It shows how much practical interest you and many friends over there have in Africa and her peoples. You state in your last letter that I have not made clear our needs. I may say that they are legion. I am, however, interested in a few things more particularly, namely; (1) the establishment of a fully equipped library in the only school of University standing that caters to our people in South Africa; (2) funds for scholarships to assist some of our young men who have had training in the above mentioned Institution, to spend a year or two abroad to broaden their outlook and to prepare for greater service among our people, (b) to afford scholarships for the study of Medicine and Surgery overseas to some of our selected young men who have neither means nor place or opportunity for study Medicine and Surgery in South Africa; (3) we also need funds to encourage research by some of our trained young men. The available funds from America andebischeptuese granted chiefly, to Whites; (4) there is also a need for a Press controlled by AfricansLeaders for propaganda purposes. All these points and many others will come up for discussion and be cleared, when we meet each other. I shall communicate with you as soon as I arrive in New York City, about June 10th. I beg to acknowledge with thanks receipt of your letter of recent date enclosing circulars re the Study of Negro history and life.

I can hardly mention how deeply interested I am in such an undertaking. As a matter of fact; but for lack of funds, I should have completed the organisation of what we have named the "African Society" or Acedemy, whose aims and objects are, primarily, to study African life, history and present conditions, by Africans themselves.

Almost all research funds that are evailable locally, or from your country have, perhaps naturally, fallen into the hands of the white section, thus leaving the African in a helpless position, so far as carrying out any serious or protracted study of some of the many problems that solicit solution.
