



## PRINTING PLANT FOR BANTU SCHOOL BOOKS

---

In the Transvaal there are 2176 Bantu Schools registered under the Education Department of the S.A. Republic. There are ~~280,000~~<sup>430,000</sup> students in these schools, and the number is increasing. Each student has to have six Exercise books. Higher class students are to have up to ten and twelve Exercise books. These books last at the most three months, and have to be replaced with new books. Each book has to have the name of the students school printed in bold letters on the front outside cover page. These books are to be of a standard size.

I hereby enclose fresh evidence for my case:-

In 1954 I first made the acquaintance of Cherstina Mafa in Alexanders-township, when she told me that she was unmarried. We became friends. In 1955 she said she was going to her home in Basutoland. She stayed away for two years, when she returned she had a baby which she said I was the father. When I questioned her she said when she went to Basutoland she found that she was pregnant. I believed her, although I thought she had been away too long. (two years) When she went to Basutoland she said it was her fathers house that she was going to. I now know that this man Mafa is the name of her husbands father. Her husbands name is Metshe Mafa. In Court here she said to the Magistrate and the Clerk in Johannesburg, that she was a spinster and was never married, when in fact she had been married long before I knew her.

Later she told the Court that her husband had died ten years ago. The truth is that her husband is very much alive now in Basutoland, and that when she told me that she was going home to her fathers house, she went to her husband Mafa. I have found out that her maiden surname is Mputule, not Mafa. That Mafa is her husbands surname. From the time I learnt to know her she told me her surname was Mafa.



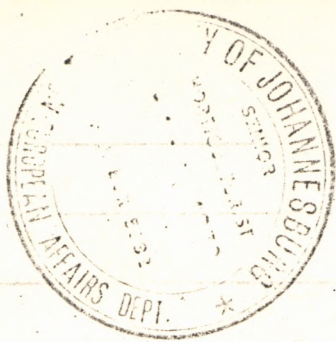
