REPORT OF THE MANAGER, NON-EUROPEAN AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT.

FOR THE PERIOD 1ST JULY 1966 TO 30TH JUNE 1967

TO THE MAYOR AND COUNCILLORS OF THE CITY OF JOHANNESBURG.

Mr. Mayor, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the report of the Council's Non-European Affairs Department for the period 1st July 1966 to 30th June 1967. (Except where particularly stated all matters reported refer to Bantu).

A. PROGRESS OF MAJOR SCHEMES:

1. New Bantu Beer Brewery - Langlaagte.

The brewery was officially handed over to the Council on the 2nd January 1967 and production started on a limited basis. Since the 1st April 1967 the brewery has been in full production and it is producing some 2½ million gallons of Bantu beer a month.

2. Lifateng Hostel.

Plans based on improved standards have been prepared for the Hostel which will house approximately 4,000 Bantu men.

A housing loan application of just over one million Rand for the erection of this hostel, was, however, rejected by the Department of Community Development on the grounds of high costs and rentals. Further representations are to be made.

3. Civic Centre - Jabulani.

The Post Office and Telephone Exchange building was completed in August 1966. The Post Office, known as Kwa Xuma, opened on the 1st September 1966. The Telephone Exchange cannot operate on account of the lack of equipment. The Technical School was completed during the year under review. Plans are being prepared for the proposed police station and fire station and suitable sites are being selected for the open air amphitheatre, produce market, proposed hospitals and Magistrates Courts.

A site has been selected for the theatre and plans drawn up. Discussions are in progress with the Department of Bantu Administration on suggested standards for the buildings

4. Removal from Pimville and Rehousing of Families in Klipspruit.

As at the 30th June 1967, 1,335 families had been rehoused, and the amount of compensation paid to Pimville standholders amounted to R118,877.00.

5. Urban Bantu Council.

The Urban Bantu Council chamber is under construction and it is expected that the building will be completed by March 1968. The total cost of the chamber will be nearly R200,000.

6. Pimville Zone 1 - 665 Houses.

Dube - 105 Houses.

Emdeni - 399 Houses.

5 New schools and 48 additional classrooms at existing schools.

The above schemes have been approved but no housing funds have been allocated. Applications have been made for permission to use the Council's own Maintenance Reserve Funds to finance these projects temporarily pending an allocation of state Housing Funds.

7. Naledi Extension No. 1 - 1074 Houses.

Details of this scheme have been prepared and an application made for a housing loan to finance the project.

8. Naledi : Communal Hall.

The erection of a Communal Hall in Naledi was commenced and the hall should be ready for use shortly. The total cost of the hall is estimated to be about R57,000.

9. Senaoane - Preventive Clinic.

Negotiations are in progress for the erection and lease to the Province of a preventive clinic at Senaoane at an estimated cost of R92,000. The buildings will be let at an economic rental.

10. Tuberculosis Clinic : Senaoane

A Tuberculosis Clinic to be run by the Medical Officer of Health is to be erected in Senaoane.

B. ROUTINE WORK:

1. Population.

The total Non-European population of greater Johannesburg (i.e. inclusive of the Bantu Resettlement Board and Peri-Urban Areas) was estimated at 887,811 consisting of 773,415 Bantu, 76,331 Coloureds and 38,065 Asiatics.

Details are given on Schedule 'A'.

2. Housing.

The Council's waiting list for houses has grown to 10,131 as at the 30th June 1967. At the same time there were 64,163 houses in Soweto and Eastern Bantu Township.

Details are given on Schedule 'B'.

3. Rent.

Rent arrears are still reducing as can be seen from the following table:-

4. Financial.

The cumulative capital outlay increased to R59,174,332 and the deficit on the Bantu Revenue Account was R350,447 as at the 30th June, 1967.

Details are shown on Schedule 'C'.

5. Staff.

The number of staff employed by the Department as at the 30th June, 1967, to serve the Non-European population is reflected in Schedule 'G'

6. General Amenities.

(i) Electricity.

During the year under review a further 2,231 houses have been wired for electricity bringing the total to 9,559.

(ii) Health.

The facts and figures relating to health services provided by the Council to the Bantu population are contained in the annual report of the Medical Officer of Health under whose jurisdiction these services fall.

(iii) Schools.

Up to the 30th June, 1967, 120 schools had been built. These are attended by 90,414 pupils.

(iv) Sewerage and Stormwater.

The sewered area of Soweto is at present 10,198 acres with 347 miles of sewers laid. A total of 27 miles of stormwater drains has been constructed to date.

(v) Water Supply.

Another 4.8 miles of mains were laid bringing the total to 420.6 miles. Metered leads now total 4,030 and unmetered leads 68,018.

(vi) Roads.

A further 9.88 miles were constructed during the period under review bringing the total mileage of roads to 413 miles.

7. Information and Research Branch.

The Research Section of this Branch has, apart from routine work on the collation and compilation of statistics, completed two major surveys. The first was "The Cultural Change in Soweto" and the second a "Housing Survey - Soweto".

The daily tours of Soweto are becoming more popular every year and the Information Section is kept busy by the demand for these tours. During the year 4,044 visitors, mostly from overseas, have been taken through the Bantu residential areas.

The Departmental brochure "Happy Living" was in such demand that it was necessary to bring it up-to-date and reprint.

8. Inspectorate.

The Inspectorate staff establishment for the period under review was a Chief Inspector and his Assistant, 10 Senior Inspectors, 56 European Inspectors and 12 Bantu Inspectors.

3,884 Europeans and 48,097 Bantu were prosecuted. The majority of the Bantu were prosecuted for remaining in the urban area for longer than 72 hours without the necessary permit (19,983) and for having no valid documents (18,785).

The Inspectorate carried out 6,680 investigations for the Treasury Branch in respect of outstanding Services Levy and Registration fees and R106,281 was recovered.

The documents of 161,377 Bantu referred to the Inspectorate by the Municipal Labour Branch and during inspections of premises were scrutinised.

Inspections of servants' quarters were conducted at 709 private residential and licensed premises and 48 Bantu were found being accommodated unlawfully.

During the period under review 6,263 licences to accommodate more than one servant have been approved, involving 5,132 men and 3,299 women.

9. Recreation and Community Services Branch.

This branch is controlled by a Chief Officer, his Assistant and a staff of 55 Europeans and 635 Non-Europeans.

(i) Bantu Recreation Section.

(a) School Leagues.

The staff assisted in organising the recreation programme for 157 schools and during school holidays organised football, volleyball, tennis, basketball and other games and thus assisted in keeping the children off the streets.

(b) Adult Football Leagues.

The Department provides grounds for football associations to run their amateur and professional leagues during the weekends. No less than 825 teams competed in the various leagues.

(c) Cycling and Athletics.

Technical assistance was given to the Athletic and Cycling Associations and meetings organised at Orlando, Moroka/Jabavu and Elkah stadia. The annual cycle race from Potchefstroom to Johannesburg was also organised.

(d) Evening Clubs for Adults.

Facilities were provided at 23 evening clubs where the staff assisted with and supervised boxing, wrestling, judo, weight-lifting and body-building activities.

(e) Swimming Pools.

Attendance figures at the Bantu pools for the past swimming season - 1st September, 1966, to 31st March, 1967, were as follows:-

(f) Recreation Facilities.

The facilities provided by the Department are reflected in Schedule 'D'.

(ii) Cinema Section.

This section gave 1,124 shows at 19 venues during the period under review.

In addition shows were given at schools and clubs for fund-raising purposes.

(iii) Horticultural Section.

Extensive improvements were made to the garden of indigenous plants at the Oppenheimer Tower. An Aloe collection is being assembled and typical Bantu huts are being erected to show the contrast between traditional and urban housing. The first to be completed was a Zulu "beehive" hut.

The new nursery at Emdeni was cleared and terraced and will be brought into full operation in the ensuing year.

The extra nine holes of the golf course at Mofolo were levelled and greens and tees shaped. Play will be possible during the coming summer.

A well-supported garden competition was held in Mofolo-North where the Horticultural Section assisted in organising and judging.

(iv) Rehabilitation and Youth Services Section:

(a) Youth Clubs.

26 Youth Clubs with a total enrolment of 3,078 and an average attendance of 1,251 per session were catered for by this section. Club activities included indoor and outdoor games, softball, volleyball, table-tennis, drama, dancing, art and handwork.

Over 300 members camped for two weeks at the coast. In July 1966, the camp was at Lourenco Marques under canvas at Polana Beach. In January 1967 the camp was at East London.

All clubs attended picnics and Christmas parties during the year.

(b) Play Centres.

This section administered 4 play centres with a total enrolment of 432.

(c) Women's Clubs.

Ten clubs with a total enrolment of 231 and an average weekly attendance of 79, were attended mainly by married women who wished to improve their knowledge of housekeeping.

(d) Orlando Sheltered Workshop.

The period under review was the busiest and there were the most changes in the workshop's history. Due to lack of support, the cobbling section was closed down. The netting section has expanded and the workshop now houses a packaging section.

An increasing number of orders for weaving was received and three large sales were held.

There were 95 workers on the roll and the average daily attendance was 76.

(v) Cultural Section.

(a) Music Appreciation Groups.

These groups consisted of 189 members of whom 32 entered for the various music examinations of the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music as well as the Music Department of the University of South Africa.

(b) Orchestra.

The orchestra is composed of the Soweto Youth Orchestra consisting of 9 violin players, 12 recorder players and one piano player and the Jubilee Chamber Orchestra consisting of 2 first violins, 2 violas, 1 cello, 1 flute and 1 clarinet.

The orchestra has accompanied choirs and also performed for the Mayor during the opening ceremony of the Johannesburg Bantu Music Festival.

(c) Art Classes.

During the year 250 pupils received tuition in the basic knowledge of art and sculpture.

(d) Choir.

The choir is a mixed chamber choir of 12 voices that has recently been formed consisting of 3 sopranos, 3 contraltos, 3 tenors and 3 basses.

(e) Children's Music Classes.

206 Children attended music, theory, recorder, singing and percussion band classes.

(f) Concerts.

During the period under review 3 symphony concerts were held at Uncle Tom's Hall, 4 choral concerts at Mofolo Hall and 1 performance of carols at Orlando East Hall.

(vi) Brass Bands Section.

The five brass bands gave 438 performances at outdoor concerts, compounds, hospitals and hostels. They also performed at police drill competitions and at special athletic meetings, funerals and religious services.

The annual bands competition was held in September, 1966.

(vii) Welfare Section.

(a) Average Monthly Case Load.

During the year 1,234 new cases were opened and 1,164 cases closed. This brought the case load to 1,380 in the general and 692 in the Tuberculosis Section.

Each worker made an average of 186 contacts and wrote 6 full reports and 25 progress reports per month.

(b) Poor Relief.

During the year 832 families received food parcels and 998 families received cash grants.

(c) Current Rents.

Of the 299 families at present receiving assistance with current rent to the amount of R1,211 per month 213 families are living in sub-economic townships.

(d) Arrear Rents.

No applications for remission of arrear rents were made during the year due to the co-operation of the Rent Section in bringing their cases to this section's notice before arrear rent accumulated.

(e) N.E.A.D. Welfare Fund.

An average of 245 families were assisted with clothes and blankets at an average monthly cost of R639. The higher amount spent was due to an exceptionally severe winter.

(f) Pensions.

Pensions from private firms are at present administered on behalf of 3 persons.

(g) Winter Clothing Appeal (Operation Snowball).

About three truckloads of clothes and blankets were donated by the public and distributed by the Salvation Army, the Tuberculosis Section of the Peri-Urban Areas Board and this Section.

(h) Tuberculosis Work.

An average of 212 families were assisted with rent every month while 511 families received cash grants during the year to the amount of R23,119.

10. Municipal Labour Branch.

(i) Workseekers.

(a) Men.

There was a noteworthy decrease in the number of adult men registering for employment which may be attributed to the stabilisation of the economic situation in that workers endeavoured to retain their employment.

During the year 129,232 men registered compared with 162,485 in the previous year.

(b) Women.

The number of women registering for employment was virtually the same as in the previous year, viz. 38,201 in 1966/67 and 38,599 in 1965/66.

(ii) In Employment.

As at the 30th June, 1967 there were 245,971 males and 112,512 females in employment. The number of unemployed males was 3,646 representing 1.48% of the total male labour force.

(iii) Supply and Demand.

In categories of labour which were in short supply the shortages were reduced because of an increase in the number of workers introduced from other areas. Women workers continue to show a reluctance to accept domestic employment in those cases where they are required to sleep on the employer's premises.

(iv) Juveniles.

An increase in the number of juveniles successfully placed in employment was primarily due to the fact that juveniles are becoming increasingly aware of the facilities that the Department offers.

Details of workseekers are reflected in Schedule 'E'.

11. Liquor Distribution Branch.

(i) Liquor Section.

This section continued to operate with 13 bottle stores and 3 bar lounges.

During the year under review, as a result of some private liquor licenses reducing their price of spirits and malt to Bantu customers, sales dropped from R3,583,850 in 1965/1966 to R2,278,485 in 1966/1967. Liquor Dealers price reductions have an undesirable effect in that illicit liquor dealers are able to charge prices which undercut those in the Council's outlets. As a result the number of known shebeens has more than doubled.

The percentage volume sales of the type of liquor purchased by Bantu from Bottle Stores in Soweto is reflected in Schedule 'F'.

(ii) Bantu Beer Section.

Sales of Bantu beer continued to increase mainly owing to the heavy demand for this product in packaged form sold from bottle stores in the City

and Suburbs. For the year ended 30th June 1967 the total sales were 29,410,900 gallons which was 2,172,197 gallons more than the previous year.

12. Coloured and Asiatic Division.

(1) Housing.

The acute housing shortage for the Coloured community continues and as at the 30th June 1967 stood at approximately 1500 housing units.

However, after a loan of R2,693,749 had been obtained a comprehensive housing scheme comprising of 1,074 flats in Newclare and Westlea is now in the course of construction. As at the 30th June 1967, 198 flats were completed and it is anticipated that the scheme will be completed by October 1968.

(2) Future Housing Schemes.

(1) Riverlea.

(a) Houses for home-ownership

Approval has been received from the State for the building of 90 economic houses for home-ownership. These will not be timber-framed as were the previous 108 houses. Conventional material is freely available and no particular advantage can be gained by timber-frame construction. As soon as funds are available a start will be made.

(b) Flats for letting purposes.

A scheme has already been formulated and approval of the State obtained for the erection of 134 flats in multi-storeyed buildings to be erected on three different sites in Riverlea. As soon as funds are available a start will be made.

(c) Acquisition of land for further development at Riverlea.

Negotiations are proceeding to obtain the release of land from the Mining Commissioner to enable the Council to plan further extensions to its housing schemes at

(a) Riverlea. The type of housing will depend on the nature of the terrain and requirements necessitated by mining operations.

(d) Sales of land for individual house-building purposes.

As soon as Riverlea is proclaimed stands will be released for sale as a first step of 20 sites will be made available.

(e) Riverlea Ext. No. 2.

The large area of land which is bounded by Commando Road and Industria and straddling the Main Reef Road is being laid-out as a township to provide approximately 700 housing units. However, delay in finalising the route of an important freeway are holding up these operations at the present time.

(ii) Westbury.

Arrangements are being made for an extension of the existing Westbury flat/housing scheme, and as soon as approval is obtained from the State and money made available a start will be made on the erection of 206 flats in a series of multi-storeyed buildings.

(iii) Western Township.

The whole of Western Township will be redeveloped. Progress will depend on the speed with which it is possible to resettle existing tenants. The type of development will include flats, houses for selling and letting, and for the sale of stands for a self-builder scheme.

(iv) Olifantsvlei.

Planning is taking place for the development of approximately 156 acres of land to the east of Nancefield where it is hoped to build approximately 1,300 housing units of various types. Progress is being hampered by the

inability of the State Department of Community Development to finalise its own planning of the adjoining Nancefield area.

(3) Newclare Civic Centre.

An elaborate civic centre is being planned for Newclare and will include a "City Hall" for the Coloured community, theatre, council chamber, committee rooms, community centre, clinic, library, post office, government buildings, shops, flats, offices, banks building societies, consulting rooms etc. The design and lay-out of this centre will be of a high standard and should do much to further the interests of the Coloured community. This project, when complete, will probably cost in the region of R8,000,000 to R10,000,000.

(4) Incorporation of New Areas.

The Council is presently considering the incorporation of areas of land to the south/west of the City where it might be possible to plan for housing projects for the Coloureds as well as for essential amenities and institutions.

(5) Coloured Management Committee.

During the period under review the voters' roll was completed, a Revision Court sat and the final roll was accepted. The roll consists of the following persons:-

An election will be held on the 29th November 1967.

(6) New Clinic and Library.

On 29th April 1967 the new clinic and library at Bosmont was officially opened by the Mayor. This building was erected at a cost of R20,000.

(7) Rent Arrears.

As at 30th June 1966 the total arrears were R22,086.91. The total monthly debit was R38,319.00.

As at the end of June 1967 the total arrears were R6,561.17 and the total debit was R39,502.85 showing a reduction of arrears of R15,425.74.

(13) Community Services and Recreation.

(a) Community Services.

(i) A monthly average of 600 families were assisted with advice and guidance. 267 rent grants and 186 special grants were made to deserving needy families. An average number of 27 Tuberculosis cases per month were assisted with food and rent.

(ii) Cultural Development.

Ballet classes were run in the various townships. An annual Eisteddfod was held. Several major cultural functions (symphony concerts and PACT productions) were organised.

(iii) Recreational Activities.

These included a full-scale Recreation Centre in Western Township, catering for all age-groups. Sewing clubs for women, and old folks clubs were organised in each township. Club membership totalled over 1,300 persons.

(b) Recreation.

(i) School Leagues.

The sports organiser assisted in organising football, basketball, cricket and athletics for 31 schools during the year.

(ii) Football.

Football was the most popular sport and all grounds were used to capacity by the 158 teams.

(iii) Rugby.

This sport is becoming more popular. The number of teams have now increased to 24.

(iv) Tennis.

20 teams competed for various trophies. Tennis clinics operated for the benefit of children.

(v) Hockey.

There were 25 Women's Hockey teams competing in the league. The Transvaal team chosen from these teams are the holders of the National trophy.

(vi) Cricket.

Besides club games every weekend, games against other provinces were arranged.

(vii) Recreational Facilities.

The recreational facilities provided for the Coloured community consist of:-

- 1 stadium
- 2 enclosed fields
- 20 sports fields
- 6 children's playgrounds
- 17 tennis courts
- 13 change rooms
- 2 swimming pools
- 1 bowling green
- 1 athletic track
- 13 netball courts.

(viii) Swimming.

Attendance figures at the two pools during the year were as follows :-

- Newclare - 67,448
- Coronationville - 55,553

(9) Staff.

The staff of the Coloured and Asiatic Division consists of 18 Europeans and 149 Coloureds.
