I have been instructed by my Executive to bring to your attention a very serious incident thich occured at the C.O.P. on Saturday, 25 th June, 1955 at approximately 4 p. .m.

Our Secretary, Mr. Suliman Bssakjee was assaulted by Mr. Robert Resh.

To gibe you a brief outline of what took place before the assault. A female volunteer from S.A.C.P.O, stopped a certain person as he was entering and asked for a delegate's card. Mr. Resh took this person in and when this volunteer protested, pushed her aside, and slapped her. Mr. Bssakjee standing nearby protested that it was incorrect for Mr. Resh to have acted as he did in view of the fact that the S.A.C.P.O., member was an official volunteer and a female at that. Mr. Resh ignored the protestantlone and violently struck Mr. Essakjee.

My Executive views the above incident with great concern as Mr. Resh has :-

1. Violated the disciplinary code in having admited a person without first reporting him at the credentials table.
2. Assaulted an important member and official of the Transvaal Indian Youth congress. If there were any differences, these could have been settled in a peacepul manner later on, and if $\mathrm{V} / \mathrm{r}$. Essakjee had acted incorrectly her could have been reported to the Youth Congress for disciplinary action.
