Rommel Between Devil And Deep Sea

NET RAPIDLY CLOSING ON TUNIS-BIZERTA SEABOARD

SO RAPIDLY HAVE THE ALLIES ADVANCED SINCE ROMMEL'S PRECIPITATE WITHDRAWAL AT WADI AKARIT REPORTED LAST WEEK THAT AFTER HIS ABANDONMENT OF SFAX, SOUSSE AND LATELY KAIROUAN HE IS NOW VIRTUALLY BETWEEN THE DEVIL AND THE DEEP SEA. FIGHTING IN CENTRAL TUNISIA IS OVER, AND THE ALLIES ARE RAPIDLY CLOSING THE NET ON THE TUNIS-BIZERTA SEABOARD.

THE ENEMY, WHOSE POSITION IS GRADUALLY DETERIORATING, IS EXPECTED TO MAKE A DETERMINED STAND AT A LINE INSIDE THE MOUNTAINOUS AREA ROUND AND ABOUT PORT DU FAHS WHICH IS LESS THAN 50 MILES FROM TUNIS. HE IS REPORTED TO BE DIGGING IN ALREADY IN THAT AREA.

IN THE MEANTIME ROMMEL'S WORRIES ARE BEING INCREASED BY GENERAL ANDERSON'S PUSH NEARER BIZERTA AND TUNIS IN THE FAR NORTH ALONG THE BEJA-MEDJEZ EL BAB ROAD. THE ALLIES ARE THRUSTING SEVERAL MILES NEAR MATEUR IN THE NORTH WHICH IS 20 MILES FROM BIZERTA AND AT MEDJEZ EL BAB IN THE SOUTH OF MATEUR.

Allied Drive Developing

The Medjez el Bab salient constitutes a threat to the Germans, as the Allies stand on the edge of the Tunis plain, across which the town and port of Tunis are only 30 miles distant.

A Reuter's message states that as the Eighth Army rushes northwards the Axis movement becomes slower and the general state of its defence areas is becoming stabilised. Early in the week activity along the whole front was characterised by many movements, but most of them were on a small scale.

In the Eighth Army's area patrols press on, maintaining contact with Rommel's rearguards. They have reached Enfidaville, the eastern anchor of the Axis line, says Algier radio.

To the left of the Eighth Army the French forces have now joined in the northward drive and have crossed the pass through the eastern side of the Grand Dorsale from Oussetta towards Kairouan. A French communiqué reported that the French have completed the occupation of the entire eastern Dorsale north-west of Kairouan. So far they have taken nearly 1,000 prisoners, and have reached a point within 30 miles of Port du Fahs.

Between the Eighth Army and the French, British units are advancing from Kairouan. The drive has developed well and the British are 15

JAPANESE AIR OFFENSIVE CRUSHED

MASSING OF BIG FORCE REPORTED

The big Japanese air offensive in the South-west Pacific which began towards the past week-end has made a disastrous start. On Sunday and Monday, said a Tuesday's communiqué from General MacArthur's headquarters (quoted by Reuter) the enemy suffered a smashing defeat at the hands of the Allied Air Forces, which shot out of action at least 76 planes—37 over Port Moresby alone.

Following the furious battle over Oré Bay, in New Guinea, on Monday in which the Japanese had 23 planes shot out of action, about 100 enemy planes, evenly divided into bombers and fighters, attacked the Port Moresby aero-drome areas before noon.

BITTER ACTIONS

In a series of bitter air actions the Allied fighters completely defeated the Japanese. Twenty-nine of their planes were shot out of action, comprising 19 bombers and 10 fighters, and an additional two bombers were destroyed and six probables claimed by the anti-aircraft batteries, which engaged the enemy with telling effect.

BIG FORCE MASSING

The newspaper, "Honolulu Advertiser," in an editorial, has issued a warning that Japan has been quietly massing a tremendous force in the Pacific for a big-scale attack while the Allies in the South-west Pacific have been fighting a holding action with a token force.

miles north-west of the town. At this stage of the fighting a pause in operations for regrouping would not be unusual, it is stated.

The Eighth Army, the Americans and British from Fondouk, and the French have all been involved in heavy fighting and in the arduous task of keeping contact with the Axis by fast pursuit. Furthermore, the Allied armies now face the problem of stiffer resistance to be expected on a greatly contracting front. The enemy's retreat has enabled him to concentrate his forces on a considerable scale.

In the north the British First Army has just completed operations which have deprived the Germans of the initiative in this area.

ROMMEL'S FLIGHT TO ITALY

It is reported from Vichy that Rommel on Tuesday flew to Italy for an urgent conference with the German naval chief, Admiral Doenitz, and the Italian Chief of Staff and other high Italian naval and military officers.

LOYAL JAPS FIGHT FOR AMERICA

The War Department in Washington has announced that 2,500 United States born Japanese soldiers have arrived at San Francisco from Hawaii and will go to Mississippi to join the recently-formed Japanese-American combat team.

SPAIN TO BECOME A MONARCHY?

Many people in Spain are now convinced that before the end of the war Spain must become a monarchy again if another civil war is to be avoided. There are still probably half a million political prisoners in Spanish gaols, and they and their families are itching for revenge on the Falangists. Only a king, as head of the State, could possibly quell the passions that will arise in both camps when the United Nations win the war.

TOLL OF ENEMY IN MEDITERRANEAN

British submarines and the air forces of north-west Africa, Malta and the Middle East are ceaselessly taking disastrous toll of Axis shipping and transport planes carrying supplies to the German forces in Tunisia, and round-the-clock attacks are being kept up on ports, airfields and railways on the north coast of the Mediterranean as far east as the Aegean.

ITALY'S DIFFICULTIES

Rumours are again circulating in neutral capitals and French circles about the serious position in Italy and the possibility of an early withdrawal from the war.

These rumours have been greatly stimulated by Archbishop Spellman's recent visit to the Vatican and by the arrival in London of Mr. F. d'Arcy Osborne, British Minister to the Holy See.

Abortive German Drive At Leningrad

After a determined German attack, which proved abortive, between Leningrad and Lake Ilmen in Russia early in the week the enemy left more than 2,000 men killed on the field in a single day of savage fighting.

The attack was started by the Germans and was aimed at re-establishing the blockade of Leningrad by cutting the city's lifeline with the east. The enemy attacked with a considerable force and made five savage thrusts which were ultimately repulsed by the Russians with punishment.

The Germans are expected to renew the attack. Their airforce is concentrated in great strength on this front and air battles are being fought out with Soviet fighter-planes day and night.

While there is a concentration of German air strength on the Volkov front, states Reuter, the latest reports suggest that the Germans are short of bombers on the Karelian front, further north.

WINTER STILL PERSISTS

The Karelian front is the only sector where the rigours of winter still persist. Skirmishes and raids by ski troops are the most characteristic feature of military activity there.

The air war was early in the week the main news from the Kuban, where General Maslenikov's ground forces are still held up by the weather.

DICTATORS MEET IN "CORDIALITY"

An official announcement from Hitler's headquarters, quoted by the German radio on Sunday night, announced that Hitler and Mussolini met at the former's headquarters from April 7 to April 10. The discussions, said the announcement, took place in an atmosphere of the "utmost cordiality."

The communiqué stated: "There was detailed discussion on the general political situation as well as on all problems of common strategy. Complete agreement was achieved about measures to be taken in all fields. The measures to be taken in all fields. The Fuhrer and the Duce once again expressed their firm determination and the determination of all the forces to fight until final victory is won and every future peril threatening European and African areas, either from the east or west, eliminated."

18,000 AFRICAN BLIND

In a memorandum submitted to the National Health Services Commission on Tuesday by Dr. A. Sichel and Dr. J. S. du Toit, on behalf of the Ophthalmological Society of South Africa, it was stated that up to last September more than 18,000 Africans in the Union were certified as blind.

Eight thousand of the cases were said to be due to cataract, and in nearly 5,000 cases the cause was unknown, indicating the need for examination by qualified eye specialists. Probably in a very large proportion of cases blindness might have been prevented by the early recognition and treatment of the cause.

The great majority of eye specialists were against a full-time State medical service, said the memorandum. Ophthalmologists, however, were unanimously in favour of a full-time State medical service in the Native territories.

AN AFRICAN "DEPOSITS MONEY IN POND"

It is learned from the Natal "Daily News" that in the morning of last Friday week a 30-year-old African threw silver coins into the fishpond in front of the grave of the Unknown Soldier at the Durban Cenotaph in Gardner Street saying these words: "This is my bank—that soldier can look after my money for me."

A mystified crowd watched him. About noon he returned with another large quantity of silver, which he also threw into the pond. Asked by curious bystanders why he was doing that, he replied that he had withdrawn his money from a bank and was "depositing" it in the pond, where it would be watched over by the Unknown Soldier.

An hour later he reappeared for the third time with more silver, which he again threw into the pond.

But, alas, until late in the afternoon, small boys busily scoured the fishpond and there can be little of his money left.

From the quantity thrown in, it is believed that the "deposit" must have been of the value of several pounds.

UNIQUE VACATION COURSE FOR TEACHERS

A vacation course unique in Native education in South Africa has just been completed at the Bantu Sports Ground, Johannesburg, by Native teachers. Mr. J. V. N. de Jager, Circuit Inspector for Native Education, in the Transvaal was the originator of the scheme, and, with the permission of the Transvaal Education Department, organised the course.

Forty men in his circuit, which includes part of Johannesburg, Newclare and Sophiatown, and extends as far as Benoni and Vereeniging, attended the course during their Easter holidays, while many teachers, both men and women, attended what lectures they could. At some of the lectures over 70 were present.

QUOTA OF BLANKETS RELEASED

The needier sections of the population, particularly Africans in the rural areas, will benefit during the coming winter from a "release" of a certain quota of National Mark blankets authorised by the Controller of Textiles for distribution in the Pretoria and Northern Transvaal zone.

Only traders who imported a minimum of 500 blankets and rugs a year prior to 1939, will be entitled to claim their share.

Rommel's Day Of Reckoning

The war in North Africa is reaching its climax. The Eighth Army's brilliant victories in Libya, at Mareth and Wadi Akarit in Tunisia have brought Hitler's Afrika Korps very near to its day of reckoning. Rommel's forces are now fighting with their backs to the Mediterranean sea. To escape annihilation they must find a "Dunkirk" but it does not look as if this is possible. The Eighth Army is no longer fighting the Axis forces alone, it has joined hands with the American, French and British armies which are attacking the Germans and Italians in central and northern Tunisia, steadily pushing them towards the sea.

Then there is the Royal Navy ready to intercept ships that might be sent to evacuate Rommel's forces, and in the air the Allied planes, which are more powerful than the enemy's planes in this theatre of war and which are harassing Rommel's retreating army, are also ready to strike heavy blows on the Axis troops on the beaches of Tunis. General Montgomery has already ordered his men "to force on the Germans a first-class Dunkirk," and there can be no doubt that men of the Eighth Army will carry out his orders effectively.

But it must not be taken for granted that the end of the war in North Africa will come very soon, and without hard fighting. If Rommel finds that the escape of his forces from the Allied ring which is being drawn closely round him is impossible, the possibilities are that he will follow the example of Marshal Paulus, who ordered the German Sixth Army at Stalingrad to fight to the death rather than surrender.

It would not be surprising if the tragedy of Stalingrad is re-enacted at the gates of Tunis. Hitler is feverishly fortifying Europe against Allied invasion, and to gain time so as to complete his plans he will not hesitate to sacrifice his Afrika Korps. But whatever happens, the final ejection of the Axis from Africa is a dead certainty.

General Montgomery, in his order of the day to the Eighth Army before the battle of Mareth, stated that the Axis should be driven out of Gabes, Sfax, Sousse and finally out of Tunis. As we write, the vanguard of the Eighth Army is now driving on Tunis.

The story of the Eighth Army's splendid victories in North Africa will be incomplete without the part played by Non-European members of the South African forces, which form part of this famous army. Major-General F. H. Theron, Chief Administrative Officer of the South African forces in the Middle East interviewed recently at Cape Town, praised the work and the reputation of the men of the transport section of the Native transport section of the Native Military Corps. "From Alexandria to Tripoli," he said, "they man the 1,500 mile route along which the Eighth Army advanced to the borders of Tunisia, keeping the wheels well greased and the line of communications serviceable. They have fully maintained the traditions of fighting South Africa."

Another officer, Major A. P. Van Ginkel paying tribute to a unit of the Cape Corps attached to a fighting wing of the S.A.A.F. in Tunisia says: "I am sure there is no more loyal willing or efficient labour in the world. Their work is the least spectacular, yet whenever I think of them my heart glows. I feel I can never say enough in appreciation of the part they are playing in the war."

It was Napoleon who said "the army moves on its stomach" and the Eighth Army could not have traversed the 1,500 miles in its pursuit of the Afrika Korps

without the magnificent support of the men of the Non-European Army Services. We are proud to know that in the ejection of the Axis from Africa our men are playing a vital part.

When the European and non-European instructors feel that their students are sufficiently advanced, they submit them to a board of examiners who test the drivers in every phase of driving. 55 per cent must be scored before a driver can qualify, but unless he attains a good average mark in every subject, he is failed. Back he goes to the instructors for further tuition in his weakest subjects. By the time a driver passes this school, both he and his instructors are confident that he is more than capable of managing a truck.

An army driver must not only be able to drive his vehicle; he must also know how to maintain it in good running order. To this end the R.A.S.C. have evolved a system of maintenance which demands the daily chasing of specific parts of the engine and chassis on a set plan. This 16-day system is taught to the Native drivers who learn what makes a motor go. This appreciation of the simple mechanics of the vehicle acts as a deterrent to bad driving. When a driver is posted to a truck, it is his task to develop a pride in its appearance and running qualities which he knows will be impaired by bad, thoughtless driving.

The success of this training is the work being done at present by the Native M.T. Companies spread across the Middle East. But what is more important, the Army is teaching non-Europeans to develop a good traffic sense, to understand and appreciate driving and maintaining vehicles and to be self-reliant—all of which will stand him in good stead after war.

Modern State And Social Service**General Smuts Indicts Narrow Nationalism.**

Speaking in the Johannesburg City Hall on Monday night at the great diamond jubilee celebration of the Salvation Army, General Smuts said: "This is the social century. The ideas and ideals of social service are beginning to permeate the modern state. It is no longer a game of politics, nor the mere maintenance of law and order.

"We hear much of 'social security' in these days. That is only one aspect of this far-reaching change coming over the world to-day. The social movement is far wider than that. The task of the State is the building of a new human society which will do its best for all its members," continued General Smuts.

"It is building up its citizens, raising the whole level of life and improving the standards for all. The provision of the physical needs of the community and the removal of the so-called fears are only part of its tasks."

"Even the dictator countries are in a sense infected with this social spirit and the reconditioning of its population. But the final objective there is not a free world of free men and women, but rather more valuable servants, and, I fear, slaves, for the State. Efficiency and not free self-development of the citizen and society is the paramount aim.

STATE A SERVANT

"In our free society the outlook and the motive is different. The State becomes in a sense the servant of the people. He who is highest among you let him serve." The final goal is to free and developed human personality, for which the State provides the proper environment.

"The sense of individual responsibility is also developed. Duties go with rights, which could not exist without a proper sense of duty and responsibility.

"All this is implicit in the new conception of the State. The State gives of its best—education, food, housing, health and the reasonable amenities of a good life. In return, it expects a high sense of duty and devotion and love of country from its citizens.

DANGEROUS NATIONALISM

"But even love of country is not enough. Patriotism must be balanced by a wider love and outlook. Love of your people, unless rooted in a great love and a wider regard for human rights, may itself become a danger.

"There is to-day a dangerous nationalism abroad in the world, a nationalism which makes an idol of one's own people, and that idolatry of race has largely become responsible for the sad state of the world to-day.

"Nationalism thus becomes the first, and a short step to imperialism, and to a spirit of domination and ruthless disregard of the rights of other peoples.

"Nationalism in an exaggerated form may become a disease, a mental obsession. A people can go mad just like an individual. It can develop phobias which are more devastating than any epidemic disease.

"Is not this exaggerated nationalism the disease which the world is to-day suffering from? Is this World War Number 2 not being fought to stave off the spirit of racial, nationalistic domination which has mastered Germany and has disrupted our world?

"When nationalism assumes the form and idea of herrenvolk, it becomes a public danger, and in the present case a world-wide danger.

General Smuts concluded by paying tribute to the Salvation Army for its remarkable contribution to the life of South Africa.

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



BOREDOM IN THE HOME

It always gives me pleasure to chat with college girls over Home, Marriage and Motherhood because in these young African minds there always is that beaming enthusiasm to be the very best of wives and mothers. But the most hurting thing is to find that after a few years of married life, that once beaming and positive enthusiasm has been replaced by the most chronic pessimism and indifference.

Young wives become too bored to find life any more attractive and they resign themselves to the rut of a colourless existence whose monotony is broken now and then by the most sensational scandal of the year or even just idle gossip. The daily routine of cleaning

the home—whatever a home may look like among a poverty-stricken people—soon ceases to have any attraction. The bringing up of children, under strained economic circumstances becomes boring. Her hard-worked husband brings her no relief and before long, we see Nomusa, a once promising and brilliant prefect at school now the picture of slovenly indifference, if not just a bundle of wrecked nerves.

Not satisfied that the average urban African home to-day is not a frustrating chamber, I do feel that our Women's organisations very much need to pay greater attention to the girl about to be married and to domesticating influences that make so much of our home life colourless and unstable.

As a people we very much need stable homes, homes which will allow of the free exercise of the talents of our girls. We cannot afford to allow so many of our girls to drift to nothingness, becoming mere machines in the home. That is inviting trouble for all South Africans.

We must remember that even in Europe those nations that have tried to enforce the domestication of their women have developed a bent for aggressiveness. The "Kirche, Kuche und Kinde" cult has infected the German people with an international hysteria which has plunged the world in the present chaos.

IN AND AROUND THE HOME

IN THE KITCHEN

A WORD ABOUT EGGS: Eggs are a useful item of diet but require great care to be exercised in choosing them from the egg dealer. Skilled housewives have very little difficulty in telling whether an egg is good or bad, but many of us still find testing eggs not easy. A simple method to test whether or not an egg is good is to hold it between the thumb and the pointing finger of one hand against a very strong light whilst the egg is held to the eye. If the egg looks clear, it will be good; if there is a black spot or black spots, it will be bad.

Science is steadily discovering that it is possible to preserve eggs for a long time. Very many ways have been devised for this, but the simplest that will meet ordinary domestic requirements is to procure new-laid eggs, grease them thoroughly with lard or butter or oil, lay them in a box in a thick layer of bran and surround each egg with a little bran to prevent them coming in contact with one another. This process should be repeated every four to six weeks. Then cover the whole with bran.

Eggs may also be preserved by immersing them in solutions of water-cress or silicate of soda—but here the advice of the chemist should be sought.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

CREASING LINO: To prevent the creasing of lino, particularly on cement floors, before laying it, sweep the floor clean, then lay sheets of paper—ordinary paper used for making newspapers, over all the area to be covered by the linoleum only. If possible allow lino to stretch out uniformly before placing heavy furniture on it. If heavy furniture is placed on the lino before it has expanded fully, folds in the lino will form around legs of such furniture or its base.

GLAZING COLLARS: A teaspoonful of wax or candle shavings mixed with the hot starch in stiffening collars and cuffs ensures a beautiful gloss and it will keep the irons from sticking and catching the material when the article is pressed.

WASHING KNIVES: When washing knives, be careful that the handles are not immersed in water, for, if that is done, the blades will loosen and the handles discolour. The blades should be put, for a few moments only, in a jug filled with hot soda-water and should then be dried. This should be done as soon as possible after the knives have been used.

HEALTH IN THE HOME

DISLOCATIONS: Dislocations and sprains are a familiar trouble with young active members of the family. In a dislocation, that is, where a bone has been forced out of its natural position, the limb is stiff and there is a marked difference in length and shape between it and the limb on the opposite side. The rounded end of the displaced bone may sometimes be felt.

If a doctor is within easy reach, it is not wise to touch a dislocation. It may be merely supported to give the greatest comfort to the patient until the doctor arrives. If he is very far off, however, get someone to steady the body or the part of the limb nearest the body and use gentle, steady extension upon that part farthest removed until the parts are again in the original and natural place. This, however, should never be attempted by anyone who does not know how to handle such a case.

When the joint is again in place, apply cooling lotions to the injured part, taking care to keep the limb in proper position by means of slings and bandages.

If these house-trained cooks and chefs are correct then the Domestic Science Training Institutions for all females are wrong and my only query is: Why should certified cooks and chefs be underrated by uncertified cooks and chefs?

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
