- (c) Keep this Circular. Remember these leaders.
 They will been you into action. Your orders will nome from them only.
- (d) Be ready for in tall. Know what we are fighting for. It is a noble and glorious atruggle calling for sorvice, sacrifice and suffering from the African people.
- (e) This is going to be a disciplined, mass campaign. Orders must be carried out faithfully. If we all play our part, if we all cling together no force one defeat us. We will win.
 - (f) We will so away with Pass Laws once and for all. There is no doubt about that. There is no noed for my of our people to die from policy bullets to echiove this. Discipling and an Iron wall are what we need.

CALLING THE NATIONS.

NO BAIL I NO DEPENCE IL NO FINE III

This is the CALL the African people have been walting for. It has come: On Monday the 21st March 1960 we launch our POSITIVE, DECISIVE CAMPAIGN against the PASS LAWS in this country.

(A) OUR DEMANDS: -

- We demand that the PASS LAWS BE TOTALLY ABOLISHED.
- We demand a MINIMUM WAGE, established by Government legislation, of £35 per month or £8.j.4. per week, which must be paid throughout the country.
- We demand a guarantee that NO WORKER shall be dismissed because of this campaign.
- 4. We demand a guarantee that the leaders shall not be victimized either by the LOCAL AUTHORITIES or by the GOVERNMENT as a result of the African people's positive action.
- (B) Those are my ORDERS, and if we must win, those ORDERS MUST be FAITHFULLY OBEYED.

In every city, town and village, the men will leave their passes at home on Monday the 21st March 1960.

- (C) Under the local leadership of the Pan APRICAMIST CONGRESS, the men will move to the chosen Police Station and there surrender themselves for arrest. The leader will tell the Police that :
 "We all do not have Passes. We will not carry Passes again. Millions of our people are arrested under the Pass Lawe, so you had better arrest us all.
- (D) If you are stopped by the Police on the way, and they demand paceon, surrender there and then for arrest. If one man is arrested for not having a Pass, you all stop there and then. Tell the Police that you do not have Passes either. Demand that they arrest you all.
- (E) All men will go to fail under the alogan of RO BAIL, NO DEFENCE, NO FINE. The women will be assigned their historic role, but in the first phase of the arrangele they must make ours that all men go to jail.

(F) DURATION OF CAMPAIGN.

Nobody will call this Campaign off, except the National President of the Pan Africanist Congress, who will do so at the meetings of the people. IC NOT ARLOW ANY NEWSFAPEH, CIRCULAR LETTER OR OFFICIALS OF THE GOVERNMENT to mislay you.

So long as the Campaign is on, NOBODY WILL GO TO WORK. Let us stick together, the people and their

lenders. It is now time for SERVICE, SACRIFICE AND SUFFERING. That is the spirit in which we must go into action.
