#### INTRODUCTION

The historical materials in this catalogue were assembled in the process of writing volumes 5, 6, and 7 of From Protest to Challenge: a Documentary History of African Politics in South Africa 1882-1990, published by Indiana University Press in the United States and the University of South Africa Press in South Africa. The Catalogue serves as a guide to the microfilms of the Karis-Gerhart Collection, available through the Cooperative Africana Microform Project (CAMP) of the Center for Research Libraries, 6050 South Kenwood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, 60637-4545, USA, as well as to the Collection itself, which is housed in the Cullen Library of the University of the Witwatersrand in Johannesburg.

From Protest to Challenge uses primary sources to present the history of South Africa's freedom struggle in the words of those who were its active participants. The idea of producing such a history was first conceived in the 1960s by American scholars Thomas Karis and Gwendolen Carter. Their work, with that of Sheridan Johns and Gail Gerhart, resulted in the publication of a four volume series by the Hoover Institution Press at Stanford University in the 1970s. The series covered the years 1882-1964. The first three volumes included primary source documents plus explanatory text placing the documents in historical context. Volume 4 was a political who's who of extraparliamentary opposition in the 1882-1964 period. The documents, interviews, and biographical materials used in producing the first four volumes were deposited at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. The collection was microfilmed and a guide to the microfilms, South African Political Materials: a Catalogue of the Carter-Karis Collection, compiled by Susan Wynne, was published in 1977.

In the late 1980s, Thomas Karis and Gail Gerhart decided to update the series and began work on three new volumes. Volume 5, which covers the years 1964 to 1979, appeared in 1997, and volume 6 (1980-1990) and volume 7 (a political who's who for 1964-1990) are scheduled for publication in the year 2000. Five new authors have participated in writing the update series: Teresa Barnes, Clive Glaser, Antony Levine, David Lewis, and Nimrod Mkele.

Prospective users of the Carter-Karis and Karis-Gerhart Collections should note that the several hundred primary source documents reproduced in From Protest to Challenge represent only a tiny fraction of the many thousands of documents included in these two collections. While the books serve as an introduction to the history of the struggle for democracy in South Africa, serious researchers will want to examine the documentary iceberg that lies under that tantalizing tip.

Our purpose in assembling these collections was to create a database from which we could study South Africa's history and produce the From Protest to Challenge books. In searching for useful material, we surveyed several dozen public and private collections in Britain, the United States, and South Africa (where visa denials made our access problematic for varying periods during the apartheid years). Copies of other documents were acquired through the generosity of dozens of individuals, including South African lawyers who donated, or permitted the authors to photocopy, documentary exhibits from five landmark trials: the Treason Trial of 1956-61, the SASO Nine trial of 1975-76, the Pietermaritzburg treason trial of 1985, and the Delmas and Moses Mayekiso trials of the late 1980s.

We have sometimes been credited with preserving historical documents that might otherwise have been lost. In fact, only a very small percentage of the documents in the collections fall into this one-of-a-kind category. In respect to all other documents in these archives, we have benefited from and built upon the collecting and preserving efforts of others. Acknowledgments in the separate volumes of From Protest to Challenge and the Source Key in this catalogue indicate the range of our debts. We are also indebted to the hundreds of South Africans whom we have interviewed, formally and informally, over many years. The records of these conversations form a unique part of the collections.

Where the greatest strength of the From Protest to Challenge collections lies is that they draw together in one place a wealth of materials on certain centrally important political organizations — in the 1964-1990 period, for example, the African National Congress, the Pan Africanist Congress, Inkatha, the black consciousness organizations, and the United Democratic Front. Other important organizations with extensive records — NUSAS, the Black Sash, church bodies and trade unions, for example — are much less well represented, in part because well-consolidated or even microfilmed archives of these organizations already exist. In 1996, after the completion of the manuscript of volume 5, a portion of the extensive exile archives of the ANC became available at the University of Fort Hare, and were surveyed for material relevant to the writing of volumes 6 and 7. At the time of producing this catalogue, however, much pre-1990 ANC material still remains closed, as do the official exile records of the PAC. Thus, large as the From Protest to Challenge collections may appear to be, they represent only a small fraction of the total corpus of historical material that is available, actually and potentially, on anti-apartheid and South African extraparliamentary organizations.

The story of South Africa's freedom struggle has only begun to be told. It is our hope that by facilitating access to historical raw materials, we may contribute to the future work of other writers and researchers in the field of South African studies.

#### USING THE CATALOGUE

#### Part I: Interviews

Interviews are listed alphabetically by the name of the person interviewed.

A list of interviewees appears on pp. 1-21.

#### Part II: Political Trials

Trials are organized by year (the year the trial began). Within each year, trials are listed alphabetically, in most cases by the name of the first accused.

A list of the trials appears on pp. 22-27.

#### **Part III: Political Documents**

Documents are listed chronologically, either

- (a) under the organization which issued them (or the organization with which their authors were identified), or
- (b) under a miscellaneous organizational category (e.g. Youth organizations—Miscellaneous, Journalists Miscellaneous)

Organizations and miscellaneous organizational categories are listed alphabetically. Some documents are cross-listed under more than one organization or category. Serials (i.e. periodicals numbered by volume and/or number) appear under their issuing organizations, at the end of the listing for the organization.

The table of contents for Part III appears on pp. 29-35.

#### **Part IV: Trade Union Documents**

Trade union documents are listed chronologically under their issuing organizations. Issuing organizations are listed alphabetically. Serials appear under their issuing organizations, at the end of the listing for the organization.

The table of contents for Part IV appears on pp. 449-450.

#### Part V: Biographical Files

Biographical files are listed alphabetically in two categories, Main Files and Supplementary Files.

The Main Files contain information on persons who appear in volume 7 of From Protest to Challenge, which is a political who's who.

The Supplementary Files contain information on other persons who were prominent in the politics of the 1964-1990 period but who are not profiled in volume 7 (with some exceptions still undetermined at the time of printing this Catalogue).
