re: Wages paid to employee Ndumiso.

One of your workers by the name of Ndumiso has brought to us a statement of wages drawn up by you for the Non-European Affairs Department purporting to be a reflection of wages actually paid to him for the period July 1953 - June 1954. He states that his weekly wages, as paid to him, have been £4.16.6 and that on no occasion has he ever received a weekly wage above this amount except as indicated for December. He particularly mentions the amounts of £24.17.9, £30.10.11 and £23.19.2 for the months of September, 1953, March, 1954 and June, 1954 respectively.

It is possible that his statement may not be correct, but if it is true that his weekly wages are £4.16.6 as stated by him, the disparity between a weekly wage of £4.16.6 and £30.0.0 a month or even £24.17.9 and £23.9.2, is sufficiently great to raise a query in one's mind one way or the other. I should appreciate it if you would be kind enough to favour me with an explanation to enable me to clear the position for him.

Tou will appreciate the importance of this statement both for him and for the City Council. It is on its basis that this man is going to pay an economic or a sub-economic rent for the cottage he is occupying and on the basis of the figures supplied by you there is no doubt that he is going to be treated as an "economic" tenant, and it would be very hard on him if the position was not as indicated.

The amount shown against December 1953 included his year's leave pay as well as a bonus. This information was given at the foot of the form we completed in respect of this worker.

Trusting the above will clarify the position.

As the mine hospitals, like the mines, fall outside the influx control regulations, it is just possible that if you found work with one of them you may be allowed to take it.

The position is not at all clear and I am not in a position to say with any degree of certainty whether you will be permitted to enter the urban area or not.
