Mr. Vogrund last met during the struggle and countrywed histo for Independence of the Swaid and I am now releasing facts as to how I intervened at the deventh hour to avert that war between the British Goodin Jordan John and the Swain workers John and Lation as a whole I was called and lation as a whole I was called in myself because risting gway Workers And become difficult to control and the whole situation was our of control and the whole situation was our of control and facts. At proving how I awerted that war at his bend the tentre of toneral Strike which I was still spreading. I had a brief which Joras still spreading. I had a brief char with you during the first day of the British through the way after some strike of the Strage Mattern against them. 5 days within the Strage Mattern giving them 5 days within which to teturn to work or be ready to fight at the end of five days. All Swaziland had usged me to save their people from being massacred by the British troops within the next few days.

I missed seeing you after my direct rug strations with both the Federation of Employers Chamber of Commirce and Industry of Swalpland. I had to negotiate por Peaceful Dolution with the British Colonial Office in London prom Big-Bend. The Employers Poderation Officials Mr. Fletcher of Johannesburg and Mr. Adamson of Illoo Mills of Sugar wird at Ixofo, Matal. They flew by air to big-Bend that afternoon to meet Mr. David Khumalo, Mr. McDonald Maseko and Mr. Twala, we represented the Swazi Workers and the Nation and the War fever and preparations had engulfed the entire Swaze people. With the help of modern communications syptem which was put at my disposal, by the Aderation of Employers - I succeeded to negotiate with Foreign Affairs Depense and Colonial Office in Britain for returning all workers before the expiration of the 5 Days. agreed to shange its position by accepting to brank and freedom from British thank of Swaziland . (2) An Industrial Tribunal was appointed to come to Surgidand the following week to investigate and fix wages for Sotasse worker who would regotate a Minimum Wage worker who would regotate a Minimum Wage with Employers, etc. before the Tribunal Mombos. Having introduced Swai headers & quietly withdrews after completing representations and I left Swaijland to seek political asylum abroad.

In the scircumstances, I beg you to allow me - to give your name Mr Pograind as also give the name of Mr. Wastin Mdinies, who was a occolonial Labour Officer in Swaziland working for the Government as an Labour Inspector at Moabane Swaziland. Nowever in his case I have met him several times abroad since then in recent years. But for the moment I do not have his address, for he might also be visited to support my honest teporting on how the war between the British Army and Swaze Totion was averted at that eleventh-hour in April 1963 at Brig-Bend Swazeland.
