This Conference of Women of all races gathered here together condemns outright the proposal to extend passes to African Women as an outrage, a violation of human dignity. We here resolve to do all in our power to oppose this brutal measure and declare our unfailing determination to stand together as women of all races, as the women of South Africa, as the mothers of the nation, until the whole degarding pass system has been abolished. This Conference declares in the name of women here today that women will not accept slavery and we resolve that we shall go forward together in courageous opposition to mobilise all women in the struggle and that we shall not cease until we have won for our children their right to freedom and security.

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This Conference of Women condemns the Industrial Conciliation Amendment Bill which threatens to destroy the trade union movement and to divide all workers on racial lines. As working women we pledge our support to the South African Congress of Trade Unions, the non-colour bar trade union organisation which fights on the basis of unity amongst all workers, irrespective of race or colour.

This Conference condemns the vicious Bantu Education Act which is designed to teach African children that they are inferior because they are African, to train and educate them only to perform the lowest tasks, and to deny to them their rightful heritage of knowledge and human dignity. Conference demands that all children in South Africa receive full, free, compulsory and universal education.

Conference condemns the Nursing act Amendment Bill as a vicious attempt to encourage racialism in the noble profession of nursing by denying to non-European nurses their rightful place on the Nursing Council, and condemns the Bill further as an extension of the principle of Bantu Education in that African nurses are to receive an inferior training. Conference urges all white and non-white nurses to unite in opposition to this Bill and to make their voices heard. Conference resolves to give full support to the nurses in their struggle against the Bill.

This Conference of Women condemns the Population Registration Act as a fascist technique designed to curtail the liberty of the people. Conference sees in this Act a deliberate attempt to classify all the people of South Africa, black, coloured, Indian and white and further condemns the unprincipled action of the Government in attempting to coerce the people of South Africa into compliance with the Act by demanding the production of

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identity numbers for the registration of births deaths and marriages. Conference urges the women of South Africa to refrain from collaborating with the Government at any stage of the introduction of the provisions of the Act. Conference demands the repeal of the Population Rehistration Act.

This Conference of Women, gathered here together, condemns
the inhuman reclassification of the Coloured People, which
is a denial of human dignity. As women we are opposed to
all forms of classification for we say "We are the Human Race"
and we resolve to support the Coloured People in their opposition
to the brutal procedures employed by Government officials and
to the Population Registration Act.

We, the women of the Tansvaal, gathered here today, express our horror and indignation at the plan of the Benoni Town Council to evict the Coloured people from their homes in the Ashatic section of Benoni location. We condemn the action of the landlords in tearing off the roofs of the homes of the Coloured people, of mothers with young babies, and we pledge ourselves to support the coloured women and men of Benoni in their desperate struggle to preserve the homes of the Coloured people who have no other place to go. Conference urges the Town Council of Benoni to provide forthwith proper homes for the Coloured people.

This Conference of Women protests against the Locations in the Sky Act and urges that proper provision be made to accommodate the African workers emplyed in flats, hotels and dwellings. Conference condemns any attempt to force these workers away from their places of employment, to compel them to travel long distances to and and from their work, to expose them to the hardships of seeking accommodation in already overcrowded African townships.

This Conference of Women of all races called by the Federation of South African Women proclaims its solidarity with women of all countries on the occasion of International Women's Day.
