Medical Report

1934.

THE third Annual Report of the Princess Alice Nursing Home must needs record a number of changes in the Staff.

Dr. S. E. Rolfe resigned at the end of September, after nearly two years as Medical Officer, during which time the work increased considerably.

Miss Bayes, our voluntary masseuse, left for England to continue her training in the Electrical Department at Guy's Hospital, London. We wish her every success, and hope to see her on her return.

Nurse Esther Leoto, the nurse at the Klipspruit Clinic, passed away at the Nursing Home in July. Her death was a tremendous loss to the Home and to all the patients at Nancefield. Nurse Esther started her work in the Medical Mission under Dr. Mary Tugman and was most loyal to all under whom she worked. Hers was a truly Christian life and she is sadly missed by us all. God grant her rest.

The Matron, Miss E. C. Harris, gave three months' notice of her intention to leave at the end of January. The patients and staff will miss her very much, as she has endeared herself to all during her work at the Home.

The new Ward in memory of Dr. Mary Tugman and her mother has been completed. It holds about 40 cots and is indeed a fitting memorial to both those splendid women who did so much for the Bantu babies. The ward was blessed by the Lord Bishop of Johannesburg as one of his first duties in this country. That was a happy day as it alleviated the by no means ideal conditions of having adults and babies in one ward, and left room for more adult beds. We are grateful to our many friends who presented us with cots and equipment for the new Ward.

There have been a number of interesting cases during the year, and we have broken, to a large extent, the prejudice of mothers against letting their babies come into the Home. Most mothers in Klipspruit allow their babies to come in at once if it is considered necessary, but in Sophiatown the fact that the Doctor is on the spot seems to be a stumbling block. I often see babies that should be admitted but whose mothers will not let them, and after a few days rush them in with "Please, Doctor, do something"—a plea that is heartrending. However, in a number of seemingly hopeless cases we have had an answer to our prayers and the babies have gone home well and happy, with very grateful parents.

Mrs. Palmer and Mrs. Alexander returned to us in October and have been running the Bantu Baby Clinics in Sophiatown and Klipspruit since. Matron Harris started a Baby Clinic for coloured babies in Sophiatown, which has been a great success. Mrs. J. B. Shortt kindly helped in the Out-patients' Department at the beginning of the year, and also at the Home on Matron's day off. Miss Molly Beaumont, one of the Good Companions, has been a very great help to me in Out-patients, and her cherry presence has been a tonic to us all.

The Revd. and Mrs. Mortimer were transferred to Zeerust and we have missed them both. We welcome Father Raynes, Father Downton and Father Trelawny-Ross of the Community of the Resurrection, who took over the Mission work in the district in December. They are taking a great interest in the spiritual welfare of the Nursing Home.

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Mrs. Laing has started the Dental Clinic on Tuesday mornings, which has been much appreciated and is becoming increasingly popular.

A very special "thank you" to Mrs. Fergusson, who resigned from the arduous task of voluntary Secretary and Treasurer, but who still has time to help and advise us on all matters concerning the Home; and to Miss Kathleen Hill, who has taken over the work as Secretary and Treasurer since Mrs. Fergusson's resignation, as well as all her duties in the Diocesan Office.

Chairman's Report.

T has been a year of change, but not of decay, God be praised. Development has been the outstanding feature, though there have been several changes.

The chief event has been the opening of the new Ward, the Tugman Memorial. Gradually we came to the conclusion that the best form this memorial could take would be a Children's Ward, and with the hearty concurrence of the English subscribers and our late Bishop, we decided to go ahead with this ward. Dr. Mullins and our own Doctor Ethel Rolfe were able to get the support of the M.O.H. Johannesburg in their contention that this would most meet the needs of the African people. There is but little provision for sick babies, and none for a Mothercraft Training Centre. Our hope and ideal are to make our Home such a centre, and to this end the new Ward is built to accommodate about 40 children. We were able to arrange for such a large ward by the good offices of Dr. H. R. Mullins, who gave much time and trouble getting material and subscriptions from many friends, especially Old Andreans (Grahamstown). Thus, with £446 we have secured a fine roomy Ward ; many cots were given by various friends; and it is a pleasure to see so good a Memorial, bearing the honoured names of Madeleine and Mary Tugman.

The changes in the workers began with the withdrawal of Dr. Rolfe, who so gallantly came to our help in July 1933. All along she had stipulated that she was only a locum, and in September last she gave up her work. A mere man can only wonder how she did it all, for it was not easy to take over after the departure of Dr. Ianet Robertson; moreover her husband and her home in a busy parish demanded much of her time. She had put us still further in her debt by encouraging a young South African medical student to be keen on Native work, so that, when she retired, the Committee felt justified in offering the post of Resident Doctor to Dr. Lylie Chapman. The latter accepted the offer and has been living in the Home since last October. We rejoice in that our Church on the spot has produced its own medical missionary Doctor. The next change was caused by the resignation of Mrs. Fergusson, our good Secretary and Treasurer since the Home began its existence. Her voluntary work has been beyond praise, and the Home owes very much to her unceasing and skilled labour. Her work is now being done by Miss Kathleen Hill of the Diocesan Office, mostly out of office hours, but the time draws near when we shall have to engage,

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at a salary, some keen churchwoman who will undertake all this work. We are most grateful to Miss Hill for carrying on for us.

At the end of October Matron Harris resigned, feeling unequal to cope with all the extra work, and knowing that we must have a matron with the necessary qualifications for a Training Centre. So far we have not found the right woman to take over the Matronship.

Once again it is our duty to record our gratitude for many generous grants from the Mining Houses and from many friends. The Street Collection brought a record sum, and for this we were much indebted to Dr. Rolfe for her most thorough organisation. We are very grateful to our Honorary Auditors, Messrs. Douglas, Low & Co., to the staff of "Ekutuleni" for their constant encouragement and help, and to all the numerous friends and helpers who have stood by us and served their Lord by caring for this Work of Mercy.

Treasurer's Report.

AS I have held the position of Treasurer to the Nursing Home for only three months, it would have been well nigh impossible to have presented a suitable report, had it not been for the ever ready help given by Mrs. Fergusson, the late Treasurer.

Donations. The donations received total £952 10s. od. in cash and the value of gifts in kind which we have received is £76 2s. 6d. The cash donations are £7 7s. 6d. less than for the year 1933, and the gifts in kind show an increase of £41 6s. od. Thanks to the organisation of Dr. Ethel Rolfe, her many helpers from the parish of St. Patrick, Malvern, and the very many willing collectors (and in a certain measure to the improvement in prevailing economic conditions), the Street Collection which was held in November amounted to £309 7s. od., a considerable increase on the previous year's figures. During the year we received nearly £60 through the Transvaal Missions' Office in England, donated by overseas friends. We would like to take this opportunity of thanking the two Sewing Parties (Winstead Sewing Party and the Parkview Church Sewing Party) for the very excellent help they have given us during the year; they have saved us many pounds which would have had to be spent on equipment, so that we have been most fortunate in having their help.

Patients' Fees. The Out-patients' fees from Sophiatown and Nancefield Clinics amounted to \pounds_{372} 16s. 1d., and the In-patients' fees to \pounds_{152} 7s. 6d., making a total of \pounds_{525} 3s. 7d.

In-patients. The total number of patients admitted to the Nursing Home during the year under review was 211 as against 234 for the previous year.

Maintenance. The Maintenance of the Home for 1934 averages approximately \pounds 120 per month. The new Children's Ward, which was opened in May, accounts for the slight increase as compared with the previous year.

Depreciation. An amount of \pounds 104 105. 2d. has been written off for depreciation on property.

Balance Sheet. We show a small surplus of f_{2} 16s. 9d. for the year ended 31st December, 1934.

The Madeleine & Mary Tugman Memorial—and Building Extension Fund. The new Children's Memorial Ward (mentioned fully, both by the Chairman and the Doctor) was opened at the end of May, 1934. The total cost of this memorial was $\pounds 445$ 16s. 7d.

The Nursing Home owes a great deal to the generosity of the

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Mining Houses who, in spite of the constant demands made upon them at every turn, are always ready to render us valuable financial assistance. It is with pleasure that we record the receipt of donations and subscriptions from Johannesburg Firms and also a few annual subscriptions. Many more of these last named are needed, and it is sincerely hoped that those of our friends who can, will help us by becoming annual subscribers.

In addition to the grant of $\pounds 50$ from the City of Johannesburg, we are very glad to be able to record the receipt of a grant of $\pounds 25$ from the Diocese of Johannesburg which, for the year 1935, may be increased to $\pounds 50$.

Several branches of the Church Women's Society and various Prayer Circles have been kind enough to remember us when making donations; these donations are much appreciated, also the help received from the Native Women's Societies.
