Maabo, Ma- Mashoko le ngoetsi oa gagoe eo shoecoeng ke basimane ba boile koa terg teng fela jaka mybrother Ramokoto. O tlhotse a tsile go re bona mme ga ese a ba a itekanele. Ko Thabancho jaka ko Mafikeng go ntse go rile tu. Modumonyana oa ntsha o coang Thabancho oa tla ole mashoe thata. Summary

The letter is addressed to someone Plaatje calls Morolong.

In it Plaatje tells about the health of his family. He had just arrived on the 4 October from Lesotho and he found his wife ill and all the children except for Richard, Ngoetse, Poppie Mbelle and Maria Motshumi. He bade goodbye to relatives from Pniel. They had come to cut a wedding dress, and they had also all got ill except for Ngoetse; they were ill for a whole month, and Plaatje had to shift them now and again from one sleeping position to another.

It does seem like people in the local area were either dying or getting sick. One teacher Kazu Motebang had to be taken to a mental hospital in Bloemfontein by Ma Sainty. Soon after that, Herman Mofokeng's, a relative through their marriage of Plaatje's aunt, wife passed away. Herman's wife was Miss Motebong's sister. There also passed away the Evangelist Elias Plaatje son of Plaatje's brother. One teacher Lucas Mashoko, his two nephews and one of Marakeng passed away. The daughter-in-law to the Mashoko family and Mrs Mashoko were like Plaatje's brother Ramokoto not fully recovered from the sudden deaths.

Thaba Nchu like Mafikeng had not had such deaths. The first news from Thaba Nchu was the death of Mokitlane Nyokong's wife and their daughter Nthekeng. Mrs Rev. Diphuko daughter of Nyokong had also recently passed away. There also passed away Mr Abiel Ditheko, once a printer at Mafikeng, and another man who once work at the shops there, a relative of Masisi. We heard about this from Motlatta at the Rolong district; we do not know who is next.

At home Richard Mojanaga who had not been feeling well and had been helping Plaatje to comfort other when people were dying in great numbers, has some lung sickness. One daughter of Mbelle, Robert Detlogelo the Motshipinare's wife has passed away, says Plaatje two or three days after her marriage, then followed Robert on Monday, the wife having died on Sunday. The deeds of God are shocking and surprising for I am still alive. People died in great numbers, in each house in our street people died like flies; it seemed like a dream then.

At Bethany people were sick but they did not die. At the Lovedale School where Ma-Sainty is, seven hundred got ill, but only five passed away, the sixth was a teacher, Ma-Sainty was not taken ill, which was surprising indeed, for his bosom friend was ill.

The tragedy of these passed days left Kimberley destitute the only movement of people was to the grave yards. We would be pleased to hear how you fare.
