Administration of Rents Act : Sophiatown, Martindale and Newclare.

With reference to your representations on behalf of property owners of Sophiatown at your interview with Mr. Mears here on the 4th December, 1945, concerning difficulties arising from the application of the Rents Act, I have to inform you that the matter was taken up with the Chairman of the Johannesburg Western Rent Board, who has now replied in the terms set out in the paragraphs that follow:

(a) Uniformity in Application of the Act.

The great majority of cases from the abovementioned areas dealt with by the Board arise out of the investigations of inspectors appointed in terms of the Rents Act, whose instructions are to proceed house by house and street by street until the whole area has been covered. The Chairman states that he is satisfied that no differentiation has been made between Native-and Indian-owned houses, but if any specific cases can be quoted he will take them up. Any apparent differentiation is probably due to the great preponderance of Native owners in that part of the area already dealt with.

(b) Retrospective Reduction of Rents.

When the Act was first introduced it was the practice for orders to be made in strict compliance with section 7(1)(b). for orders to be made in strict compliance with section 7(1)(b). More recently, however, in order that the lessor should not be made to suffer from any delay on the part of the Board due to pressure of work, advantage has been taken of the permissive provisions of Section 7(1) to make the order retrospective only to the first day of the month in which the order was made unless the Lessor is himself the cause of the delay. For instance, the lessor is not infrequently tardy in supplying essential information such as valuation, rates, taxes and costs of upkeep. In such cases the Board uses its discretion and may make the order date back to the date of complaint, or any date between that and date of hearing.

(c) Reduction of Rent below Commitments of Lessor.

This is an aspect of ownership which cannot concern the Rent Board, the function of which is to determine a reasonable rent in each case under consideration. It has often been found in hearing Native cases that as much as 10% interest is being paid on bonds. Such a rate is quite uneconomic but there is little that the Rent Board can do beyond encouraging publicity being given to the facts. It is proable that in many cases the landlords could obtain relief by borrowing money from reputable Building Societies on reasonable terms and redeeming the existing more onerous loans.

(d) Restriction of Sub-leasing.

This matter is not one which falls under the cognisance of the Rent Board. The difficulties which you described in this regard are appreciated, but this matter is largely bound up with

the general shortage of accommodation in Johannesburg and some time will probably pass before there can be any big scale relief of overcrowding in the abovementioned townships. Lessors drawing up new leases can of course protect themselves by inserting therein suitable provisions prohibiting sub-letting.
