During Nov. 1937 Received a holice to warn all hatives from my 3 lower farms to go to be vaccinated. - by an oversight I omnitted to do so I all a few of my hatives attended + were dow. For farm Kanenshill & Escewed ho notice of baccuation. I wrote to District Surgen Esporting a Suspected rase of Small por at Raverduils - a guil who had been working in the house be Explied (inclosure 1) that I must Report autbreak to A.N.C. Dawels bloof. 2" Feb. I went to A.N.C. who said authority would have to be obtained from Prelores before a general bascination and be das - but that he would distruct D.S. to bisit Rasenshill + Confirm if small pox. I saw D.S. + begged him when he came out to at least baccinate all contacts & my house servants. as I was 2" or 3" Feb. D. S. Came out, Sans case. 4 boccinates about 35 halives - only 1 of these baccinations subsequently look. D.S. told me authority for vaccuiation was esquecked by end of the week & that

a general baccination would be done early following week.

14" Feb.

brote A.N.C. reporting fresh cases & asking him when general ple versualian was going to bone — he replied (inclosure 2) that they were waiting for fresh baccine.

18° Feb.

Went in + saw A.N.C. - complained of delay - he offered to send D.S. out that day to inspect fresh cases - but 9 adviced him to wait empth the posts baccine came.

19 Feb.

A.N.C. Came out with District Surgeou's locum tenens who baccuiated the contacts of the new cases — home of these baccuiations look & I afterwards heard the old baccine had again been used.

22 - Jel.

All hatives were assembled here for a general bassination — but D. S. stuck in the hund after heavy Eain was unable to reach farm - + wrote bassination must be post poned.

25 Fel.

Went in + saw D.S who said he would hold baccination as march 1st an one of my other farms Vredefaster which was more central.

march 1st All hatives went to the appointed place twaited all day but D.S hever turned up - goads were dry there had been no fami for 6 days.

march 9th Received inclosure 3 from A. N.C. Saying traceination would be held an 10th at the gate between bredefantein and Zwarthopjes. as these farms do not adjain the fact are about 5 miles apart I had to so in

march 10.5

D.S. Carried out general bacemation, at Vredefontein 34 days after I had reported the frist case.

By this time every thild on Rovenshit from Small pox—

All the natives on my other famus

All the natives on my other facus were done on march 10. except those from the furthest farm Sedan which who carried late - neeting the D.S. on his way back but he El fused to Stop to do them.

None of these vaccuiations took & lowereds the end of april there was a bad out break at Vredefonten - 24 cases at at once & complete disorganization of labour.



Dear Miss Eland,

I have just received your note that.

you wrote yesterday.

For some extraordinary reason, you were not notified about the vaccination that I did last week at Medingen for an outbreak that occurred there.

The best thing to do under the circumstances is to send an official notification to the Commissioner here and as soon as the weather permits, a special vaccination can be done on your farm. After the rain that we have had recently, I very much doubt whether I will be able to get to your farm today.

Please then send the notification to Emmett and as soon as the weather clears up

I shall come and vaccinate there.
