Attack On Britain Imminent?

GERMANS MOUNTING LONG-RANGE GUNS ON FRENCH COAST

TROOPS AND SHIPS SAID TO BE ASSEMBLING AT STRATEGIC POINTS

THE NAZI INVASION OF BRITAIN, ACCORDING TO WELL-INFORMED OBSERVERS IN BERLIN, IS APPROACHING. IT IS BELIEVED THAT ALTHOUGH HITLER MAY HAVE DOUBTS ABOUT THE OUTCOME, HE HAS COMMITTED HIMSELF SO DEEPLY TO HIS OWN PEOPLE THAT HE MAY FIND IT DIFFICULT TO CHANGE HIS PLANS.

Britain Well Prepared

IT IS THE BELIEF OF MANY OBSERVERS IN LONDON THAT THE WOULD-BE INVADERS WILL BE GIVEN A VERY HOT RECEPTION. THEY WILL FIND NOT ONLY THE ROYAL AIR FORCE, BUT THE GROUND DEFENCES AND TROOPS, AS WELL AS THE ROYAL NAVY FULLY PREPARED FOR THEM. THE R.A.F. IS READY TO MEET THE GERMANS NO MATTER FROM WHAT DIRECTION THE ATTACK OR ATTACKS MAY COME.

British Advance Into Abyssinia

THE WAR IN AFRICA IS NOW DEVELOPING. THE KING'S AFRICAN RIFLES HAVE ADVANCED INTO ABYSSINIA AND CAPTURED THE ITALIAN STRONGHOLD OF TODENYANG. DRIVING THE ITALIAN TROOPS BACK INTO THE INTERIOR, THE ITALIAN TROOPS ARE CONCENTRATING IN LIBYA, NEAR THE NORTHERN END OF THE FRONTIER WITH EGYPT.

ROYAL AIR FORCE READY

Information reaching London from various channels suggests that the enemy's preparations, though well advanced, are not yet complete, and those in a position to form a sound judgment think that the attempt may be made within the next week or fortnight.

The possibility that these preparations are a feint intended to cover a move elsewhere, such as the Near East, has not however been overlooked.

There is reason to believe that sea preparations are going on steadily "at the back of the Baltic," where it is most difficult for our reconnaissance and bombing aircraft to penetrate. These ships, says the correspondent, would undoubtedly be kept well hidden until just before the invasion was attempted, when they would be moved through the Baltic at night.

TROOPS AND GUNS

There are rumours of activity in Norway, where Italian troops are reported to have been sent, and guns are being mounted at intervals all along the coast of Northern France in positions from which they could be used to bombard our southern defences or to attack British naval forces in the Channel.

Our reconnaissance aircraft have noticed feverish activity in enemy-occupied countries, where large numbers of men are working on communications repairing the thousands of road and rail bridges over canals and rivers destroyed during the French campaign.

THE R.A.F. READY

The R.A.F. is ready to meet would-be invaders no matter from what direction the attack or attacks may come, says the correspondent. Our fighter force has been substantially increased in the last few weeks and is getting stronger daily. An armada approaching these shores could not hope long to escape detection, for an unceasing vigil is being kept.

Italy Expected To Attack In N. Africa

Italian troops are concentrating in Libya, near the northern end of the frontier with Egypt, says a Cairo message.

A large force has been assembled in the Bardia area, and the Italians have been retaining their hold on Fort Capuzzo in order to cover this concentration.

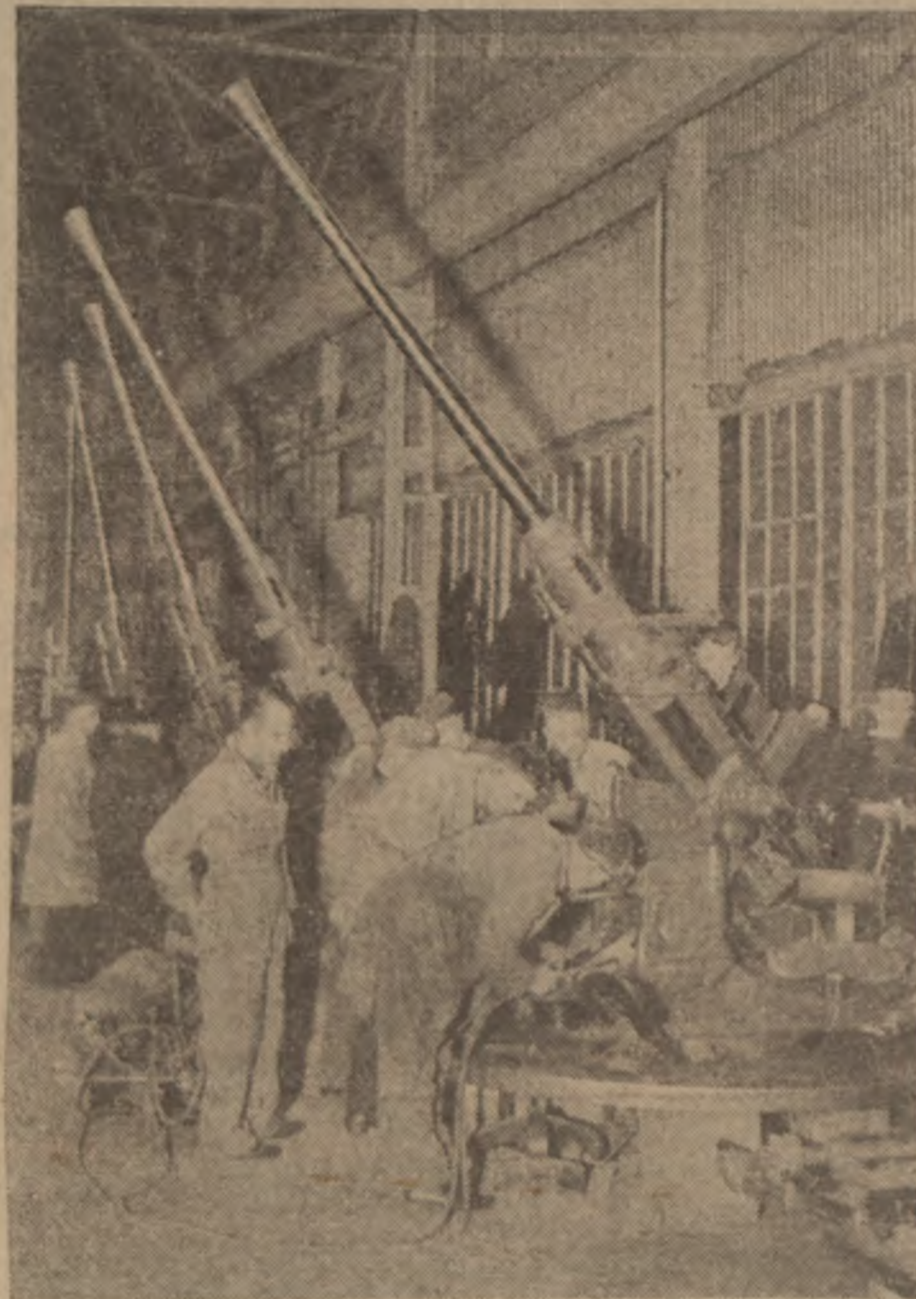
So far, this frontier area has been completely dominated by a small British force, consisting largely of armoured vehicles.

It is now believed that an Italian attack on the frontier must be expected soon.

"Since Italy declared war she has lost on this front alone 803 prisoners, including a general, 16 guns and 15 tanks, while the number of killed and wounded runs into many hundreds. Italy has also lost a large quantity of arms, vehicles and materials."

"These British successes were due to the high quality, sound training, able handling and excellent equipment of the desert forces and the spirit and morale of the Air Force."

BRITISH AFRICAN TROOPS ADVANCE INTO ABYSSINIA

After two sharp engagements in one of the least known regions of Africa, the King's African Rifles have dented the Abyssinian frontier and driven back the Italian defenders into the interior.

The "Daily Telegraph's" Cairo correspondent says that they have now completed the occupation of the enemy stronghold of Todenyang, otherwise known as Fort Wilkinson, on the northern tip of Lake Rudolph, where Kenya, the Sudan and Abyssinia meet.

A surprise attack on the fort was launched by British askaris advancing in lorries in the hottest part of the day. Taken unawares, the enemy African conscripts, officered by Europeans, hardly had time to man the posts before the British were on them. A short and sharp action drove the Italian troops to the bushland, where the officers desperately tried to rally the men.

FRENCH FORCES AND RED CROSS OF LORRAINE

The Red Cross of Lorraine, which was the emblem carried by Joan of Arc, has been adopted by General De Gaulle as the emblem for his forces, in addition to the French flag.

Vice-Admiral Museber, who commands the free French Navy and Air Force, has ordered the warships under his command to fly the Tricolor at the stern and the Cross of Lorraine at the bows.

French aircraft, in addition to the French markings, will have a blue ring containing the Cross of Lorraine in the centre.

One of the reasons why this has been selected is because the Germans are making strong efforts to Germanise Lorraine.

U.S.A. Urged To Give Naval Aid To Britain

"I say to you solemnly that tomorrow may be for ever too late to keep the war from the Americas," declared General J. J. Pershing, who commanded the United States Expeditionary Force in Europe in the last war, in a broadcast address in which he advocated that the United States should make available to Britain at least 50 "over-age" destroyers.

"To-day may be the last time when, by measures short of war, we can still prevent the war here," he said.

He saw great danger for the United States in the present world situation, but if destroyers would help to save the British Fleet America itself might be saved from another war.

"We shall be failing in our duty to America if we do not do it," he declared.

General Pershing's call for quick naval aid for Britain is prominently featured in the Press.

The Herald-Tribune says the successful defence of Great Britain is of such overwhelming practical importance to the security and welfare of the United States that no aid to that end which this country can offer ought to be withheld.

"A further factor is the absolute confidence in the outcome which inspires all ranks and contrasts markedly with the doubt, hesitation and lack of confidence among the Italians and Libyans."

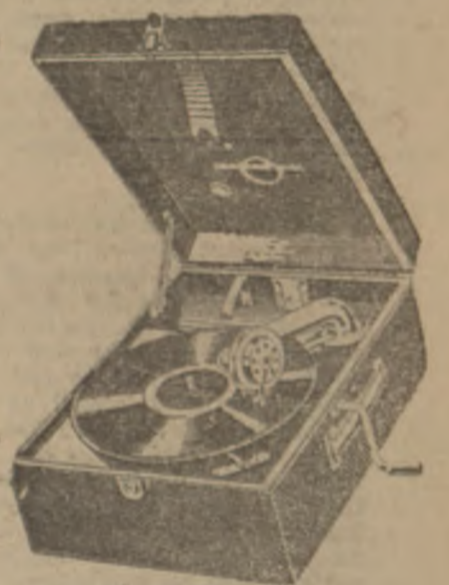

After all, why should you be laid out for because someone else has time to spare?

Above all, don't get the obsession of busy-ness. It is a fatal affliction not only to the person concerned but to all with whom she comes in contact. It is not good to dwell continually upon the many, many things you have to do. You could be doing one of them with the time and energy you spend talking about them. And neither your husband, child, neighbour, friend or even your minister, is particularly thrilled to hear the oft-repeated recital of them.

The truth is we are all too busy these days to afford time merely talking about it.

But of course it is the spirit of the home that really matters. Visiting many homes through busy years, one realises how very important this is. The right spirit in the home is more precious than the best furniture and more restful than the softest cushions.

And it is the women of the house who really determine its spirit. You are the centre, and however far the circumference reaches, it really revolves around you. Run your home efficiently, healthily, and as simply as you can, but above all joyfully. "The greatest of these is love." Keep open house for—Jesus Christ and your own kind, heart.

BABY'S FOOD

When a baby reaches the age of a year and a half, he can take a mixed diet, although, of course, milk must still be the chief food. Before breakfast baby should have the juice of a whole orange; occasionally he may have a few grapes (skinned and seeded), or tomato juice instead of the orange.

At breakfast baby can have a cupful of warm milk, toast or rice spread with good butter and honey or treacle.

For dinner, baby can have an egg, scrambled or lightly boiled; or steamed fish; or a good gravy; with potatoes (steamed and mash'd); carrots or cauliflower or Brussels sprouts, steamed and mashed to a puree. For his second course he can have a milk jelly, or a custard, a baked apple, or a little stewed apples, dates or prunes. The fruit must, of course, be well washed before being cooked, freed from skin stones and pips. It should also be nicely sweetened and thoroughly tender.

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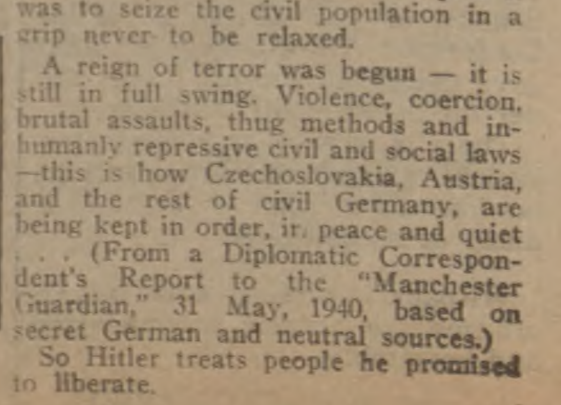
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CHILD TRAINING IN THE HOME

AM I MY BROTHER'S KEEPER?

The answer to the question written above is YES. None of us can live, work or grow up alone without depending on other human beings. And we have each to answer for all those with whom we live or work. The earlier we train our children to practise this the stronger and better do their characters become.

I know two little girls aged three and nearly two, who have been taken to stay with a friend, because their mother has had another baby. The friend undressed them both the first night in the strange home, and laid them in their beds. But the older child felt she must look after the other, so went to her and gave her the same blessing that she was used to getting from her parents. "God bless you, my child," said little three-year old to the small sister. She had already learned the big lesson that she was responsible for her sister.

The great enemy that we all have to fight is the love of self. Every human being is tempted to care more for himself than anyone else, and the best way to lose this love of self, is to carry on our shoulders the care of other people.

The more people are centred on themselves, the further they are from being sane, useful or happy. We can tell when a person is more interested in himself than anyone else, because the conversation is always brought round to himself. It is natural for small children to show this, and we need to train them out of it, if we want them to grow up into good people.

At the age of three, a child first discovers that he is a real person with a life separate from his mother. It is right to allow him to show off, make a lot of noise, boast and talk freely. This makes him sure that he is important and has his place in the world. But without smugging him in any way or flattery, we should begin to show him that he can care for others even smaller than himself. He can also care for his much loved mother. Helping her in her tasks, seeing that she does not get too tired, he can be told that now he is such a BIG MAN, he can be trusted with little tasks in the household. If these are not done, let him suffer with the rest, and so learn the need for being faithful in work.

Let us remember, however, that a small child likes change and soon gets tired, so we should alter his little jobs after a few days, if we see him getting weary of them.

Specially let us teach the children to care for each other. In large families, large families are very much better than small ones.

Do we train the children to feel that the home belongs equally to all of them, that its state of tidiness or cleanliness is the concern of each one? What a great help to the children it would be if a mother would set a high standard of order in her home, and expect a child to take her part in carrying it out!

A very good plan is to have a HOME COUNCIL, when all those in the home, big and little, come together to discuss the work of running, the problems that have appeared, possibly including wrong behaviour on the part of a child. Let each one be free to express what he feels, remembering that Jesus Christ Himself honoured a little child, by putting him in the midst of His disciples and telling them they must be like him.

The old idea of parents ruling their children from a high platform, to which the little ones look up, is gone. Our world, which is in such a state of disorder today, will never come right till we take Jesus at His word, and all become like children.

At the same time, it is right for even children to learn to LIVE OUTSIDE THEMSELVES, and answer for other children, for their homes, for their parents, and later, for the place in which they live.

The girls and boys who have begun to grow up can be trained to look outside their own homes, and care for their own country, whether it is a street in the town, a village in the country, or a reserve, where each home has its own land. If there is anything wrong with the place where we live, let us LEAVE OFF BLAMING SOMEONE ELSE, and see what we can do to make it better. The young people, with all their fresh spirits, can help well in such work.

This prepares them for an even wider vision, the thought of answering for their COUNTRY. Instead of merely learning from older people to be sorry for themselves, and to blame their rulers, is it not possible to take a close interest in the powers affecting them? Let us get the youth of our race to study affairs of the land they live in, and do what they can to mend anything wrong.

Only a few miles from where I am writing this, a number of African students are working hard to fight the erosion of the soil in the peoples' gardens. They are spending their winter holiday, at their own expense, in doing the hard work with pick and shovel, because they have learned to love and answer for the land they live in.

It is only through learning to forget self and love others instead that they could ever have undertaken such a task. Their unselfish work has made a deep impression on the people in the district and shows them that real Christianity makes men shoulder the problems and burdens of their country.

Shall we all seek to give our children such a model of leading character in order to help them follow?

BREAKFAST MARMALADE

SLICED ORANGE PRESERVE

A change from the usual breakfast marmalade is preserved sliced orange. This is simply made as follows—

Great the rind thinly off, the fruit, then cut into slices. Weigh and place in a large dish, adding one pint of water to every pound of fruit. Leave overnight, then bring to the boil in the same water, boiling the fruit gently for about 10 minutes. Lift the slices out carefully and strain the water in which they were cooked. Measure it and add two cups of sugar to every cup of water. Stir till it comes to the boil and the sugar is dissolved. Boil, and then add the slices, a few at a time, so as not to interrupt the boiling. A cupful of strained lemon juice will add sharpness to the flavour.

Boil for about 10 minutes, or until the fruit is clear and transparent and the syrup thick.

Place in hot dry jars, covering the fruit with syrup. If using odd

glass jam jars without screw or clamp tops, leave the preserve to cool, and when cold cover with rounds of paper dipped in brandy and tied over the jar tops, or seal up with melted paraffin wax. Store in a cool dark place.
