English Common Law vs. Roman Law
with Feudalism → democracy England
Feudalism → despotic monarchy Continent

Exec. Efficiency. Popular Control Personal Liberty

Parliamentary system originally a hereditary thing

Feudalism the only method of which a
helpless, feeble, and unorganized
people could be protected
Hence Roman Law - not Roman - based on City State

1806: British Admin
(as Europeans) came up to north
(h) Sunday R.
1812 Joints cleared (Adams + H.S.) Europeans
settles.

1819 Settlement Kura - Keskama - but fanka in
Teymie
Purp. fish. & both making
at Keskama
Sovereign treaty with fanka as paramount chief
~~over fish~~ - wall between Kura

Area fish - Keskama - Neutral
except Teymie Valley. @ this = fanka
Joints - European Eastern boundary
for 1820 settlers.

1820-1825 Neutral area disappears
fish does - N. & E

1834 Kappi War

Annea - British Kappania as
a separate colony. } because
Indy seque. }

Interpenetration

1857 Cattle killing - popular demand
for settle, former begin men on
vacant land & pushed
falkas behind Dache River
in Drander - area between
Ker & Dache to be to no man's land.
vacant. under military rule

1864/5 - Area occupied (Teymie & Dache)
1877-1894 - fanka land east - as on Koki
Drander annexed

as detraction
cut in

In Anglo-Danish times it was a rule that a lord
applied that every man must ^{have} be a lord
to be answerable for his misdoings.

The rule of birth & inheritance bound to the soil
- sold with the estate

Magnum Carta only recognized the free man
- not the villein.

In the 14th Century
He could not sue his lord

The lord had the right
that he wanted

He had his own
land
which he sold
when his lord
did not need
him
He had common

He had to give his man a day's service in a year to his lord
in return for his own land
But lord could not force or raise rent
or services - except those ^{fixed} customarily on his

man. Established through custom

in the manor lord
No equality before the law

The Tudor lords emancipated him & rendered labour
fluid

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
