# BRIDGMAN MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.

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## Report of the Board.

**The Hospital in the Third Year of War.**—At the beginning of 1942 the Board felt obliged to take cognizance of the uncertainty of the war situation, as it then was, by taking out war risk insurance. The entire Hospital was also equipped for complete instantaneous blackout, and the nursing staff was organized and trained as a C.P.S. unit. We still carry the insurance, but do not feel that we must be “on our toes” as we did a year ago. The vastly improved situation resulting from the taking of Madagascar, the stemming of the Japanese advance in the South-West Pacific, the splendid victory of the Eighth Army in the North, the opening of a new allied front in Tunisia, the smashing victories of our Russian allies and the continued brave tenacity of our Chinese allies justifies the hope and belief that the war is moving further and further from our land.

If we need a reminder that there is a war on, we have it in the increased cost of drugs and medical supplies over 1941 of £618. Increase in the number of patients accounts for some of it, but it is mainly due to the very steep rise in the prices of essential medical supplies. Certain drugs have been unobtainable at times, and other hospital supplies are, of course, equally difficult to procure. The cost of provisions and other domestic supplies is up by £781. Salaries also show an increase of £1,267, partly due to a revision of the salary scales upward at the beginning of 1942, partly to cost-of-living allowances and partly to increased staff. Taking all these things together we have for the year 1942 an excess of expenditure over revenue of £693, in spite of the fact that nothing has been written off for depreciation, and in spite of again having received a record amount in patients' fees.

Patients' fees paid reached the remarkable figure of £5,725, an increase of £878 over 1941.

**Increased Pressure on Bed Capacity.**—The official number of beds was 58, until by special dispensation of the Health Department we were allowed to tuck in an additional 14, making a total capacity of 72. The average daily number of

adult in-patients has exceeded the official figure of 58 beds for every month of the year. The daily average has exceeded the total capacity of 72 beds in two months of the year and has nearly equalled it in six separate months. On individual days during the year there have been as many as 98 bed-patients at one time. We may glance at the present position (March, 1943) sufficiently to say that for the month of February the average daily number of adult in-patients was 83. This means, of course, that some patients have to be accommodated on mattresses on the floor. The increasing seriousness of the position has had the careful consideration of the Board. Early in the year conference was had with the Superintendent and the Secretary of the Johannesburg General Hospital, the Medical Officer of Health and a representative of the medical faculty of the University. The Board took the further step of officially informing the Provincial Secretary that this Board could accept no responsibility for providing further bed accommodation. Later the Chairman of the Board was invited to submit a memorandum on the subject of provision by the Province of a maternity hospital for non-Europeans. Opportunity was then given the Chairman and the Medical Superintendent, together with the Secretary of the Joint Council of Europeans and Africans which had supported our memorandum, to discuss the whole matter with a joint committee of the General Hospital Board and the Municipal Health Department. Subsequently the Board of the General Hospital submitted a memorandum to the Provincial Secretary, which embodied our main proposals. We are informed that the Province has agreed in principle to the erection of a 100-bed maternity hospital. We trust that it may soon be erected.

**Additional Staff.**—By the middle of the year under report it became obvious that Dr. Carlisle must be provided with a medical assistant. She deserves the highest praise for the way she has coped with both out-patient and in-patient departments, while attendances at both have steadily risen until the work has become too much for any one person. For six months the Hospital had the services of Dr. P. Fleming. Dr. Mentor has been with us during the opening months of 1943 on a similarly temporary contract.

The increasing load upon Matron Bell, who is responsible both for the management of the Hospital on the nursing and domestic side and also for the tutoring of the probationers, has made necessary the employment of an assistant matron. Sister Botha now holds that post. It has been found necessary also to employ an assistant for the office clerk and a clerk for the out-patient department. Both these posts have been filled by African women.

**Enlargement of Kitchen Facilities.**—Although the ward capacity has been increased by 22 beds since the Hospital was first erected and considerable additions have been made to both European and non-European staffs, the same kitchen and the same cooking-range has continued to serve for all the cooking, until during 1942 it became obvious that better facilities must be provided. The back verandah was enclosed and converted to be a supplementary kitchen and a second range was installed, which has greatly improved the domestic arrangements.

**Miss Rogers.**—The Board wishes to make special mention in this report of the services of Miss F. E. Rogers, who has been the Office Clerk since the Hospital was established in 1928. Miss Rogers felt that the burden was becoming too great in view of her advancing years and she resigned as from the end of February, 1943. Although the event falls within 1943 it is appropriate that it be recorded here. For nearly 15 years she has performed the duties of her office with a faithfulness and efficiency which merits the very hearty appreciation which the Board hereby expresses.

**Members of Board.**—The Board regretted the loss from its membership of Mrs. Trubshaw, who resigned on account of ill-health, and of Father Ross, whose other duties compelled him to resign. The place of Father Ross has been taken by Father Jenkins. Dr. Molema has become a member of the Board in place of Rev. S. S. Tema. Mrs. Pratt-Nickels has also been welcomed as a new member.

**Street Collection.**—The Board wishes to record its hearty thanks to Mrs. Wagstaff for her devoted and efficient labours in conducting our second street collection. The nett proceeds of £458 10s. 9d., obtained when collectors are hard to get and the public faces two or more collections per week, is evidence of the quality of her service.

**Thanks.**—The Board again records its thanks to the Honorary Consultants and other doctors who have assisted Dr. Carlisle; to Dr. Carlisle herself, and Dr. Fleming; to Matron Bell and all the Sisters, probationers and domestic staff for their faithful service and their contribution to the harmonious and efficient functioning of the Hospital through a difficult year.

We extend our hearty thanks to our Hon. Treasurer, Mr. J. Montague Pim, who has administered our finances with his usual ability and care, and to our Honorary Auditors, Messrs. Aitken & Carter.

We also thank the local and government authorities who have continued their grants and to all friends who have contributed by donations or by personal services to the success of the year's work.

The Sunday evening services have continued as usual and we thank those ministers of various churches who have conducted them, and the Rev. Henry Nawa for the Wednesday morning services at Out-Patient Department.

We do not forget our Founder, Mrs. Bridgman, through whose influence we continue to receive substantial donations from the United States. Out of her prayers the Hospital was born and in the spirit of her prayers it strives to continue to serve the African people.

We observe with interest and hope the progress of the National Health Commission and the committees on Social Security. We rejoice in the quickening interest of the public in the welfare of the African people, and we look with faith and hope for the coming of Peace and the opportunity to contribute what we may to the making of the "bright new world."

# Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent

For the Year ended 31st December, 1942.

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The year 1942 has been in no respect different to the previous one. Patients now clamour for admission and we have had to refuse certain types of cases admitted in previous years. Our beds have been full up throughout the year and almost always is the floor space strained also. The increase in the number of patients admitted to the In-Patient's Department was 636, while in the Out-Patient Department we had an increase of 3,008.

No changes occurred on the Honorary Staff during the year but on several occasions it was necessary to secure the help of Dr. Shippel and I take this opportunity of thanking him.

The examinations in Midwifery held by the South African Medical Council was taken by 23 probationers. Seventeen candidates passed this examination.

That the work of the hospital might be a little less strenuous for Matron, it was decided to obtain the services of an Assistant-Matron. This post has been filled since the middle of July.

With the enormous increase in the work of both In and Out-Patient Departments, the Board very kindly granted me an assistant from July 1st. The appointment was a short term one so that I regret to say Dr. Fleming left at the end of the year.

In spite of war conditions and the overcrowding in the hospital, all the members of the Staff have pulled their weight well during the year and I wish to thank every one of them for their support and help.

# Honorary Treasurer's Report, 1942.

For the first time for five years the annual accounts show a deficit. Expenditure exceeds Income by £693, which is caused, not by a reduction in our Income, but by various unavoidable increases in our Expenditure. The Income increased by £1,122, whereas Expenditure increased by £1,815 over 1941, largely due to the rising cost of Drugs and the bigger staff we have been compelled to employ to cope with the greater demand for the Hospital's services.

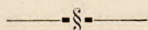
