May I suggest - and I hope you know me well enough by now to realise that this is not made with any idea of pushing myself to the front - that you should have one public health man or woman on your Executive Office to assist Mrs. Renshall Jones in the work she is doing. Among the suitable people

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I can do well think of Dr PAUL ROSS
of Durban (after he retires from the
Govt. Service in Jan 1939), Dr GALE
of my Dept (who has the approval and
knowledge which your Council - if
I may suggest it - need), Dr DANBENTON
of AHS or, better, Dr L.S. WICKHAMPS of
Sub. Nigel, or, possibly, some medical
man definitely elected by the Federal
Council of the Medical Assoc of S. Africa
to represent preventive and other medical
points of view on your Executive.

If, as I believe very definitely,
the preventive medical officer can do
more at the present time to assist the
improvement of race relations in South
Africa than any other worker - then
such a man should be on your Council.

Anyhow, knowing your views and
Mrs Kleinnett's Jones's liberal views on
these matters, I leave it to you. I
do think that Gale would be an
excellent man to give the Council
of the Institute a hand. As the
medical officer of health's point of view

My dear Anning,

Please forgive my failure to reply before this to your letter of March 9th. I have become disgracefully behind with my correspondence as this Senatorship business is a full-time job, in so far as the Native representatives are concerned. My correspondence has swollen greatly.

But I was delighted to get your letter all the same, and I warmly welcome your kindness in making suggestions for strengthening the medical and health side of the Institute's work. As you have raised the matter, I should like to have a chance to discuss the matter more fully with you, because I have not been very happy about this side of the Institute's work. My hands have become ludicrously full and my poor wife at the present time is nothing more than a drudge struggling with my correspondence whilst she has important work on Land and Health, as well as the Wayfarer Movement, waiting her attention.

Do you know that the Institute has a standing committee of which Dr. Moffat is Chairman, which has been advising my wife and myself? Some of the work is now being done under the auspices of the Christian Council's Medical Missions Committee. The whole situation needs reconsideration.

My wife and I will be away from Johannesburg until May 12th. We shall then be at home for about ten days. Could we meet you then? Let me know whether we should go out to Benoni or meet you in town? Could you lunch with us? I suggest May 16th, 17th or 18th.
