SOCIAL SCIENCE CONFERENCE: DURBAN: 12TH - 16TH JULY 1954

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Dear Colleague,

I am grateful for your interest in the forthcoming Conference and I look forward to welcoming you to the University of Natal. The Conference, as you know, is to discuss the <u>Social Research Needs and</u> <u>Priorities of South Africa and Problems and Difficulties in the Organization</u> <u>of Social Research in the Union</u>. It is a pioneer venture of its kind, and there have been some difficulties in organizing it, but we are now assured of a large and representative gathering of social scientists drawn from Universities and Government Departments throughout the Union, as well as from certain organizations outside South Africa, and I have no doubt that our meetings will be mutually informative and profitable.

One of our principal organizational difficulties has been to finalise the Conference Programme. A number of institutions replied promptly to accept our original invitation, but others delayed or preferred to wait to see the list of topics and speakers before accepting. Our resultant dilemma will be obvious, but I mention it to explain why there has been the delay in sending you the enclosed draft programme and the list of delegates, and also to explain any deficiencies in the Programme. I wish to emphasize, however, that the introductory papers should take not more than 30 minutes, and that as much time as possible has been set aside for discussion. I would also stress that any delegate may be requested to make a contribution at short notice. Ready co-operation in such matters will ensure that no discipline, topic or speaker is neglected. To assist delegates arrangements have been made for recorders to note the substance of the papers and contributions to discussion. This will enable speakers to confine themselves to preparing brief notes, but we shall be glad if such notes can be made available to the recorders beforehand.

As you will see from the draft programme we have assigned prominent positions throughout the Conference to Professor Edmund de S. Brunner (Sociologist and Director of the Bureau of Applied Social Research, Columbia University, New York) and Professor Charles Nixon (Political Scientist, University of California). We have adopted this course because one of the principal aims of the Conference is to enable South African social scientists to meet the visiting Professors who have played an important part in launching our new Advanced Social Research Training Project. Needless to add there will be many opportunities for informal discussions with Professors Brunner and Nixon during the period of the Conference, just as we hope that there will be many informal meetings between all delegates.

DIRECTIONS AND INFORMATION FOR VISITORS

The Memorial Tower of the University of Natal is a prominent landmark on the crest of the southern portion of the inland ridge which overlooks the Durban Bay and it may be seen from most points in the centre of the city. The White Dome of the Howard College Building, which adjoins the Memorial Tower Building is also clearly visible.

The University Residences (the Charles James Hall for Men and the Ansell May Hall for Women) are located immediately below the main buildings on the seaward slope of the Ridge. The charge for board and lodging is fl per day per person.

The Howard College buses leave from Gardiner Street, opposite the Cenotaph, Town Gardens (see times below) and the more frequent Penzance Road buses leave from the Town Gardens opposite the Post Office in West Street. The terminus of the Penzance Road bus is within walking distance of the Residences but it should not be attempted with heavy suitcases.

University transport will meet the mail train which arrives in Durban on Monday 12th July at - 9 a.m.
