THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE A.N.C. KIMBERLEY BRANCH. (11) First of all the local branch would like to apologise for forwarding its report so late. The branch has achieved some success during this year and also failures. From on set our task was made more difficult by lack of cohesion and touch with the provincial secretary. After the conference at Bloemfontein the branch formed women's league and the youth league. Since the inception of these auxiliary bodies the work of the branch progressed tremendously Kimberley being a place of many surprises; sometimes the spirit is so high and sometimes very low. We were able to muster about 500 women to interview the Native Commissioner about passes for African women to register their protest against passes being extended to them on 4 June 1956; and yet on the 9 August a month later could only manage to obtain not even half the number. The reason is, two of our executive members were summarily dismissed from their employment namely Mr A. CHEIE who has since left to Maseru and Mr P. Boikanyo. They both worked for same firm. We tried hard to organise economic boycott of ~~the~~ firm, which really never functioned. It failed because the shopkeepers were not in favour of it. At present we are preparing ourselves to fight a case of one of our members; who told to leave because he is born in Bulawayo. Something that adds to host of troubles is, we have not a sympathetic lawyer here.

FREEDOM CHARTER

THE freedom charter is well received in our area. Due to control of meeting we are tight down - to - a one meeting per month; whenever we have such meeting the freedom charter is explained to the masses.

DRAFT CONSTITUTION

The branch has nothing drastic to criticise from the draft constitution; however the delegates would like a few points to be explained at the conference.

THE ACTIVITIES OF THE BRANCH.

The branch holds executive committee meeting once every week; and once a month joint meeting of the auxiliary bodies to co-ordinate the work of the branch. For our organisational work we have adopted the famous 5-plan and we are beginning to reap the fruits of it. The outlying districts like Warrenton, Barkly West and Schmidtsdrift are also approached. In so much that they had sent representatives to Pretoria.

Membership - have sent the treasurer fees for membership of 120 members. I hope to send some more very soon.
