

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS.

Gentlemen, as a result of the situation we find ourselves in, I consider it appropriate for me to address you in the words of the President of the SASF as expressed on Saturday 10/2/79.

"I am addressing you today, at a time when our soccer seems to be moving deeper and deeper into turbulence. A time when honesty of purpose is giving way to hatred. A time when self preservation is the order of the day. A time where cold fear of loosing out has clouded our sense of proper reasoning. Yes, it is indeed a time which is having its effect on all of us.

The year 1978 was one during which this Federation was confronted more than ever before with a number of issues. Issues of such delicate and decisive nature that became very confusing to the man in the street. The tragedy of all this being the fact that these issues were the direct result of our own making. During this period we forgot the noble teaching of what is right, for this organization and we replaced it with who is right, coupled together with the old ego of oneself.

It should however by now be obvious to all of us that the problems facing sport in this country have assumed dimensions where no single organisation or sporadic individual's efforts are capable of providing answers. What is needed now more than ever before is a united and inspired national alliance embracing the goodwill and the sincerity of the active support of all sports organisations in this country.

It is for this reason that I still believe that we must reconsider our stand on dialogue with other bodies. I submit also that at this stage no more good purpose would be served by holding talks with FASA after their great somersault. We have now exposed their lie on non-racialism and their wanting to be with us, for they want to remain masters and bosses over us at all times. This we can never allow.

I am however convinced now more than ever before that we must have meaningful dialogue with the Black soccer organisation. Let us help them to see and appreciate our stand. I know that many of them would like to join us in our struggle. Whether we like it or not we will never prosper whilst the majority of soccerites are not with us."

Today I trust that we will take the words of Mr. Middleton into account and concentrate our efforts on soccer rather than scoring debating points and discussing irrelevant matters.

MINUTES: The Minutes of the Twenty-First Annual General Meeting were read and adopted on a motion proposed by Mr.G.Moodley seconded by Mr.S.Pillay.

ARISING THEREFROM:

The Minutes of the Special General Meeting was deferred for adoption on the 12th March, 1978.

CORRESPONDENCE:

1. A letter from Manchester Rovers F.C. requesting permission to play their home fixtures, in the 2nd Division, at the Lenasia Stadium.

Permission was granted on a motion proposed by Mr.M.Kollopen seconded by Mr.B.G.Naidoo.

2. A letter from Atletico requesting permission to affiliate to the P.G.2nd Division. The matter was referred to General.

3. A letter from P.G.Tigers appealing against the suspension of Mr.Bashir Rahim. The matter was referred to the Appeal Committee.

4. A letter from Lenasia Shepherds in connection with Mr.Rahim's suspension. This was also referred to the Appeal Committee.

5. A defaulters list from P.G.Tigers. This was rejected as P.G.Tigers failed to furnish reason for the players to appear on a defaulters list.

6. A letter from the S.A.S.F. with regard to our differences with the T.S.B. As the matter had been resolved it was decided to inform Federation accordingly.

7. A letter from the Ramblers Organisation requesting permission to stage their tournament at the Lenasia Stadium. Permission was refused on a motion proposed by Mr.B.G.Naidoo seconded by Mr.A.B.Patel.

8. A letter from the Coloured and Asian Dept., of the City of Johannesburg, stating that an Athletic Meeting is to be held at the Lenasia Stadium on Saturday 18/3/78.
Read & Moted.

9. A letter from P.G.Bluebells United requesting permission for the use of the Lenasia Stadium for their home fixtures for the 1978 season.

10. A letter from Swaraj F.C. also requesting permission to use the Lenasia Stadium for their home fixtures for the 1978 season.

It was resolved on a motion proposed by Mr.B.G.Naidoo seconded by Mr.S.Pillay that permission be granted and that a joint meeting with both clubs be convened to stipulate our conditions.

11. A letter from the Coloured and Asian Affairs, of the City of Johannesburg, stating that a Special Meeting with the Lenasia Management Committee is to be held on the 27/2/78. It was resolved on a motion proposed by Mr.G.Singh seconded by Mr.P.Ajoodha that the matter be referred to the immediate Executive..

TREASURER'S FINANCIAL STATEMENT:

1. Tuck Shop Income Statement and Balance Sheet.

This was accepted on a motion proposed by Mr.B.S.Singh seconded by Mr.H.P.Dadat.

2. L.F.A. Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Statement;

The auditor, Mr.A.A.Omar, elaborated on the financial statements with reference to the Guarantee Account and Bad Debts. He further suggested that a register of bad debts that are written off be kept.

Celtic United and Swaraj Sporting queried refunds due to them. Mr.Omar stated that if these clubs claims were valid then there was no problem in refunding the respective amounts.

The financial statements were then accepted on a motion proposed by Mr.T.Pillay seconded by Mr.G.Singh.

The Chairman thanked Mr.Omar for attending our meeting and for the excellent job done.

The house suggested that we retain the services of Mr.Omar.

RECORD CLERK'S REPORT:

Mr.T.Pillay apologised for not submitting a report. The matter was deferred to the 12/3/78.

AFFILIATIONS: Affiliations were received from the following clubs: Celtic United, Lenasia Shepherds, Destroyers, Shamrocks City, Westham, Trojans, Bellevue, Leeds United, Swaraj Sporting, Swaraj Sporting A, Greyville City, Bluebells A Moonlighters, Shamrocks, Daffodils, Daring Aces and Grasmere Naughty Boys.

The above affiliations was accepted on a motion proposed by Mr.M.Kollopen seconded by Mr.G.T. Padayachee. All affiliations were referred to the fixture committee.

SECRETARIAL REPORT ON THE SEASON 1978, PRESENTED TO
THE TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, HELD AT THE
LENASIA CIVIC CENTRE ON SUNDAY 18TH FEBRUARY, 1979.

Mr. Chairman and Fellow Councillors,

The season 1978 must be dubbed as "The Great Clash of Personalities", which resulted in confusion, chaos contradiction, and most of all frustration for everyone involved in our soccer set-up.

This clash of personalities was also the direct result of the premature 'departure' of two Federation stalwarts, namely Mr. A. Bhamjee and Mr. R. K. Naidoo.

Although Mr. Bhamjee is suspended until he appears before the commission of inquiry, indications are that he will not return to the administration of the Federation.

With regard to Mr. Naidoo, it is perhaps tragic that a man of such stature 'walked out' of football because of Transvaal Soccer Board's representation at the Annual General Meeting of the Professional League.

What is most unfortunate about the personality clash between Mr. Bhamjee and Mr. Naidoo is that mischief-makers are using this to divide us on sectional basis.

We should not take them serious, for should they achieve their purpose it would result in the destruction of all that we have strived for these past years.

It is not my intention to justify either of these gentlemen's actions nor to discuss personality clashes herein. However, I want to take this opportunity to discuss two factors that have been the major cause of the chaotic state our soccer is in, namely, (in my opinion) i) the Question of Dialogue and ii) The South African Council on Sport (SACOS).

THE QUESTION OF DIALOGUE:

The question of dialogue was brought for discussion at the B.G.M. of the S.A.S.F. in July last year; it was discussed again at the Council Meeting during October in East London, and once more this past week-end in Johannesburg.

The term 'dialogue' seems to have assumed sinister connotations within our midst, and yet the Concise Oxford Dictionary defines 'dialogue' as follows:

"Conversation;;;
the conversational part in a novel."

In other words dialogue means to talk. In our instance to talk about football and how our opposition perceives non-racial (normal) sport. Should our perceptions of normal sport be the same
then.....

then there is no argument with regard to negotiating for the establishment of one controlling body for soccer. Should our perceptions of normal sport differ then naturally we cannot negotiate.

We are aware that until recently there were major differences with regard to our viewpoints on normal sport. But when we start to analyse the situation we find that our opponents have exploited our strategies.

I am of the opinion that it is healthy to talk to ones 'enemies', particularly in our South African situation.

At the SASF Council Meeting in Johannesburg this past week-end, the first significant step towards dialogue with SANFA was taken. It was resolved that Mr. G. Thabe and his Executive be invited to address a Special Council Meeting of the Federation in Bloemfontein.

It is hoped that this will be the starting point of the unification of South African football.

THE SOUTH AFRICAN COUNCIL ON SPORT:

It is apparent that SACOS has assumed new dimensions other than those it set out too on its formation.

Instead of a co-ordinating body SACOS has now become the policy making organ for all non-racial sporting codes. Not only is SACOS formulating policy but it is insisting on its implementation; this is evident when one considers the resolution on 'double standards'.

This resolution was forced upon all sportsmen belonging to the affiliates of SACOS without prior consultation with regard to its implications.

This autocratic attitude of SACOS is in direct contradiction with the principles of non-racial sport when extended into its political sphere, i.e. on the political level we accuse the Nationalist Government of making decisions for us without consulting us and yet on the sporting level SACOS is guilty of the very same.

However, this inconsistent attitude of SACOS is understandable when its President, Mr. Howa, in one breath says, 'One cannot play normal sport in an abnormal society', and in another states '....., when I say this I am not talking about one man one vote either, because I know with one man one vote even I will be swamped'.

It is obvious that if we talk about a normal society in its democratic sense we are talking of one man one vote.

While the promoters of this 'double standards resolution' are insisting on its implementation they are enjoying the fruits of the very system that is responsible for the sporting situation in South Africa.

While.....

While SACOS enjoys tremendous credibility overseas its supporters at home are becoming disillusioned with its hierarchy. SACOS must therefore assume the role that it was intended for, i.e. it should be a Council on and not of Sport.

THE TRANSVAAL SOCCER BOARD:

To eliminate the type of criticism that was levelled at it in the past, the T.S.B. made major changes to its structure.

On the administrative level a Secretariat was introduced. It was intended to involve as many persons as possible in various aspects. Unfortunately co-operation was lacking from some units. In spite of this Mr. M.Sibda did an excellent job.

Mr.H.R.Badat was elected onto the Secretariat, while our President, Mr.Lall, was elected as a Vice President of the Board. I was on the Board's delegation to Federation meetings.

The S.A.S.F.P.L. 2nd Division Tvl. became the direct responsibility of the Board. Applications from teams were considered by the full Council of the Board. This system was approved of all concerned.

A number of teams from the N.F.L. 2nd Division were included in this League. A fairly high standard of football was witnessed throughout the season. Towards mid-season Celtic United, from our Challenge League, took over from Manchester Rovers. Under the circumstances they performed very well indeed.

As in the past the Transvaal team consisted of players mainly from this League.

Representative football for the amateurs is a matter that needs urgent attention. It is obvious that the inter-district games does not serve this purpose, and some other form of representative football must be formulated. This is important; for without representative football the game will develop into a drag and our players will have nothing to strive for. Suggestions in this regard are presently be discussed and we should make positive contributions towards this.

PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL:

Our two professional teams, Bluebells United and Swaraj, did not feature prominently in the Professional League. Particularly Swaraj, who had annexed the League trophy the previous year. Swaraj's poor performance was as a direct result of the club changing hands.

The.....

The standard of football was the worst witnessed at the Stadium, this past five years. This resulted in a decrease of spectator attendance.

At the close of the season both clubs announced their defection to the NPSL. As a result one can assume that the Lenasia Stadium will once more become the bone of contention.

SPONSORSHIP:

The Simba-Quix company adopted a negative attitude with regard to their sponsorship of our K.O. competition. A letter was directed to them on the 13/6/78 requesting an interview to finalize sponsorship for the 1978 season. This letter was neither acknowledged nor replied to. The matter was pursued telephonically and after a number of calls it appeared as if all was in order. Their Mr. Fitz-Simmons then informed us that because the sale of their products at the Stadium was far too low we will not be receiving the sponsorship.

If he had informed us of their decision earlier we would not have continued with the competition. We were informed of their decision after the cup-final was played. A letter in this regard was directed to the company on the 5/12/78, and to-date no acknowledgement has been received.

There was no problem in securing the sponsorship for our Junior Division from the Bottlers of Coca-Cola; their Mr. Gover was most co-operative in this respect. Three divisions competed for the R1000,00. The respective clubs have been issued with their vouchers and are presently claiming their prizes.

Our sincere thanks to the Bottlers of Coca-Cola.

ADMINISTRATION OF OUR AFFAIRS:

With the introduction of a 'paid' secretariat it was hoped that our administration would improve. It must be pointed out that it was originally intended that the Secretariat should perform the clerical functions only and not be responsible for the administrative affairs. This function had to be performed by the various sub-committees.

As in the past these sub-committees did not function efficiently. The reasons for this are, (i) that some persons featured in almost all sub-committees, and (ii) the numerous petty problems created by the clubs.

The following.....

The Following Sub-Committees Were Appointed:

1. The Executive Committee: The Executive met at least twice a month and was responsible for the day-to-day affairs of the Association. As in the past only a few members played their part.
2. A. Protest, Inquiry and Misconduct Committee:
This committee was overburdened with the numerous petty problems and had to meet almost every week.
3. Selection Committee: This Committee did not function at all.
4. Ground and Fixture Committee: This committee planned its programme well in advance but unfortunately a number of teams withdrew. Consequently the programmes had to be revised.

Our divisions were re-graded and we saw the emergence of the Challenge League. The introduction of this League was to assist clubs and groom them for 2nd Division Professional Status.

The League was highly successful although a number of teams performed well below average.

5. Junior Association Management Committee:
Our Junior Division seems to be plagued by petty differences between members of the committee. In spite of this our Junior enjoyed a very successful season.

However, it was disheartening to read an article, in our local paper, accusing us of not assisting them. Not once during the past season did we receive a report from the Committee. When Mr. A.B. Patel took ill we acted immediately and saw to it that the activities continued.

6. Registration Committee:

The functions of this Committee were performed by the Secretariat. A new system was introduced and this resulted in our records being brought up to date. At present we have 1200 registered players. However as a result of the withdrawal of a number of teams this figure has to be altered.

7. Appeal Committee:
This Committee had to deal with four appeals during the past season.

OBITUARY:

During the past season we mourned the sad demise of some of our friends and relatives. On behalf of the Association I wish to express our deepest sympathies to those of you who have lost someone dear.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

As the clerical functions of the Association are increasing we should seriously consider employing a part time clerk.

This would leave the General Secretary and the Secretary free to perform functions of a more administrative nature.

THANKS AND APPRECIATION:

I want to record our sincere thanks and appreciation to all those individuals and institutions for their assistance advice and interest shown in our affairs.

CONCLUSION:

Today we may be called upon to take some far reaching decisions, I trust that we will do so in the interest of football and not for any other reason.


