1) I asked Bob about PAC's membership figures. I told him tt I doubted them, but it I trusted him, and if he gave me an assurance it, as far as he knew, t figures were genuine, I wd accept his word without reservation. He immediately assured me tt t 25,000 figure wa genuine. He ad tt he wd be frank and tell me tt when their membership drive first began, they went all out for numbers, without bothering about ensuring tt each and every person was fully aware of his obligations as a PAC member. They hd intended "weeding out" later. They therefore hd a certain amouth of dead wood among their membership. T emphasis now ws on getting a good quality of member. He ad also tt they were experiencing organisational difficulties in collecting their monthly subs. He admitted to there we quite a difference between collecting t initial 2/6 membership sub, and then raking in t regular monthly subs.

COMMENT: I am prepared to accept Bob's word on t membership figure without reservation - except of course as qualified by his further remarks about t dead wood. I am wix afraid tt I do not know that proportion of t total this dead wood constitutes.

- 2) A PAC national executive meeting wa held over t Sept 5 to 7 weekend. Among t subjects discussed wat unti-pass campaign due for early next year. Bob ad tt t matter wd be discussed again at a national conference to be held on Dec 16. either in Jbg or East London. T details of t campaign wd be finalised at t conference, but t starting-date wd be kept secret. He intimated tt t campaign wd be launched early next year. (PS It will be recalled to this campaign is being waged through various dissident-SACTU trade Unions, principally in t baking, garment worker and laundry fields. Although there is quite a lot of support for PAC in t unions, t fact tt PAC is behind t campaign is being kept quiet. T paintrin plan is tt on a certain date, t workers in t unions - totalling about 14,000 - will leave their passes at home and report to t police station on their way to work. I campaign will be nder t slogan of "no bail, no fine, no defence." Prior to t campaign, letters will be written to employers making asking for assistance against workers carrying passes - obviously there will be no response.)
- 3) Bob ad tt he hd heard tt some Whitez leftists in Congress had been having discussion with G.M. Pitje with a view to replacing t present national leadership of the ANC. (from t way Bob spoke, I think he hd got this information from Pitje). I subject arose when I happened to mention tt I thought tt Pitje wa one of t few really good ANC men. Bob smiled and sd tt Pitje ws not so happy He sd tt t idea behind t discussions, wexxtex as he thought Vic descidences desired, wa to "get t Communists out of t ANC, but to leave t Communist programme." He did not know how far t discussions hd got. (Beb also sd tt be thought tt Pitje ws "confused" in his thinking).

COMMENT: I have been trying to see Vic to sound him out about this. It is. obviously, if correct, a most promising development, because Pitje is turfact I think I very good person, who ha deliberately kept himself largely in t backgriund up to now. He is in charge of t ANC's education policy - whatever this impressive descrippion might mean.
