Dear Sir,

On behalf of the Transvaal Executive of the African National Congress and in the name of AFRICA, we greet you and wish your branch a successful new year in our struggle for a free and democratic South Africa for all, in our life-time. We begin this year faced with vital issues which mean life and death to us as oppressed people.

Firstly, the ascendance to power of Mr Strydom, who is well known for his undemocratic and fascist utterings which immediately brands him as enemy number one of the liberatory movement and democracy, shows clearly that the forces of fascism are being consolidated and there is no doubt that the policy of Apartheid will be enforced with unprecedented fanaticism.

Secondly, the implementation early this year of Verwoerd's wicked Bantu Education which is designed to enslave the mind of the African child so as to make him become a willing slave for all time in the land of his birth,

Thirdly, the Western Areas removal scheme which will also be implemented early this year against the wishes of the African people.

It is, therefore, of the utmost importance that we should close our ranks and intensify our struggle and see that the following immediate campaigns are successful:

1. Rejection of Bantu Education.
2. Resistance to the Removal of the Western Areas.
3. The realisation of the Congress of the People.

DIRECTIVES TO BE IMPLEMENTED IMMEDIATELY.

The following directives must be implemented as from the 3rd January, 1955:

1. All present members of Congress must renew their membership by the 30th of January, 1955.
2. The collection of the 2/- special levy for our banned and deported leaders to be collected from each member of Congress and remitted to this office by the 20th February.
3. The implementation of the "1" Plan.

Other directives on the organisation of Congress will follow soon.

N.B. The joint branch executive meeting will take place at the Head Office on the 29th January, 1955.

Branch secretaries will also be required to meet on the same day after the meeting of the joint executives.

Secretaries are earnestly requested to reply to correspondence and to keep in touch with the Head Office all the time.

A member of the Transvaal Executive will visit your Executive between the 3rd and 16th January, 1955. Please notify the office immediately as to what date will suit your Executive.

Members meetings must be called to discuss the National Executive Report submitted to Conference. Please find enclosed herewith a copy of the general instructions from the National Executive for your information and study.

Dear Son of Africa,

It is with profound regret that after my transfer from Sophistown ANC Branch to the Roodepoort Branch five months ago I should report to the Head Office that as from March 31st 1955, I shall have probably left Roodepoort Area which means ending my Congress activities with the Roodepoort Branch.

The Office of the Christian Council for which I am working is leaving Roodepoort. And the Rev. A.W. Blaxall the secretary is not sure where he is going to live and of course he is carrying the work with him. Therefore he finds it difficult to invite me to go with him. This means I will have to leave Roodepoort back to Johannesburg, where I shall look for a job. I will probably stay with some relations of mine in Orlando. And of-course I am exempted.

The other thing I would like to do before I leave this place is that the 35 members of Congress shall have paid their 2/- for the banned and deported leaders of the People.

I have addressed this letter direct to you Mr. Resha, because as a volunteer I directly fall under your jurisdiction and you cannot just hear I have left the place at a very short notice. Hoping to remain a volunteer wherever I shall be.

The Annual Conference of the African National Congress held in Durban in December, 1954, decided on the withdrawal of children from all primary schools as from the 1st April, 1955, as part of its fight against Bantu Education.

The National Executive Committee of the A.N.C., which met on the 6th March, 1955, discussed the suitability of the 1st April, and adopted a resolution, of which a copy is enclosed for your information. The Executive felt that other organisations, known to be opposed to Bantu Education should be given an opportunity to participate in this vital struggle and that a basis should be sought for co-ordination of the efforts of all who have set themselves in opposition to so cruel a scheme as Bantu Education.

Your organisation is accordingly invited to attend a Conference to be held in Johannesburg from the 9th to the 11th April, 1955. A tentative programme for the Conference is enclosed, and we should welcome an early indication of the attitude of your organisation to this Conference. We may mention that a similar invitation is being addressed to other national organisations, and to churches, advisory boards, etc.

A SHORT REPORT ON BANTU EDUCATION.

The Secretary,
African National Congress Tvl.

Dear Son of Africa,

At a special conference of the African National Congress on the 13th March 1955 all branches were asked to send their reports to you. I am hereby reporting on the meeting ~~which~~ we held on the 14th March 1955, in the Edwin Field House Hall, Roodepoort, Location. This meeting was not called under the direct wing of the ANC, but the Under Save Our Children Committee.

We wish to thank the Head Office for honoring us by sending us a speaker. We would also ask the Head Office to pass our sincere thanks to Mr. B. Molewa of the Alexandra Branch. He did his work very well indeed.

This meeting was not well attended perhaps for one reason: That we had told the people that the following departments were invited: The Location Superintendent, his Manager, the Manager of the V.A.D., the S.A.P. Commandant Roodepoort District and the Special Branch of the C.I.D. Only the Location Superintendent and his Manager came before the meeting commenced and left for their own meeting.

We wish to report that over 130 people who were in the hall none has accepted the Bantu Education as half a loaf being better than no bread. Mr. B. Molewa the chief speaker and the guest of honour can bear us out, because he asked those who accepted the Bantu Education to raise their right hands and there was none in the air. But when he said those against hands were all in the air.

After all speakers I made an appeal for Freedom volunteers and ten 10 Youth registered.

RESOLUTION: The meeting resolved that a letter be written to the Native Commissioner and the chief inspector of Bantu Education, telling them to dissolve the School Boards that have formed on the ground Mr. Phatodi did not call the parents and that he told the people that only those parents with children were legible to these committees and yet in both cases there are people who have no children in the school where they have been elected. (b) That the people work hard to destroy those two established committees.

Do you think we have a good case? If you think it is a good case do you encourage us to follow it? Hoping that you will provide legal defence. Please give us a reply on this matter so that we can go on getting our evidence ready. We are not saying that we are ready for the Boycott, but will work hard to make everybody understand the situation well.

TO THE PROVINCIAL SECRETARIES:

The conference of organisations opposed to Bantu Education called by the National Executive took place at Port Elizabeth on the 9th -10th April.

Their decision is embodied in the resolution herewith enclosed. It confirmed the decision taken by the National Executive at Durban in March.

In terms of these decisions the struggle against Bantu Education began on the 1st April by an instruction to boycott all school boards and committees elected under the Bantu Education Act. The reports on this boycott as reported in the Daily Press appeared to be encouraging. In the areas where some parents had already accepted election or nomination to the school boards or school committees, branches are directed to persuade these people to resign such positions.

Although the National Executive has deferred the date for the boycotting of schools, it is quite clear that there are some areas in which the parents have carried on with the boycott of schools. In such cases it is the duty of congress not to stand and watch or take a neutral position in the affected areas, but to give what possible assistance and guidance to the parents and children; for example, the arrangements for private schools, obtaining of teachers, assisting those who are arrested by arranging legal defence.

Our problem in the head office has always been and still remains to be the complete lack of information as to the state of affairs in the different provinces and regions. This makes our task very difficult in guiding the movement. If the provincial secretaries are faced with the same situations, we ask them to visit all the branches with the assistance of the Executive members and obtain the required information. Unless this situation is attended to, we shall be faced with the chaotic position within the organisation.

In regard to the Bantu Education, the A.N.C. has decided that reports from all the provinces must reach this office not later than the 21st May.

N.B. This does not at all excuse the Provincial officers from giving their quarterly reports which they were supposed to submit by the 1st April.

A copy of this letter is sent to all the Provincial Presidents.
