Gentlemen,

We have prepared the Balance Sheet dated 31st December, 1953, together with the Income and Expenditure Account for the year then ended, and have to report as follows:-

FEES

We have brought into account an amount of £375.10.0, representing school fees in arrear at 31st December, 1953. We were unable to verify whether all fees due have been brought to account, but we have checked to see that all amounts receipted have been deposited.

BUILDING FUND

Amounts disbursed on behalf of this fund have been shown on the Balance Sheet as "Advances to Building Fund". We have not yet completed the audit of the Building Fund books, and are accordingly unable to verify this account, but it would appear that considerable adjustments will be necessary in respect of amounts paid by the Building Fund on behalf of the Institute. These adjustments will have to be made in the year ending 31st December, 1954.

BOOKSTALL

As this is a fund administered by the Institute, we feel that no satisfactory audit of the Institute's affairs can be carried out without having this fund audited as well.

EQUIPMENT

We have not seen any inventory of Equipment at 31st December, 1953, nor has equipment purchased on behalf of the Institute been brought into account.

TITLE DEEDS

We have not inspected the title deeds for the Land, as we understand that these are being kept in America.

GENERAL

We are still experiencing a certain amount of difficulty in obtaining all the vouchers in support of payments, but have noticed a considerable improvement over previous years. We are still unable to verify the correctness of amounts paid for Salaries and wages, and would suggest that an official certified list of Salaries payable be prepared to enable us to verify this expenditure.

We have not inspected the Minute Book, and would request an official notification from yourselves as to the authority granted to the Superintendent for incurring expenditure.

At a meeting attended by over 2000 ratepayers and tenants at the square at 173 Good Street, Sophiatown, it was unanimously resolved to continue to oppose strenuously the Western Areas Removal Scheme as being uncalled for and undesirable, because (a) Africans there have all the amenities of roads, water, sewerage and lights which ~~are~~ do not all exist in the Municipal Townships of Orlando, Western and Eastern Native Township, Pimville and Jabavu Townships; (b) it is based on colour discrimination and white domination. It is neither a housing nor a public welfare scheme. It is a political expediency based on a political party ideology - apartheid - against which Africans are opposed. It has one aim and one only to deprive Africans of freehold ownership of land in urban areas in the Union to render them amenable to control and available as cheap labour to be distributed by the Department of Native Affairs among Europeans wherever such labour is needed.

It was resolved further to oppose the scheme because of the hatred suspicion and disturbance of peace between white and black. It was resolved still further to refute and challenge as untrue the statement made by the "Native Affairs spokesman" that "Natives not against being removed from Western Areas", and to invite a representative of the Department of Native Affairs - Minister, Secretary, or any one else to come and address a public meeting in the area and learn how baseless the statement is that "about 98% of the population of Sophiatown, Martindale and Newclare would be unlikely to oppose the move to Meadowland." (Star, 19/3/54.)
It was finally resolved that Mr. S.D. Lethoba, Chairman, Sophiatown Ratepayers Association and Dr. A.B. Xuma, Chairman, African Anti-Expropriation Ratepayers Association and Proper Housing Movement, respectively, sign this statement jointly and release it to the Press as representing the uncompromising determination of Africans in the Western Areas - Property Owners and Tenants - to oppose the Western Areas Schemes with all the means at their disposal and further that the two Ratepayers Association meet together forthwith and work out a programme of closer cooperation or joint action in the fight against this scheme. And that since the scheme aims at destroying freehold rights in South Africa for Africans in South Africa, the tenants as well must join hands with property owners as the scheme in this way denies them any hope of future land ownership, security and responsibility.

The Africans want the extension of freehold ownership for them throughout South Africa. They want to live at peace with Europeans.

The slogan for the area is we are not moving! We are not selling!

They ~~denied~~ ^{denied} as misleading and untrue the suggestion that the Western Areas scheme is a ~~Welfare~~ ^{Welfare} ~~scheme~~ ^{scheme} for the benefit of Africans. ~~That~~ ^{That} ~~the scheme is based on the~~ ^{the scheme is based on the} ideology of apartheid which aims at economic strangulation of the Africans to subserve white domination. The Conference pointed out that the 100 or so properties out of 2600 stands in the area have been sold for reasons beyond the control of owners such as sales in execution for failure to pay rate arrears, or default in payment of bond or attachment.

Properties beyond all doubt people in these areas are not satisfied with this proposed amalgamation.

properties through foreclosure on nominal owners. This proves, beyond all doubts, that African properties owners in these areas will not part with their properties willingly and voluntarily. Only superior brute force by an unsympathetic Government who disregard all ^{the} principles, right and justice, will compel them to part with their properties. Conference finally resolved to stand united and uncompromising to oppose the Western Areas Scheme and the general Government policy as declared that "no Native will own any ground (freehold) in a European (urban) area" as being an assault on their birthright to own property anywhere in Africa.

It was further resolved to appeal to all Churches ^{white and non-white} who believe in the practice of Christian and ethical principles to design ^{a certain} Sunday during this year as a day of Prayer to pray for the deliverance of our Country from this national sin and to appeal to all men and women of Goodwill ^{of all races} who believe in democracy, Christianity and human dignity for all to join in this fight to save South Africa from committing suicide. Conference condemns the scheme as undermining peace and goodwill between Europeans and Africans. ^{Conference concluded} and Africans will never then the Minister and the Government for it.

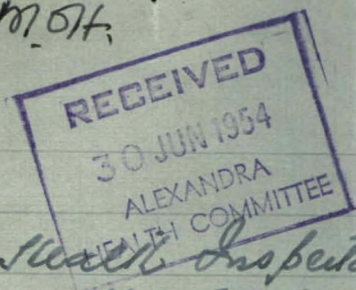
