1. Delete Para ble.
2. Delete line 1 and 2 of the first paragraph on page two and after the word "Viewpoint" add "Must be stressed" and substitute the word "Gain" for conquest after "Every"
3. Delete the last sentence of paragraph 2 on page 3.
4. Delete first sentence in paragraph 1 and in its place substitute.
"The artificial maintainance of the aggressive Syngman Rhee government and the supplying of arms to and the support of Chiang Kai Shek regime in Formosa coupled with the participation of the American 7th Fleet in Chiang Kai Sheks attacks on the peoples republic of China continuously threaten to result in hostilities in the East"
5. Delete the first sentence in paragraph 2 on page 4 and in its place substitute.
"The re-armament of Germany must be prevented and can still be prevented by the organised activities of the people in all countries supporting the opposition of the German, French and other peoples and the proposal for European collective security.
6. After the word "Peace loving" in paragrapg 2 line 6 add "United"
7. Delete the third sentence in paragraph 3 on page 4 (Military Alliances) and substitute.
"These military alliances such as Nato and Seato in fact increase the damage of war because they lead to the intensification of the armaments drive, the establishment of war bases throughout the world- in Spain, Pakistan, Japan, Africa and elsewhere, the rearmament of Germany, the supply of arms to Formosa and interference in the affairs of different countries.
8. Delete the second sentence in paragraph 2 and substitute
"The Emperor of Ethiopia, whose people have been deprived of all democratic rights and whose country is regarded as safe, visited England and discussed the established of military bases in that country, In Kenya, a possible gigantic base and a rich source of strtegic materials, the peoples movement for liberation is being violently and brutally crushed.
9. In the 4th line on page 7 add "And Britain" after U.S.A.
10. Delete the last sentence of the first paragraph and substitute
"The government declares itself ready to supply manpower and materials in the event of a war against countries of Eastern Europe.
11. Delete the word "And liberation" after peace in the 4th line of paragraph 2.
12. Delete the last paragraph on page 7 and substitute.
"The struggle to prevent the fomation of military alliances and setting up of war bases, the struggle to outlaw propaganda which tends to divide people and make them hostile to one another,

and the struggle to end foreign occupations and interference in various countries weakens the aggressive forces and aids the movement for peace and liberation.

13. Paragraph 2.
Congress of the People.

Delete lines 1 and 2 up to "Racialism" in line 3 and add in after the heading Congress of the People on page 8.

"In South Africa intensive activity is being conducted among all sections of the population in preparation for the C.O.P. which will formulate a Freedom Charter. During the course of the preparations on the local, regional and national level the people will raise hundreds of problems and suggest the solutions to them.

It must be our task at all levels to show the link between these problems and the struggle for peace; to show the people how the government is part of the war camp and that their aspirations for a better life can only be realised in a world at peace, where our people can live in friendship and co-operation with other peoples.

14. In the last line of page 8 delete the words,

"The expulsion on Chiang Kai Shek" and substitute,

"Her inclusion in the UNITED NATIONS ORGANISATION.
