25TH ANNIVERSARY

Today the 9th August mark the 25th anniversary of the South Africa's Women's Day. This day, indeed an important event in the history of the oppressed majority in South Africa is commemorated by the progressive mankind the world-over.

It is in the same spirit of solidarity that has been shown by Organisations like the United Nations, Organisation of African Unity and the Front-line States that Medu Art Ensemble deemed it fit to join hands in this great event.

This day is known the world-over as a day when our sisters and mothers marched through Pretoria to the Union Buildings to petition Strjdom, the then fascist prime minister, against the introduction of pass laws for women.

We who know this gesture cannot allow the oppressor to continue with his unprecedented plunder of our cultural heritage. Thus the birth of Medu Art Ensemble was a historical necessity. The group was born of events affecting all peoples of this volatile region - Southern Africa. Especially with an aggressor south of the rive Limpopo.

This day, August 9th cannot be commemorated outside of what Medu stands for. This stands to reason because whatever clauses are being added daily to the Statute Books, that alone has cultural implications.

The laws that are actually being passed daily in the white parliament have virtually denied the vast majority of the population of all rights of a civilised people.

The imposition of all draconian laws by the regime has even more consequential cultural bearings: they affect people as a nation, affect people with a culture, and lastly affect people fighting for self-determination and national democracy.

Medu Art Ensemble, an organisation of cultural activists, has throughout its short momentous history of existence attempted to articulate the needs and aspirations of the people and at the same time adhered steadfastly to the principle of ANTI-RACISM.

The primary aim of the organisation is to work with the people, to understand the people and to be part of the people.
