It was suggested that inevitably, the cultural events would bring up the SA issues and the question being asked is whether we prioritize a few issues or whether we try and do as much as possible?

* It was felt that we should try and find a balance there between too much and not enough. That we should look at the July festival sessions and evaluate which ones were well attended, which issues were relevant to ECC's direction and functioning, and what the quality of work was.

c. Music :

* It was felt that classical music was not acceptable because for many it was irrelevant but that if the CT S.O. played it would be good to have them as we would be able to draw on another constituency.

" it may be useful to include compositions which would include African instruments.

d. International Speaker :

* Due to the cultural boycot, it may be difficult to get a cultural speaker or performer; it is not our role to break the cultural boycott. * a philosopher or psychologist? " a Greens speaker. * an African political leader. * a Greenham Commons woman.

It was felt that the person should be connected to a number of issues; should therefore be able to draw in a number of different people; someone from whom we would benefit and who would in turn benefit her/himself; someone who is known to South Africans; someone who would not be breaking any boycotts. There was some discussion as to whether we should develop local people but it was felt that often they are over used.

1. Oukasie removals.

The Black Sash has invited ECC to parttake in the re-building of roads in Oukasie on Thursday. It was also suggested that ECC make the neccessary contacts so that we could plan a day of help, involving our mailing list.

2. ECC diary.

Pretoria has requested 50 copies for distribution.

3. Joburg ECC campaign.

Joburg has invited other regions to take up their "Eat a Caspir for Christmas" campaign. Pretoria would not take it up due to lack of distribution problems.

4. Campus campaign suggestion.

The campus group has suggested a mini campaign for Pretoria - "Anti-war toys". The General body decided it would ECC the neccessary exposure in Pretoria, and it would be a relevant theme for the churches group to take up. All interested would hold a seperate meeting to discuss details and would report back to the General body.

5. Approving of letter to Natal command.

Pretoria felt that some of the suggestions on the agenda were unreasonable (eg. ECC's relationship with the SADF.) Suggestions from Pretoria were to concentrate on points such as:

-the harassment and treatment of ECC members.

-have ECC voice their stand points, and them theirs.

-ECC's legitimicy.

-consciencious objection to military service, for various reasons, not just religious objection.

Durban ECC would be contacted with the suggestions.

6. Poem by Chris Mann.

Thoroughly enjoyed by everyone.

7. Workshop.

Postponed to Sunday.

8. Next meeting.

Venue and time decided. Bring along supper afterwards.

9. CIIR book.

ECC Pretoria felt that we could not sign the decleration as it was not relevant to ECC as a single issue campaign, but we could still join in the actions on that day. This will be discussed when further details are made available.*

12. List of personal details.

General Picture of Organisations' Work in Johannesburg

Most organisations are continuing with their usual work with the added dimension of participation in alliances. Broad anti-apartheid alliances and a focus on the role of whites and the role in change of extra-parliamentary organisations have been chosen as focuses in response to the outcome of the white election.

Many organisations are overstretched because of alliance demands. Some organisations are in "Free the Children", 5 Freedoms and are also part of UDF. They also may be ECC member organisations. Thus it becomes increasingly difficult to cope with all these allinces.

Repression and surveillance of white organisations has been minimal, with only two incidents: the sudden brief detention of the Jhb UDF Area Committee (comprising reps from each of the UDF affiliates); and Security Police visits to two Free the Children members. We have always known that surveillance is continuing (even though we don't observe it) and this seems to be confirmed because the UDF group was endeavouring to operate in a secure way and were unaware there was any problem.

Some of the issues from the Last National Committee Meeting

<u>Diary</u>: A diary was compiled by Joburg last year but was seized by the police whilst being printed. All that needs to be changed is the dates, and take out statements which are now subversive. The problem is with financing. Regions should place an order for the number of diaries they will be wanting and raise the money for a third of that amount. Money could be raised through getting hold of order foroms and asking people to order their diary and pay the R5 for it at that stage.

<u>Cape Town Record:</u> Other regions felt concerned that the record proposed by CT was a bit too "Cape Town centric". We should send around a proposal of which bands will be on the record and ask for approval or additions etc. Unless this national consultation is done regions felt it would be inappropriate to call the record Forces Favourites 11.

<u>CT Calendar</u>: Branches placed orders for the number of calendars they would like. (PE wishes to add 20 to their order). Orders have been given to the culture rrep.

International Record: Durban will circulate a full proposal so that regions can have a proper discussion.

<u>CIIR Book:</u> ECC National has been asked to work out some way of being consulted about the book. Each branch has been requested to find someone who is keen and interested to scheme about the book and then to forward taht persons name to Adele. In Cape Town a reference group has been formed which involves a number of ECC individuals.

<u>Militarisation Survey</u>: Grahamstown proposed that ECC find out whether it is possible for a survey to be conducted on militarisation is issues. At NC we had some discussion about the values of such a survey, as well the danger of becoming too dependent on surveys and overestimating their value. It was suggested that CT approach Idasa to find out if they would be interested in financing and hosting the survey. Regions could start to think about the types of questions that could be asked.

<u>Resources:</u> Some branches don't have easy access to resources. Each branch should co-ordinate a list of teh resources in their area, audiovisual material, seminars, speakers, names of people who have a lot of knowledge in particular areas etc. Such a list could become part of the SACBC national coordination of ressources. Even if other branches are not able to have copies of videos or whatever, it is useful to know where they caN be found.

<u>Smears</u>: around the country smear actions include: concerted letters campaign against ECC conducted in the pages of the newspapers; phone calls to new members before thy come to their first meeting; campus right wing activity; pornography being sent to members the day before the branch search their house; stickers "I support ECC" stuck onto car windows; pamphlet stuck onto car windows detailing names and criminal record/charges of ECC members; Vets for Victory pamphlets; members parents being phoned by branch; bomb threats in meetings; Women for SA pamphlet sent to all TVL headmistresses/masters is an 8 page letter about ECC being part of the communist onslaught. In PMB they got the reg. number of a vehichle which was putting up smear stickers. Was a military vehichle. But SADF denies this. NC felt that we don't want to get into always just responding to smears, but we do want to try to get substantive evidence linking the state to smears. So we should try to get <u>evidence</u> that can be used. Also useful to muse MP's, lay charges etc ie use legitimate channells. 3. National Committee Report Back. (NC)

* Grahamstown : There has been no official public launch yet but this is planned for late May. The WJP helped build up their profile. They now have 4 sub-comms : media; contact/churches; schools(issues of war and peace); campaign comm. Relations between the ' town' and campus ECC have grown stronger.The campus group is structured as a coalition with 7 affiliates. They recently had a concert where each of the affiliates produced an item reflecting their direction. One of the problems experienced in G'hmtown is that the grouping is small and overextended.

* P.E. : Janet was one of the speakers at a major funeral in P.E. The situation there is particularly intense and there is lots of fear within the white community. The WJP was ver successful they went into Walmer township and helped repair a creche.They have felt that the projects have made enormous gains for ECC. They have made contact with a group of concerned businessman. They also have a lot of contact with a group of Jewish women. They have had constant threats against their members - Pete Hathorne was beaten up about two weeks ago and Barbara Orpen was



sjambokked by 3 white thugs in balaclavas recently.

* Cape Town : ECC has made a significant impact on the CT community through the WJP. They started off with a fare which 4000 people attended; photo exhibition; film festival; cultural evening at the Baxter theatre. The Rally at the end of the campaign was attended by 3000 people.Altogether 12 different projects were taken on, mostly within the coloured community. ECC came across as positive, slick and not too radical. A lot of discussion is happening around the issues if democratic processes and women's participation.

Two new sub-comms have developed : Projects ; Parents group.

* Durban : The WJP has been successful and drew in about 100 volunteers. Four different projects were taken on, each with its own co-ordinator and running independently. The campaign eneded with a cheese and wine including a comprehensive questionaire for each volunteer. Other activities included:

picket of the opening of the State theatre.
 picket of the HQ of Natal Command when the troops moved into Lamontville.

- went up to roadblocks and spoke to some of the soldiers.

- setting up a veterans group.

* Pietermaritzburg : They wre involved with 2 projects.
Compensation Resettlement area - planted sisal and windbreakers. A lot of volunteers from both the white and black community were recruited for this action.
Children's Home in a white community.
They have had successful involvement of several schoolchildren from about 5 different private schools.

* National Assessment :

WJP has been our first real national campaign and ECC has taken on a new dimension. The press coverage was not great but we still made a lot of gains and have a greater sense of national cohesion. There was a big debate on the role of women in ECC and questions were raised as to whether ECC is a feminist organization or adheres to those principles. It was felt that we needed to have a lot of thought and discussion around this issue. There aws also a lot of discussion around the issue of direct action and that ECC should be more involved in this area of work.

4. Newsletter.

The suggested format is tabloid size on newsprint. The content will deal with the following :

- Review of WJP
- Survey
- cultural festival
- ECC in Pretoria
- Phillip
- Geldenhuys Commission
- Peace Ribbon

- attacks on ECC members - Public Safety Bill

5. National Publication.

CT will produce the first edition. We need to find a name, preferably one which is catchy, bilingual and which pertains to the military issue. People really liked the name of Durban's newsletter`At Ease' but felt that we needed to approach them on using that name for the national publication as well. Other suggestions : Your Choice; Aandag; Just Action; Objector; About Face; Aware.

6. Survey.

At NC all the regions agreed to do the survey and use it to build their local ECC. The smaller regions felt that they did not have the strength right now and asked that the deadline be extended.At the July National Conference we will decide on the final date. On Saturday,24th May we will get together for a Survey blitz. To meet at 9.30am at Trinity Hall and to come back together for lunch.

7. July Conference.

This will be held on 19 -20 July in the Eastern Cape. Each region is allowed 20 delegates.

8. Pretoria Launch.

The first meeting of the Pta ECC will be on Friday,16th May at St. Francis Anglican Church in Waterkloof. Some Jhb. ECC members to attend.

9. Phillip.

Phillip gave some input on how he was arrested and the few days after that. He has been charged with failing to report for camp and he will appear in court on Friday,23rd May in P.E.

10. Public Safety Bill.

In the light of the powers given to the conscript under this bill it's important that ECC address this issue. The conscript is being empowered to enforce a permanent state of emergency. The Black Sash are having a public meeting on 27th May at the St. Columbus Church in Parkview on this issue. Speakers will include Sheena Duncan, Fink Haysom. The Black Sash are also having a picket on the 30th May. ECC to participate in this.

11. Breyten Breytenbach.

CT have indicated to Jhb. that they felt we made the wrong decision w.r.t. BB and that we need to make a public apology. Some discussion was held on our reponse to CT. It was agreed that we would respond to CT explaining the process through which we had gone in reaching this decision and in the light of that feel that we do not make any public statement.

12. December Festival.

The two dates accepted for this festival are : 12-16 Dec, 16-20 Dec. Cape Town will make the final decision on the grounds of the availability of venues, etc.

Several names were suggested for the international speaker, needing to keep in mind that we cannot encourage any one to break the cultural boycott. It was decided that at the next GB meeting that members could motivate for a speaker and that the general body would then make a decision.

We need to make suggestions for bands, poets, etc from Jhb. We hope to make this the biggest cultural event in the history of South Africa.

13. Subscriptions.

Member orgs. still need to confirm whether their orgs. accept the principle of paying subscription. Individual members : R2O. Member Drgs. : R4O. This is due for the end of May.

The next general meeting is to be held on Thursday,29th May at 7.30pm.
