

## Diary of events for the E.C.C. Working for a Just Peace campaign

Tuesday 1st April

Bruce Duncan House in Hanover Park

White schoolchildren will join the children at the home in clearing the grounds. It is an all day project and is particularly significant because it involves school students.

Tuesday 1st April

8.00pm at the Rondebosch Congregational Church, Belmont Rd. All volunteers for projects will meet so that times and projects can be confirmed. The meeting will be addressed by the E.C.C. chair Nic Borain, E.C.C. projects coordinator Vaun Cornell and Mike Vivieros a past conscientious objector who is presently working at the Bruce Duncan House.

Friday 4th April

7.00pm those people who are having stalls at the fair meet at the Rondebosch Congregational Church to set up stalls.

Saturday 5th April

From 8.30 the fair begins at the Rondebosch Congregational Church. Organisations and commercial sellers will have stalls. The morning will drift into an afternoon of music and the show will wind to a close at about 3pm.

Sunday 6th April

An anti-litter drive. Volunteers will meet at the E.C.C. office at 1.30pm. The venue for the drive will be confirmed later.

Sunday 6th April

6.30pm the opening of the E.C.C. photo exhibition at the Baxter Theatre. The film festival which is being jointly hosted by the U.C.T. Film Education Unit and the E.C.C. will open at 8.00pm.

Wednesday 9th April

Earth moving and the laying of grass at the Cape Town City mission home in Bridgetown, Tarentaal Rd. This is an all day project and volunteers should meet at the E.C.C. office at 9.30am.

Wednesday 9th April

A smaller evening project for the not-so-fit. Sewing a section of the Peace Ribbon, and also fixing toys for creches. Venue to be confirmed.

Saturday 12th April

Clearing the garden at Cowley House. Families of political prisoners often stay at Cowley House when they come to see people in Pollsmoor or on Robben Island.

Saturday 12th April

In the evening entertainment and supper to be provided for those people who are staying in Cowley House.

Sunday 13th April

A mural will be painted at Cowley House.

Sunday 13th April

The project at the Bridgetown Home continues. This is a long and strenuous project which involves a lot of heavy work.

Wednesday 16th April

Bridgetown project continued. If the project has been completed then we will start another project at a campsite in Strandfontein. The site also belongs to the Bruce Duncan House.

Saturday 19th April

Bridgetown or Strandfontein projects

Sunday 20th April

Bridgetown or Standfontein continued

Sunday 20th April

Closing the projects with a braai and an assessment for all volunteers. Venue to be confirmed.

30th April

Public meeting in the City Hall.

Other projects will be happening that are smaller or that cannot be publicised.

A further project which does not have a fixed date is that of teaching township residents to drive. Drivers and instructors will set times that suit them individually.
