S. LUCY'S HOSPITAL
TRANSKEI
SOUTH AFR

Just a year ago Ursula and I sat by the side of the road looking on our new home. The veld was dry and burnt, the heat was stifling, way over the mountains just above us came the rumbling of a storm. We both felt strange and a little lost. We were both wondering what lay ahead of us on the Mission. We had for years learnt to look up to and admire the home of Godfrey Callaway and Father Ley.

For Ursula there was no doubt what lay ahead of her. There was a garden to make, there was order to be brought out of chaos in a house full of workmen, pipes and paint.

For me at the Hospital, I was to see the same Hospital that I had worked in with Doctor McMurtrie and Doctor Leslie thirty years ago. I was to learn of its struggles since those days.

I was to see one girl Doctor doing simply herculean tasks with out-patients, in-patients, in dispensary, in Office, in far-away clinics. She was her own laboratory assistant, her own radiographer. Alone she was running a Hospital of seventy-five beds. There was a Matron and one Sister to nurse the patients and to teach twenty-five African girls.

These two were down to it, doing colossal feats of endurance. No one can know the strain of working alongside young girls of a different race, girls whose standards are other than your own, the constant effort, the constant lifting power that is needed. Never for one moment may you take the path of the second best. If you do, you will let the place down. You can't turn and blame the African, you can only blame yourself.

The conditions under which these Sisters are working. Can I describe them? - the heat, the kitchen, the iron roof, the cramped space. How the people are fed I can't think, but they are fed, and well fed. The wards are the old wards I had known, improved by Doctor Monica Mary. The Dispensary doing great work, has to act as an out-patient department. The Operating Theatre, with its corrugated iron walls and roof, has for years seen many a major operation.

But Doctor Monica Mary has seen the vision of a future, and in the days when money was hard to come by. She had faith and vision, for there in the front of the Hospital lie Maternity and Children's Wards, that are

worthy of any Provincial or modern Hospital. It has spacious corridors. It has its labour wards - not a ward, but wards. It has its sterilizing room. It has its creche, its bathrooms, its hoppers, it makes one look up, it gives you a real uplift when you see what was done in the days when money was scarce.

Can you blame me if I am filled with a great ambition to get the whole Hospital up to the level that Doctor Monica Mary has set? I believe it can be done, with your help. At any rate, we can make a start.

WE NEED NEW KITCHENS.

WE NEED AN OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

WE NEED SOME SORT OF OFFICE.

WE NEED AN OPERATING THEATRE.

WE NEED A NEW X-RAY ROOM.

IT WILL COST £7,600.

Where is the money to come from? The Cape Province had promised 50% on any plans that have their approval. It is for us to find the other 50%. Can we do it?

This is one of our great needs, but there is a need far greater than this, and that is the need for more nursing help. The Matron and one Sister are wearing themselves out. Is it possible that some nurse at home or in this country will feel the call to volunteer for this work? The work is hard, it's monotonous at times, it means working not for Africans, but with Africans. It means that you are not asked to drive, but to lead young girls out of the way of thinking that to be found out is a mistake, into the way of the great freedom of owning up to a fault. It is a hard life, and extremely difficult, especially in our contacts with our own people, but it can be done, and it is really worth while. It is a grand opportunity for service.

Finally, what we need most of all is wisdom for the future. We want to gain, not just a little, but the full confidence and trust of these African people. We want them to feel that this Hospital is their's, is their home in time of trouble and sickness.

We want them to see in us, the Hospital Staff,
