabeth; £6.0.0. per month for Johannesburg; £5.8.4. for East London and Witwatersrand and £4.15.4. -£4.6.8. per month Bloemfontein - Orange Free State, Durban-Natal, and Uitenhage-Cape.

There is provision in the Determination for a 46 hour week for skilled and 48 hour week for unskilled workers, overtime rates of pay and holidays. This is the first Betermination that has made such provisions without an implied colour bar.. Unfortunately is is repretted that 107 objections have been lodged against the Determination. The hearing of these objections practically amounts to another enquiry by the Wage Board, with little or no hope that the Board will be able to gazette the Determination this year.

Most of the objections are to the scales fixed for the higher grades - which are calssed as skilled, and are done by Europeans. There are, however some employers who claim that the provision to allow employers who board and lodge labourers to deduct £1.1.8 per month from the proposed cash is not sufficient.

Efforts to Combat Objections.

The services of Mr. Ballinger are in demand to explain the nature of the objections and how they can be combated. He has addresinterstat sed meetings of organisation interested in Port Elizabeth, East London, Pretoria, Johannesburg and Cape Town. Arising out of the discussions
