UNION'S WAR MEMORIAL

FUND FOR THE PROMOTION OF HEALTH

DECISION IN PRETORIA

SOUTH AFRICA'S national war memorial, states an announcement issued in Pretoria to-day, will take the form of a health foundation aimed at promoting the health of the people of the Union of South Africa. An appeal will be launched on a national basis.

Following a series of consultations between the Government and the national war memorial interim committee, which came into being at the request of the men "up north," where the project of a living war memorial was initiated, the Ministry of Health issued the following statement:—

TROOPS' DESIRE

"It is the express desire of the fighting forces themselves that the memorial commemorative of the part played by South Africa in the second world war shall assist in the realisation of fundamental human rights for all races.

"Not the least among these, and the one which in particular has made its appeal to the soldiers of the Union, is the right to health and all that the modern conception of this term connotes.

"It has therefore been decided, with the approval of the Government, that the national war memorial shall be of a living character and shall make a permanent and substantial contribution to the improvement of the health of the needy among all sections of the community, with special regard to the non-European.

"The realisation in human life of the modern concept of health' implies the provision not only of curative and preventive services, for which the Government (including the Provinces) is already responsible, but also of health promotive services.

"The scope of the latter is very wide, embracing such matters as nutrition, health education, research into the requisites for individual and community health, and the training of personnel for the practice of social medicine.

"It is therefore in the sphere of promotive health services that the National War Memorial Fund can most usefully supplement the services to be provided by the State.

FIVE PURPOSES

"Accordingly it has been agreed that the National War Memorial shall be known as the National War Memorial Health Foundation and that its purpose shall be as follows:—

"1. To establish an institute for nutritional research to determine adequate nutritional standards for all sections of the population, with special regard to the needs of the non-European, and to promote measures for the effective application of scientific knowledge upon health matters.

"2. To assist in the education of all sections of the population in sound food habits and other matters related to personal and community health.

"3. To provide scholarships and grants-in-aid for research in all fields of inquiry related to the promotion of health and prevention of disease, with special reference to the health problems peculiar to South Africa.

"4. To provide bursaries for the training of personnel, particularly non-European, for the national health service.

"5. To support any other projects which, in the opinion of the trustees, will promote the health of the people of the Union of South Africa.

"The National War Memorial interim committee in consultation with other interested organisations, is proceeding with plans for the launching of the appeal on a national basis."

Conference in Cape Town

JOHANNESBURG, Fri. — The interim committee of the National War Memorial Fund has arranged a conference of national bodies in Cape Town on March 5 for the purpose of launching the National War Memorial Health Foundation. All interested bodies are invited by the committee to send two delegates each to this conference.

Organisations wishing to receive official invitations and further information are asked to communicate with the secretary, P.O. Box 8446, Johannesburg.

Details about the meeting place and the time of the meeting will be announced as soon as arrangements have been completed.

BROAD REPRESENTATION

It is hoped to have full representation of national war fund organisations and bodies interested in health, nutrition and education. Organisations which cannot send representatives to Cape Town are asked to appoint representatives resident in the Cape, so that the representation at the conference may be as broad as possible.

The purpose of the conference is to set up a national organisation for the launching of the appeal for funds for the National War Memorial Health Foundation, on the basis laid down in the official statement by the Ministry of Health.

A national committee will be appointed and arrangements will be made for the setting up of provincial and local committees, and a report from the technical sub-committee on the way in which the health foundation can operate will be considered. —

FORMULA FOR SUBMISSION TO MINISTER OF HEALTH:

The Chairman submitted a draft formula drawn up by the drafting committee in the light of discussions which had taken place at the meeting held on 19th December.

Col. Sayer expressed the fear that we had departed from the original objects of the men Up North. Mr. Carnesson reminded the committee that the men Up North had meant this Memorial to be a gesture to the Non-European. Mr. Knoetze stated that he had found in his work in the Air Force Units that the men preferred a wider scheme and not one confined to the Non-Europeans. He felt that the average soldier would approve of the present conception of a Health Foundation with the objects as at present envisaged. Dr. Friedman stated that he felt that the present conception of a War Memorial was a tremendous advance on anything that had taken place after the last war.

After certain amendments, the formula was accepted in the following terms:

"Recognising the fundamental human rights of all races in the Union of South Africa, irrespective of colour, and to implement the soldiers proposals that practical recognition of these rights be embodied in a National War Memorial of a living character, which shall make a substantial contribution to the improvement of the health of the needy of all sections of the community, with special regard to the non-European:

The National War Memorial shall be known as

THE NATIONAL WAR MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION which shall have the following objects:-

1. To establish an Institute for Nutritional Research to secure adequate nutritional standards for all sections of the population with special regard to the needs of the Non-European, and to promote measures for carrying into effect scientific knowledge upon health matters.

2. To assist in the education of all sections of the population in sound food habits and other aspects of personal and social health.
3. To provide scholarships and grants-in-aid for research in all fields of enquiry related to the promotion of health and prevention of disease, with special reference to the health problems peculiar to South Africa.
4. To provide bursaries for the training of personnel, particularly non-European, for the National Health Service.
5. Such other objects, not encroaching upon the responsibilities of the State, which in the opinion of the Trustees will raise the health standards of the community."

It was AGREED that this formula be submitted to the Minister of Health as soon as possible.

The meeting closed at 12 noon.


Dear Sir,

MEMORANDUM OF ASSOCIATION

OF

THE NATIONAL WAR MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION

1. The name of the Association is "THE NATIONAL WAR MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION", and it is hereinafter referred to as "THE MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION" or "THE FOUNDATION".

2. The MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION is established as a national tribute by a grateful people to those men and women of the Union of South Africa who gave their lives or their health in the service of their country's cause in the Second World War, 1939 - 1945, and as a means of commemorating their names and deeds.

The origin of the FOUNDATION and its intended function were publicly expressed, and are recorded for historical purposes in this Memorandum, in the words of the following statement :-

"It is the express desire of the fighting

- forces -

forces themselves that the memorial commemorative of the part played by the Union of South Africa in the second world war shall assist in the realisation of fundamental human rights for all races.

"Not the least among these, and the one which in particular has made its appeal to the soldiers of the Union, is the right to health and all that the modern conception of this term connotes.

"It has therefore been decided, with the approval of the Government, that the national war memorial shall be of a living character and shall make a permanent and substantial contribution to the improvement of the health of the needy among all sections of the community, with special regard to the non-European.

"The realisation in human life of the modern concept of 'health' implies the provision not only of curative and preventive services, for which the Government (including the Provinces) is already responsible, but also of health promotive services.

"The scope of the latter is very wide, embracing such matters as nutrition, health education, research into the requisites for individual and community health, and the training of personnel for the practice of social medicine.

"It is therefore in the sphere of promotive health services that the National War Memorial can most usefully supplement the services to be provided by the State."

3. The fundamental purpose of "THE MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION" is to promote good health of all sections of the population of the Union of South Africa, with special regard to the non-European, and the particular field in which it shall make its contribution is that of "Promotive Health Services".

The words "with special regard to the non-European" contained in this Clause shall be interpreted as laying upon the Board of Trustees and the

Council to be established in terms of the accompanying Articles of Association of THE FOUNDATION, a duty to determine its programme of action and the proportion of expenditure to be allotted to its various projects in the light of the requirements of the non-European population relative to those of the European population and with due regard to the urgent needs indicated in the extracts from official reports set out in Schedule A to this Memorandum.

4. The specific objects of THE MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION (designed as the means of giving practical effect to its fundamental purpose) are:-

- (a) To investigate the nutritional and other health needs of the people and the best means of securing the satisfaction of these needs.
- (b) To provide scholarships and grants-in-aid for research in all fields of enquiry related to the promotion of health and the prevention of disease, with special reference to health problems peculiar to South Africa.
- (c) To promote, by effective application of scientific knowledge, the satisfaction of the nutritional and health needs of the people.
- (d) To assist in the education of all sections of the population in sound food habits and other matters related to personal and community health.

(e) To provide bursaries for the training of personnel, particularly non-Europeans, in medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, mothercraft, hygiene, physical education and other health services.

(f) To promote and give financial assistance to projects favourable to the healthy growth and development of the people.

(g) To do all such other things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of its fundamental purpose or to the furtherance of the foregoing specific objects or any of them.

5. THE MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION shall have all such powers as are necessary or incidental to the carrying out of its objects and in particular, without limiting the generality of the aforementioned, the following powers :-

(a) To establish a Fund for the endowment of THE FOUNDATION, and for this purpose to set up fund-raising committees, employ officials and take such other steps by personal or written appeals, public meetings or otherwise as may from time to time be deemed expedient.

(b) To take or accept moneys, funds, securities, donations, gifts, bequests and

- inheritances -

inheritances, whether conditionally or unconditionally, for the purposes of THE FOUNDATION.

(c) To purchase, take on lease or in exchange, hire or otherwise acquire, any movable or immovable property, buildings, rights or privileges, which may be considered necessary or convenient for the realisation of its objects.

(d) To erect, maintain, improve, alter, repair and equip any buildings or erections for its purposes.

(e) To purchase, establish, equip and administer playing fields, sports grounds and recreational centres, and to provide facilities for games, sports, physical training, and culture, recreation and entertainment.

(f) To determine the conditions under which scholarships, research grants and bursaries shall be given, to set aside moneys and establish funds therefor.

(g) To print and publish or cause to be printed and published any newspapers, periodicals, books, leaflets or other literature that may be desirable for the promotion of its objects.

(h) To form a library or make a collection of books, periodicals, publications, films, photographs, drawings and illustrations useful

for promoting, the educational work of the FOUNDATION and for assisting students and research workers.

(i) To hold or promote exhibitions, demonstrations, competitions, discussions and lectures as part of the educational work of THE FOUNDATION.

(j) To co-operate with voluntary organisations and bodies engaged in activities calculated to promote good health.

(k) To make representations to Government Departments or to Provincial, Divisional, Municipal, District, Rural, Local or Educational Authorities or to Industrial Conciliation Councils and Boards, Wage Boards, Employees' and Employers' Organisations, or generally to any body whose decisions or activities affect the health of the people of South Africa and to enter, into arrangements with any such body.

(l) To apply for, promote, obtain or assist in applying for, promoting and obtaining any Act of Parliament, Provincial Ordinance, or other authority, calculated to protect or further the objects of THE FOUNDATION or any of them, and to oppose any legislation (Parliamentary or otherwise) proceedings or applications adversely affecting them.

(m) To establish a Council, a Board of Trustees, Committees, Liaison Committees and Branches,

and to appoint representatives for carrying out the objects and functions of THE FOUNDATION.

(n) To admit any persons, associations, societies, firms or bodies of persons, to be members of or associates of THE FOUNDATION upon such terms as may be determined.

(o) To establish the Headquarters of THE FOUNDATION in such province as may be determined from time to time.

(p) To lend and invest its moneys from time to time on mortgage or such other security as may be deemed fit and to purchase stocks, shares, securities, bonds and debentures.

(q) To sell, exchange, donate, lease, mortgage, pledge, or otherwise deal with all or any of its assets.

(r) From time to time to borrow, by way of overdraft or loan or otherwise and if necessary to pledge or mortgage all or any of its assets as security for such borrowing.

(s) To open Banking Accounts in its name and to operate the accounts in such manner as may be determined from time to time.

(t) To draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute and issue cheques, promissory notes, bills of exchange or other negotiable or transferable instruments.

- (u) To give -

(u) To give guarantees or suretyships for the performance of any contract or obligation by any person, company or association.

(v) To pay out of the Funds of THE FOUNDATION all costs, charges and expenses preliminary and incidental to its promotion, formation, establishment and registration.

(w) To employ such officers, staff and servants, and at such remuneration, as may be expedient, and to establish and support superannuation, pension and/or other funds for the benefit of employees, and to provide benefits for such employees, their widows, children and dependents.

The powers set forth in paragraphs (a) to (w) of this Clause shall be regarded as subsidiary objects.

6. The registered office of the Memorial Health Foundation will be situate in the Transvaal Province.

7. (a) The liability of the members is limited.

(b) Each member undertakes to contribute to the assets of THE MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION in the event of its being wound up while he is a member or within one year afterward, for payment of its debts and liabilities contracted before he ceases to be a member, and of the costs,

charges and expenses of the winding up and for the adjustments of the rights of the contributors amongst themselves, such amount as may be required therefor, but not exceeding the sum of one pound (£1).

8. The income and property of THE MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION from whatever source derived, shall be applied solely towards the promotion of its objects as set forth in this Memorandum of Association, and no portion thereof shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly, by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise howsoever, by way of profit, to the members; provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the payment in good faith of remuneration to any officers or servants of THE FOUNDATION or to any member in return for any services actually rendered to it, or expenses incurred on its behalf or in its service.

9. If upon the winding up or dissolution of THE MEMORIAL HEALTH FOUNDATION there remains, after satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities, any property whatsoever, the same shall not be paid to or distributed amongst the members, but shall be given or transferred to some other institution or institutions having objects similar to the objects of THE FOUNDATION to be determined by its members at or before the time of dissolution, and in default thereof by the Minister of Justice.
