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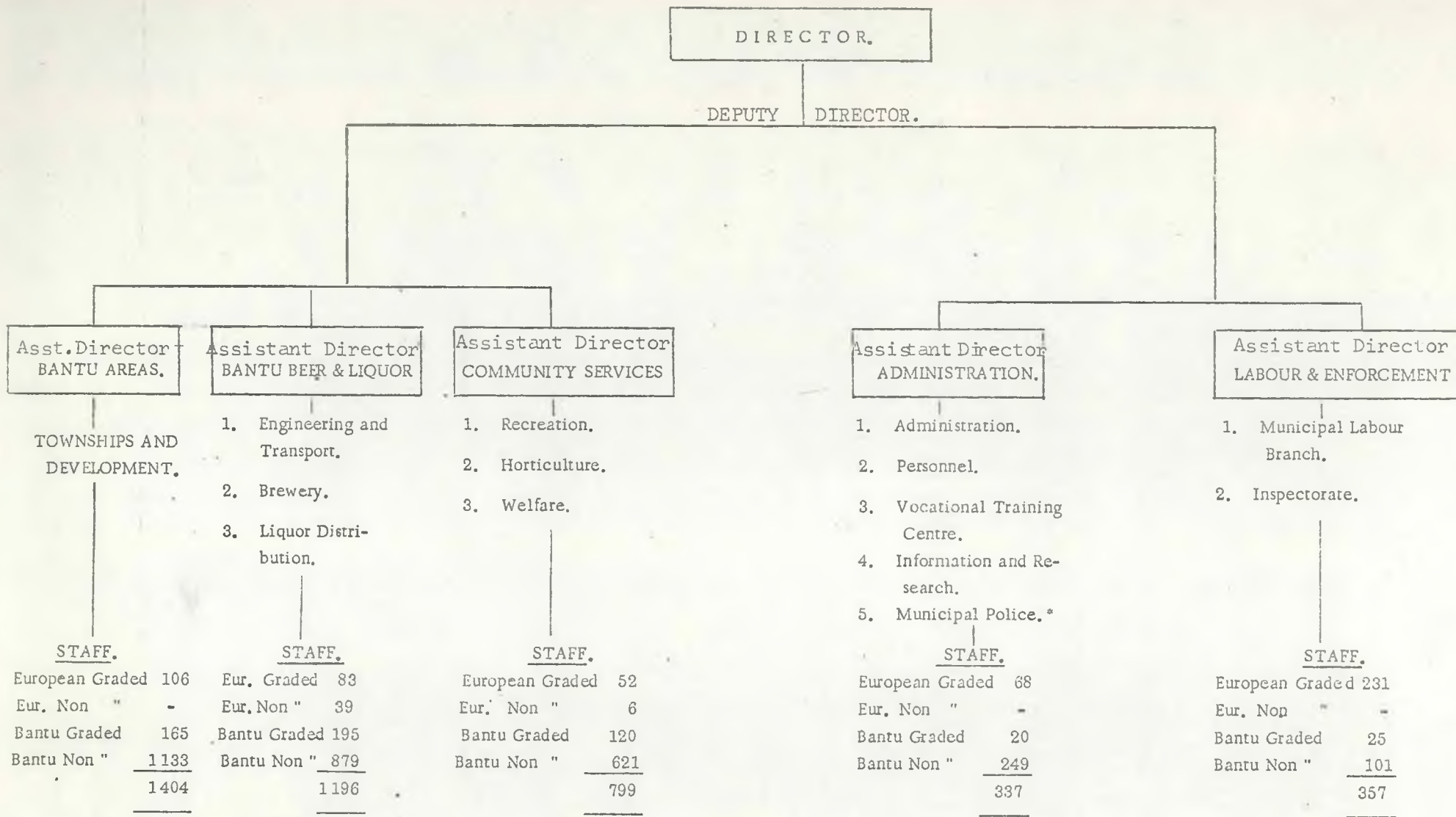

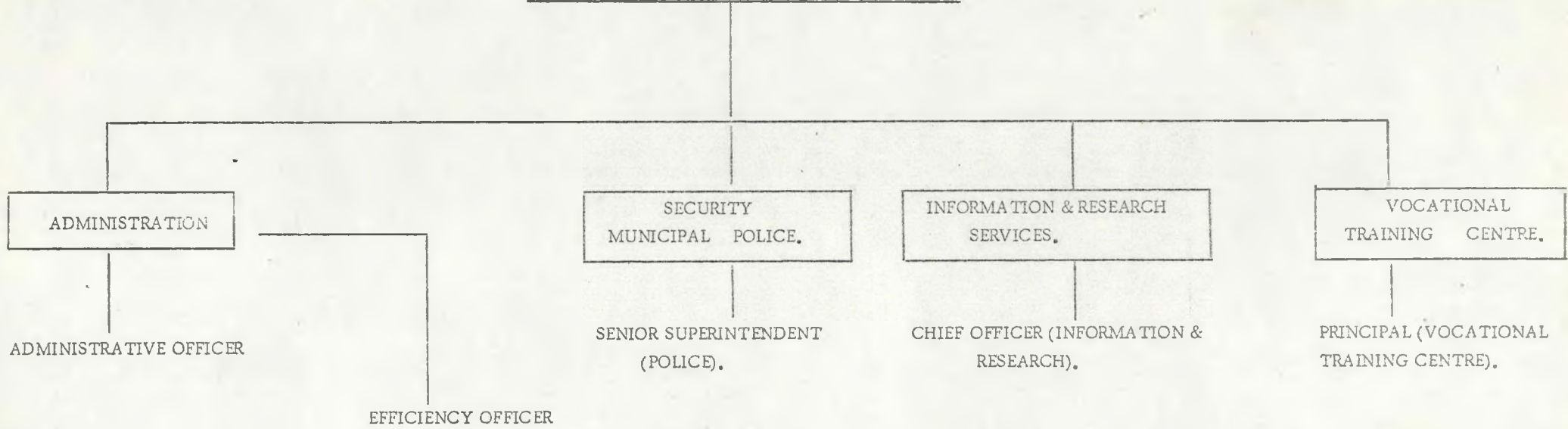

# ADMINISTRATION

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR (ADMINISTRATION).





## ADMINISTRATION BRANCH.

### PURPOSE

The purpose of this branch is the establishment of an administrative service for the performance of the functions of the Department.

### FUNCTIONS.

1. The efficient organisation of the Department and personnel management which includes, inter alia: recruiting, placing, job descriptions, training and merit rating.
2. The provision of office accommodation, furnishing and the provision of stationery as well as the insurance of all assets. This function involves the control of quantity and quality and the keeping of a complete list of assets.
3. The provision of security measures. This branch controls the Municipal Police.
4. The maintaining of the record system of the Department.
5. The provision of typing and copying services.
6. The control of the information and research section.
7. Management and control of the Vocational Training Centre.
8. The planning and control of capital, revenue and expenditure.

ADMINISTRATION BRANCH

POLICE SECTION

The Municipal Police assists European officials in maintaining law and order in the Bantu residential areas and hostels. The section consists of approximately 1 100 Bantu Constables and N.C.Os.

The Headquarters and training College are situated in Dube.

By enactment all Municipal Police are "authorised officers". The particular duties which result from this fact, as well as their varied nature, justify thorough training.

The Training College provides for 120 recruits during every period of training, the duration of which normally varies between three and four months. Training includes a study of law and administration, drill, first aid and fire fighting.

A fire engine which operates from Police Headquarters is manned by Bantu constables under supervision of a European NCO of the Johannesburg Fire Department.

A special unit for the combat of crime operates throughout Soweto and is assisted by a Mobile Unit. The Mobile Unit consists of 20 vehicles equipped with radios connected to all Superintendents' offices as well as Headquarters. Apart from the assistance rendered to the Combat Unit, it is also required to protect Council property at all times.

It is frequently required of Superintendents in the Townships and hostels to control and regulate large crowds and they are assisted herein by the Municipal Police.

This section is not a police force in the true sense of the word but specialises in the prevention of crime and the protection of Council property. Where necessary, the section co-operates fully with the South African Police.



## INFORMATION AND RESEARCH SECTION

The Section consists of two sub-sections under the control of a Chief Officer who, in reality, is the Liaison Officer of the Department.

### INFORMATION SECTION.

The Information Section is in close liaison with the Press, Radio and other communication mediums. The booklet, "Soweto - A City within a City" is in great demand amongst local residents, but especially amongst overseas visitors. It supplies information regarding recreation facilities and housing for Bantu. The publication, "Your Bantu Servant and You" is equally in demand and is presently being re-printed. The Section is constantly preparing pamphlets and publications for distribution.

The daily bus tours to Soweto succeed well in conveying the South African image to visitors. The average monthly number of visitors has already exceeded the thousand mark.

### RESEARCH SECTION.

The Research Section consists of a Research Officer, assisted by five assistants. Research being the basis of any information service, this Section furnishes important information in respect of statistics, tendencies in respect of population growth, housing requirements, income and expenditure of Bantu families, etc. The work and value of this Section are ever increasing in importance, especially in so far as the compilation of data for long term future planning is concerned. Research projects already undertaken have furnished voluminous valuable information to the Council, Department of Bantu Administration and Development and to Commerce and Industry.

## VOCATIONAL TRAINING CENTRE

The School started training Bantu boys as artisans 27 years ago (the present Principal already has 24 years service). During this period the school offered three year courses to Bantu boys as follows:-

The School also provides training for electricians as wiremen and 111 boys have already obtained their NTC.II Certificates in preparation for their practical training. This course has been discontinued this year as the practical instruction has been taken over by the Electricity Department. The Polokwane Training Centre provides the theoretical tuition.

During the past few years, an average of 58 boys per year qualified to be registered as artisans in terms of the Bantu Building Workers Act.

Although Standard 6 is the minimum educational requirement for admission to the School, quite a number of scholars proceed to Standard 8 before enrolling at the School. All scholars must qualify as permanent residents in the prescribed area of Johannesburg.

All courses offered are spread over a period of 3 years. The tuition fees amount to R8,00 per annum and the scholars are responsible for their own overalls, books and drawing instruments. All other tools and materials required for training, are supplied by the School.

The scholars are encouraged to obtain a triple qualification, i.e. a school certificate for a 3-year training period at a recognised trades school; the Bantu Building Workers Diploma issued by the Department of Labour and the National Technical Certificate I for the subject in which they specialize. After the successful completion of the courses the artisans are absorbed by Council Departments operating in Soweto.

The School is registered with the Department of Education, but is managed by the Non-European Affairs Department of the Council. Tuition is only provided on weekdays. It starts at 7.55 a.m. with religious devotions and closes at 3.30 p.m. Two thirds of the time is spent on practical training and the remainder on theoretical training and language studies. Use is made of audio-visual aids in theoretical tuition.

The School also provides extramural activities and has excellent soccer and other sports teams which are the holders of various trophies won at inter-school competitions.

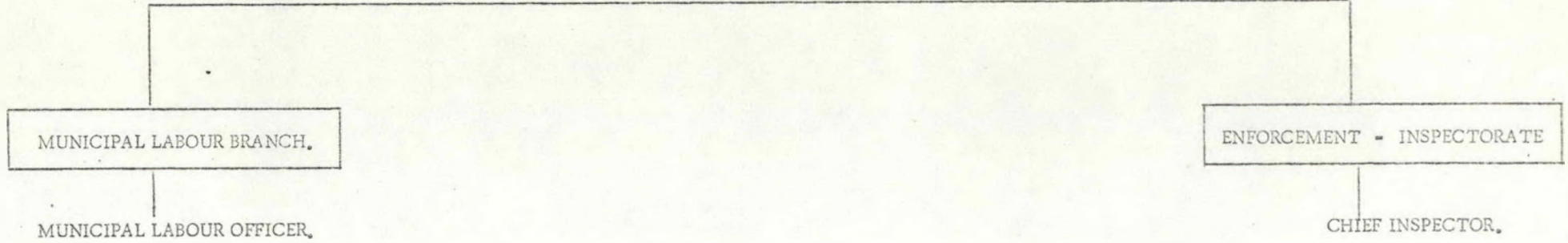
The purpose of the school is to provide qualified artisans to enable the Council to continue with housing schemes.

This year the School has a roll of 63 builders, 70 carpenters and 56 plumbers.

The Municipal Labour Branch is responsible for the control of the influx of male and female Bantu to the prescribed area of Johannesburg, to place Bantu in suitable employment and to register the service contracts.

The following Acts and Regulations are mainly administered by this Branch:-

Bantu (Urban Areas) Consolidation Act 1945 (Act 25 of 1945)

Bantu Labour Act 1964 (Act 67 of 1964)

Bantu Labour Regulations (Government Notice R1892 of 3rd December, 1965)

In the execution of its duties it is also the endeavour of the Branch to create better relations between employer and employee.

In order to render better service, the Department saw fit to establish 11 sub-offices in Soweto, as well as 5 sub-offices in European Areas, where approximately 1 000 cases are dealt with daily. At the Head Office and at the sub-Branch for Bantu females at Polly Street approximately 4 000 Bantu are attended to daily.

In order to curb crime and vagrancy, a youth employment office has been established in Soweto where juveniles are assisted to obtain suitable employment. Female juveniles are assisted by the Labour Bureau at Polly Street.



It is worthy of note that the registered Bantu Labour force for Johannesburg as at the end of September, 1971 was as follows:-

At the end of September, 1971, the percentage of unemployment for Bantu males was 0,41% and for Bantu females 1,25%.

Approximately 70 000 domestic servants are employed in European areas but it is difficult to establish how many are housed on the premises of their employers.

However, approximately 10 000 domestic servants are licensed for accommodation as second or third servants on their employers' premises.

With the exception of approximately 42 000 Bantu housed under licence by their employers, the 10 000 Bantu licensed as second or third domestic servants and the unknown number of domestic servants resident on their employers' premises, the Labour force is housed in houses or hostels in the proclaimed Bantu residential areas or in hostels in the European area.

Every workseeker gets at least one free medical examination per year and approximately 14 000 medical examinations are carried out monthly by the Medical Officers attached to the Branch.

It is also interesting to note that approximately 2 500 employers in Johannesburg employ more than 20 Bantu each, whilst 80 000 employers employ less than 20 Bantu each.

During the year ended 30th September, 1971, approximately 16 000 Bantu males and females were placed in suitable employment by the Branch.

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The Inspectorate is responsible for the enforcement of Acts and Regulations applicable to the employment of Bantu in the Prescribed Area of Johannesburg, the housing of Bantu in the "European Area" of Johannesburg and for fees payable by employers.

The duties of the Inspectorate can be summarised as follows:-

Controlling the engagement of Bantu;

Licensing and inspection of premises for the housing of Bantu;

Scrutinising plans for Bantu Residential quarters;

Scrutinising wage registers with the object of controlling payments of Services Levy fees and other charges;

Investigating applications for licences in terms of the Group Areas Act in respect of Bantu eating houses in the European Area of the City;

Control and supervision of Court documents and actions of the Department in the Magistrate's and Bantu Affairs Commissioner's Courts;

Control of and action against Bantu vagrants in the Bantu Affairs Commissioner's Court.

For the purpose of achieving a more efficient functioning of the Inspectorate, the prescribed area was recently divided into 12 areas. Each area is controlled by 1 Senior Inspector and 3 to 5 Inspectors. One Senior Inspector, 5 Inspectors and 2 Bantu Inspectors were made available for full time duties at the Bantu Affairs Commissioner's Courts and 2 Inspectors are stationed on full time duty at John Vorster Square to assist the S.A. Police in investigations involving forgery of reference books and other control documents.

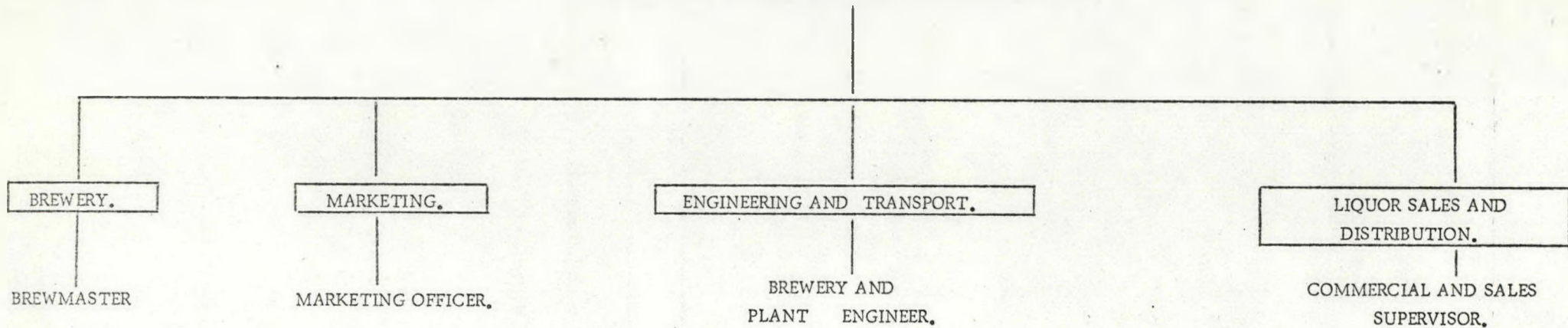

BANTU BEER

PRODUCTION

The Bantu Beer Brewery at Langlaagte was erected at a cost of R3 533 761 and commenced production in January 1967. Production capacity is approximately 682 500 litres (150 000 gall.) per day.

Average annual quantity of raw materials used in the brewing process:-

Kaffir-corn Malt	7 211 775 Kg (14 827 979 lbs.)
Grits	10 641 000 Kg (22 764 000 lbs.)
Yeast	4 221 Kg (8 782 lbs.)
Water	46 776 730 litres (10 280 600 gall.)
Coal (for use in boilers)	3 473 370 Kg (7 973 470 lbs.)

The annual total cost of ingredients used, amount to approximately R1½-million. Approximately 160 000 one-litre cartons are used daily for the packaging of the Bantu beer consumed.

The revenue derived from the sale of the husks which is sold as cattle feed, amounts to R123 700 annually.

NUMBER OF VEHICLES IN USE FOR DISTRIBUTION OF BANTU BEER

Seven tankers varying in size from 1 000 to 3 600 gallons are used for the delivery of beer in bulk;

Four trucks, specially equipped for the purpose, are used for delivery of packaged beer;

Average deliveries vary between 22 and 26 daily.

There are 16 Beer gardens and 10 Beer depots. The revenue derived from the sale of Bantu Beer amounts to approximately R4½-million annually.

The annual nett profit amounts to R862 000.

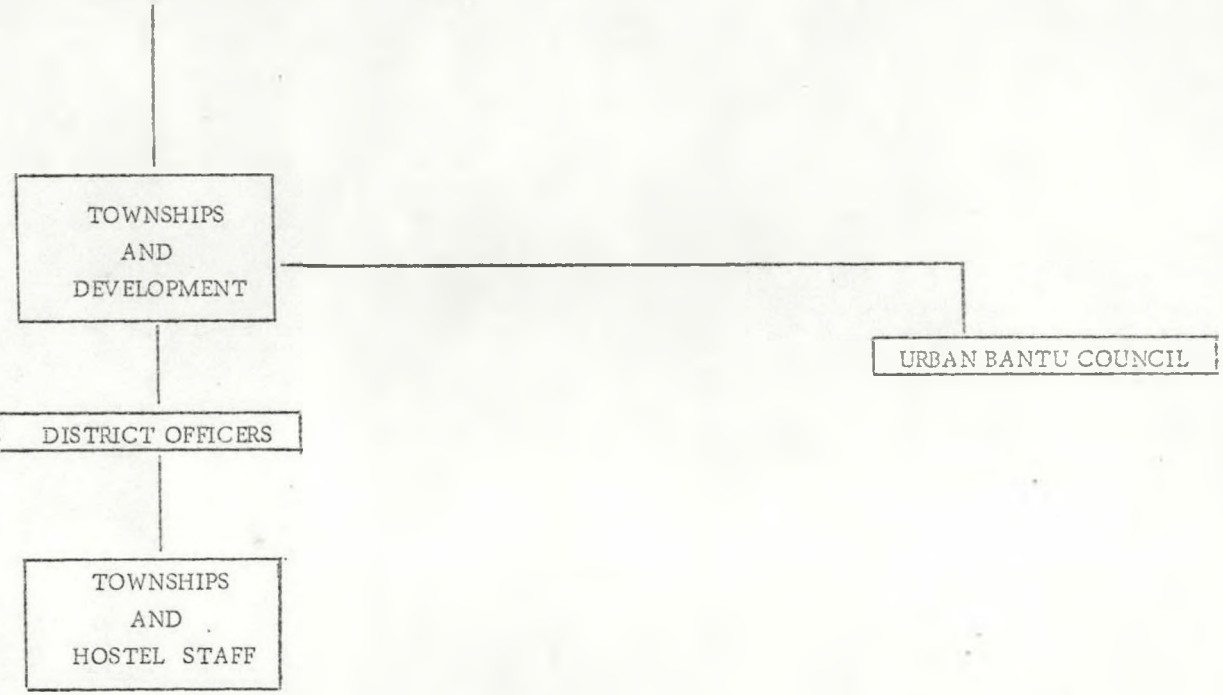

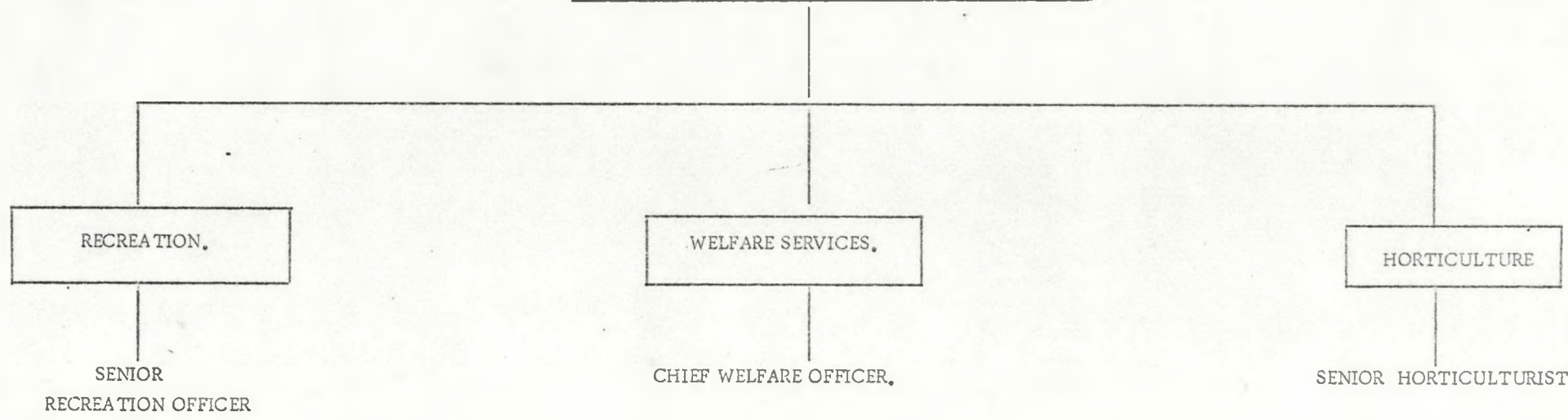

COMMUNITY SERVICES BRANCH

The Community Services Branch provides almost all the facilities for sport, recreation, culture and social welfare for the Bantu in Soweto. The Branch operates through 6 sections staffed by European as well as Bantu personnel, of whom approximately half has had specialised training.

RECREATION

The following facilities are provided:-

1 Amphitheatre	24 Club Houses
3 Stadia	4 Recreation Halls
93 Sports Fields	39 Children's Playgrounds
74 Basketball Courts	6 Skittle Alleys
4 Swimming Pools	4 Dance Arenas
2 Concrete Cycle Tracks	3 Athletic Tracks
42 Tennis Courts	1 Bowling Green

Floodlights are being installed in certain football fields and tennis courts and 11 change rooms are provided at various sports fields.

The Section promotes physical recreation for the population with special facilities for the children.

PLAYGROUNDS

All playgrounds are equipped with slides, swings, etc. and are so situated that no child is more than  $\frac{1}{2}$ -mile from one.

YOUTH SPORT

Football, soft ball, basketball, tennis, cycling, athletics and swimming are organised and technical advice provided for school children.

ADULT SPORT

The same sporting facilities as for the youth are provided for adults, but the organisation of adult sport is undertaken by the respective Associations, the Recreation Section merely giving technical advice.

In addition, 23 clubs at which physical culture, boxing and weightlifting are practised, are supervised between 6 and 9 p.m.

At three Council hostels there is a full-time organiser who arranges concerts, choir singing, boxing, weightlifting, skittles, various sports and cinema shows for the inmates.

CINEMAS

Free cinema shows are given nightly, except Saturdays and Sundays, at Council Compounds and Hostels. Educational shows are given to children at Naledi and Orlando Communal Halls and at the Juvenile Employment Centre



in Central Western Jabavu.

### HORTICULTURE

The Horticultural Section is responsible for the grassed areas of the sportsfields and also for all parks, public gardens, grassed areas, street trees, cemeteries and general beautification schemes.

This section is responsible for the lawns, pools, open-air stage and dam at Mofolo Park.

The Bowling Green and two Golf Courses are also the responsibility of this section.

Fruit trees are provided for every new house. Hedge plants are sold to householders. Free advice is given to schools and householders.

### WELFARE

A welfare worker is stationed at every Superintendent's office to assist the residents. The service includes the following:-

Advice and guidance

Cash Grants

Assistance with applications for food parcels, pensions and Government grants

Arrangements for suspension of rent commitments.

The Section handles more than 1 000 cases every month. Social Workers ensure that families of breadwinners who are incapacitated or deceased are assisted. They also arrange re-employment of breadwinners when they are fit.

### REHABILITATION AND YOUTH SERVICES

The Section runs 3 Play Centres for a total of 250 children.

It also runs 30 Youth Clubs with a total membership of 4 000.

Activities include:

Sport

Drama

Singing

Dancing

Handcraft

Debating

Children are taken to camps at sea and, when available, to the Circus.

There are 10 women's clubs at which cooking and homecraft are taught.

At Orlando Sheltered Workshops 115 disabled workers produce handwoven articles, cane baskets and sports nets. The workers also undertake packaging for various firms.

CULTURE

The Cultural Section holds classes for adults in every major branch of the arts, including music, painting, sculpture and dancing.

It trains musicians in classical music and has a small orchestra. It also runs classes in ballroom dancing and ballet. Children are taught piano, music theory and all string and wind instruments. It trains a children's orchestra.

Films are shown and lectures given monthly on music and art.

The Section trains 5 brass bands. It runs an annual Festival along Eisteddfod lines.

BURSARIES AND GRANTS

The Branch Administers 130 Council School and University Bursaries. (The latter includes Medicine, Social Work, Commerce, Science and Education).

It administers 85 grants-in-aid, totalling R160 000 p.a. to welfare organisations.

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
