The President will call upon the Nation very soon to honour its resolution. The Order that goes out to the Nation, therefore, is:-

- (a) Save food, save money imediately.
- (b) Send your donations, <u>immediately</u>, to The National Secretary, Pan Africanist Congress, P.O. Box 1610, JOHANNESBURG, Transvaal.
- (c) Keep this Circular. Remember these leaders. They will Lead you into action. Your orders will come from them <u>only</u>.
- (d) Be ready for the call. Know what we are fighting for. It is a noble and glorious struggle calling for service, sacrifice and suffering from the African people.
- (e) This is going to be a <u>disciplined</u>, mass campaign. Orders must be carried out <u>faithfully</u>. If we all play our part, if we all <u>cling together</u>, no force can defeat us . We will win.
- (f) We will do away with Pass Laws once and for all. There is no doubt about that. There is no need for any of our people to die from police bullets to achieve this. Discipline and an Iron will are what we need.
