

### A CODE OF ETHICS FOR POLITICAL PARTIES

### Request

The President's Council is requested to investigate the desirability and if necessary the scope of a code of ethical conduct or statutory framework for the functioning of South African political parties in terms of generally accepted democratic norms and guidelines.

### Motivation

At present no normative ethically-based code of conduct exists with regard to the functioning of parties within the political spectrum.

Against the background of the accompanying request the ethics of the following aspects should be investigated

- 1. <u>Basic Values</u> which are emphasised within the South African political context (although political parties sometimes come about on the basis of religious, ethnic, racial or class differences, the existence of these differences are not necessarily determining factors for the coming into being of political parties just as political parties differ with regard to their stated aims and political conduct).
- 2. <u>Functioning</u> (for example, the role of political socialisation, recruitment of members, communication and information functions, articulation of interests, policy formulation "marketing campaigns" in connection with the party image, as well as the propagation of a programme of principles and plan of action).
- 3. The ethics regarding <u>funding/financing</u> (i.e. the prevailing ethical norms with regard to both domestic and foreign funding and donations, as well as the use of public funds, for example for election campaigns).

- 4. The role of trade unions as political organisations.
- 5. The advisability of <u>statutory control over the financ-</u> ing of political party spending.
- 6. The role that the registration of political parties should play.

"INTERACTION FOR DEMOCRACY - Workshop on the Facilitation of Interaction to Promote a Culture of Democracy"

The Five Freedoms Forum is planning a national workshop of organisations, political parties and individuals who are involved or have a broad interest in "facilitation politics". The workshop will take place near Pretoria from Friday evening 1 February 1991 to Sunday afternoon 3 February 1991.

The political climate has changed substantially since February 2nd with many organisations and political groupings having moved away from a critical protest mode of operating to a facilitative scyle of work aimed at working towards the development of a democracy.

After having been requested to provide a forum to discuss new facilitative styles of working, and in consultation with a range of different groupings around the country, the following have been identified as workshop objectives:

- To provide a forum for organisations with an interest in facilitative work to share ideas.
- To involve more people and groups in this process.
- To come up with a working definition of "facilitative politics".
- To assess the need for a facilitative style of working at all levels for the organisations present.
- To draw out the relationship between facilitation, protest politics, human rights monitoring, lobbying and party politics.
- 6) To explore the value/need for a follow up conference on a larger scale, and a closer working relationship between the groups/individuals involved.

A broad range of participants are being invited. These include organisations which are involved in "facilitation politics", organisations who may have an interest in this type of work and

The workshop will take place at the Espada ranch near Pretoria from 6pm Friday 1 February to 4.30pm Sunday 3 February 1991. Transport will be available from Johannesburg and Jan Smuts airport.

We would like to invite ECC to send one delegate to the workshop. Please find enclosed a provisional agenda as well as an application form. Please fill in the names of those members from your organisation who will attend the workshop and return the form to us by 15 January 1991.

We would also like you to send in a document outlining the current activities and structure of your organisation. The following may be be useful as headings:

\* how your organisation has adapted to the changing political climate

\* current programme of activities

\* your current involvement/interest in facilitation work Please try to limit the document to two typed pages. Please could you also include the address, telephone number and fax number (if you have one) of your organisation as well as a contact name. These documents will be collated and circulated amongst the other participants.

The cost of the weekend workshop is R240.00 per participant which includes shared accomodation and all meals. Subsidies will be available for those who cannot afford the total cost. A limited number of transport subsidies may also be avaliable for those traveling to the Transvaal.

# **Southern Africa Partnership Program**

A joint project of Global Exchange and the U.S./South Africa Sister Community Project

### Dear Comrade:

Global Exchange and the Unites States-South Africa Sister Community Project announce an exciting new project - the opening of a joint office in Johannesburg. Although the office will begin as a very modest operation - two part-time staff people based in an existing movement office - we believe establishing a direct-ongoing presence "on the ground" is an important new step which will greatly strengthen the ability of both of our organizations to provide support to the democratic movement in South Africa while educating Americans about the continuing injustices of apartheid. We hope that you will be open to working with us toward this goal.

Both Sister Community Project and Global Exchange are "linking" projects attempting to establish direct ties between the people of South Africa and the people of the United States. We have had some success in achieving this goal - the Sister Community Project helped to set up sister community relationships between nine U.S. and South African commuities, and sponsored the first conference in the U.S. on land rights in South Africa. Global Exchange has led a number of "reality tours" of North Americans to Southern Africa and has brought distinguished leaders such as Sister Bernard Ncube and Graca Machel of Mozambique to speak in the U.S. Our work does not include funding groups in South Africa, but rather in creating the framework through which exchanges between our peoples can be facilitated in order to share experiences, provide technical training and support, organize joint campaigns, and learn from and support each others' struggles.

After many years in which those in the international community wishing to support the South African anti- apartheid movement were strongly advised to work from outside, it appears that the time is finally right for us to work inside the country. We are very excited about the extent to which our efforts can be enhanced by establishing an office in South Africa. We will be able to make on the spot assessments of the potential of linking projects, to gather and communicate the kind of accurate information on conditions in the country which is often denied to us through U.S. based sources, to help to determine where North American volunteers can be most effectively placed, and to provide information to interested South African organizations on potential sources for funds from the U.S. - and much more.

Laurie Adams, currently of Global Exchage, will be one of two Americans staffing the Partnership Program office. Laurie will be arriving in South Africa in late April, as will

During the first two weeks of May, both Laurie and Anne would like to have an opportunity to meet with you or someone from your staff. Chris Benner, who is currently working on a computer training project with COSATU, will be the second Partnership Program staffer.

Laurie and Anne will arrive in Johannesburg on April 29th. Anne will be in South Africa until May 16th. During this time we will be calling you to see if someone from your office can meet with us to discuss ways we may be able to collaborate for mutual benefit.

Although this is a new and untested effort, we hope the Southern Africa Partnership Program can play a role in supporting the democratic movement in South Africa. We are convinced that by exposing a growing number of Americans to the critical nature of your struggle, material support will eventually be increase and American policy towards South Africa will be affected. We look forward to speaking with you soon.
